

Many Nov. 13th 1856

Dear Sir Your letter dated
the 1st inst at Ten On Dec. was rec^d by
us yesterday. William and my-
self having been unable yet to get
any money. of course we can not send
it to you. I did think that Bender
would take that mortgage at a fair
rate. but he was beyond my or your
reach. he proposed to Cash the thing
\$1150.⁰⁰ & \$25⁰⁰ due" for \$1000.⁰⁰ You see
that that was out of the question. So that
we had to look elsewhere for money.
There is two men "Saunders & South"
Iceland. we expect to get it of one
or the other of those. Perhaps tomorrow
we will have to pay some twenty or twenty
five dollars besides the interest due.
We will do the best we can and forward
the money immediately to you.
We are all well, there is not anything new
here. I have no business yet. The weather is
very fine. like Indian Summer. I will write
again and more at length hereafter.
