

W. A. LaGrange to
S. May Nov. 18th 1856

Dear Sir Your letter dated
the 6th inst at Ton Du Lac was rec'd by
us yesterday. William and my-
self having been unable yet to get
any money. of course we can not send
it to you. I did think that Bender
would take that mortgage at a fair
rate. but he was beyond my or your
reach. he proposed to cash the thing
~~\$1150.00 & \$10.00 due~~ for \$1050.00 You see
that that was out of the question. So that
we had to look otherwise for money.
There is two men "Saunders & South"
Scand. we expect to get it of one
or the other of thos. Perhaps tomorrow
we will have to pay some twenty or twenty
five dollars besides the interest due
We will do the best we can and forward
the money immediately to you.

We are all well, there is not anything new
here. I have no business yet. The weather is
very fine like Indian Summer. I will write
again and more at length hereafter
