Rest assured, Bob, that I realize a Deputy Commissioner of Indian Affairs doesn't make policy too much - he is just able to influence policy once in awhile and this influencing always has to be when the opening arises.

This is perhaps an occasion for me to remind you that any general could win any war if he had all of the troops and resources he needed to win the war. A great general, including MacArthur, and of course the commandants of the Marine Corps, influences the outcome of the conflict with AVAILABLE RESOURCES.

Also, Bob, please remember that inevitably the tide will turn and your current opportunities will decline. When things get going bad, please remember I'm glad to sign my letters to you as,



Dear Mr. Bennett:

Re: Yours of Sept. 13, 1965 Attorneys for Alaska I.R.A. corporations.

Since your are about to leave Alaska, I do not wish to leave the above subject open wherein you said that "it is our interpretation that the legal aid referred to in the constitution pertains to the employment of general counsel as the Indian Claims Act was not in existence in 1942 when the Tanacross Constitution was ratified"

I feel oblight to take it that the above is your personal opinion and not necessarily the opinion of the Indian Bureau. We can leave it there. If it is the opinion of the department, I believe the members of any I.R.A. corporation should take exception because section 476 relating to "organization of Indian tribes" does not apply to Alaska.

Tribal lines are not regarded in Alaska and so any Indian who meets the residence qualifications of the local corporation can become a member. There is only one limitation placed on the subject of employing an attorney under an IRA constitution, namely, approval of his employment. I would say however that if the Tanacross Council should employ an attorney and should direct him to maintain an action of trespass against such persons, the attorney might be paid by the council and borrow money from the credit fund to pay for the expense of such litigation. Certainly such an expense might be considered in the catagory of preservation of corporation assets. If not, then your would have to reconsider the status of the . Tyonek corporation to deal with tribal property without first obtaining an assignment from the tribe. You could get some light on what a former secretary of the Interior wrote about the principal involved in his letter of June 13, 1940.

I don't expect a reply. I write merely for the record. As for you personally, I congratulate you on your promotion. You are a very able mayand are a credit to our Indian race. Sincerely authority to establish policies.



WASHINGTON-For the first time in nearly a century an American Indian is slated to become commissioner of Indian affairs in the Interior Department.

He is Robert L. Bennett, an Oneida Indian from Wisconsin, who is expected to be named in a few months as part of a major personnel change in the Indian Bureau. He would re-place Philleo Nash, commissioner since 1961.

The last Indian to head the bureau that tries to protect the Indian's interest and improve his lot was appointed by President U.S. Grant. He was an Iroquois named Parker who had served as Grant's military aide during the Civil War.

BENNETT was appointed deputy commissioner of Indian affairs only a few weeks ago. Before that, he had been the bureau's area director in Alaska.

The Interior Department would not comment officially on the reported change, but it was understood that this was only one of many changes to be made in the Indian Bureau and other parts of the department.

Nash, 56, is an anthropologist who had served as a special assistant to President Truman and as lieutenant governor of Wisconsin before joining the Interior Department in the Kennedy administration.
