Dear Mr. Bennett:

The radio just announced the confirmation of your appointment to new and great responsibilities: this is truly a red letter day for Alaska and all your many friends of the North. Please accept my sincere congratulations and the assurrance of my prayers assist you in the task, so difficult but also so rich in potentialities.

I had followed with interest in the papers the questionning before the Senate Committee, and appreciated your answers. May I express a personal wish at this time? It is to see the education of our Native Youngsters better geared to a good life in the rural environment of their village; it will be years and years before our State catch up with the economic patterns of older industrialized states and I believe our first step during this period of transition between Stone Age and Atomic Age is the creation and development of a simple and rural culture. Only a relatively small number of our Eskimos and Indians of the real Bush Country can possibly succeed in an academicly oriented school and higher education, and the needs of these have certainly to be met, but I believe that for the present they are. What really bothers me is to see the larger number of young people pushed too fast from one culture to the other ... and practically falling by the wayside. It is for these I'd like to see a real study made of possible rural life, still depending to a great extent on traditional subsistence resources, but these being exploited more efficiently; new ones should also be explored and developped. But by now I believe you are familiar with my own line of thought, and I won't insist more at this time.

You may be interested that we have recently found a qualified and devoted layman to relieve me in great part of the extra load I have assumed for quite a few years now to help our parishionners in developpping their human surroundings. Mr. Paul Dixon of Anchorage, formerly with the State Division of Aviation has been hired to work at the details of planning and making and keeping the necessary contacts with all Agencies involved as it appears that possibilities are many now with the national Programs against Poverty. Confidentially, I had hoped our Churches Socio-Economic Committee could have sponsored this, but there were hesitations delaying immediate action, so for the present we went it alone, but I hope that in a not too distant future the man can represent us all and work for these villages where the needs are the reatest, and who so often are the ones who need that grassroot assistance as they don't know what can be done, nor how to do it.

Again, thank you for the wonderrul relationship established while you were in Juneau, and my congratulations for a promotion well deserved. May God bless you.



On Indians choosing their projects, the Title Five Program on Turtle Mountain Reservation is my pride and joy. It justifies the entire program, but Ft. Totten can't get off the ground.

Frankly, I feel an all-out attack at Ft. Totten using the existing agencies could solve the problem. A factory, privately owned, one which would employ whites as well as Indians, fully subsidized by the government until it could be self-sustaining and profitable would work miracles.

John Hart and I are responsible for the Jewel Bearing P ant at Rolla. This is a type of project that would fit Ft. Totten. Some industry essential in defence where items assembled are not bulky and transportation a minimum problem.

I hope to make contact with innumerable Senators and Congressmen in both parties to give you support.

Dear Commissioner:

Today in my Denver Post I read of the convention in Santa Fe, N.M. You, Mr. Commissioner, have a man size job in effecting beneficial change in the affairs of our Indian fellowmen.

In years gone by I was, as a young man, a teacher of Sioux children far out on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. Many of the

Indian problams of that day remain with us.

I think the Indian (American) is much a product of the environment in which his white brethern have cast him. I lived among Indians for almost ten years. I taught the children and grandchildren and the great grandchildren of Sitting Bull himself at Day School 6. some 25 miles northwest of the Pine Ridge Agency.

I am encouraged by the name your parents gave you:

Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin and Senator George Norris of Nebraska were the TWO outstanding statesmen of my time. And I was born in 1887 making me now 78 years old.

I was in the Kansas City Convention as a reporter and heard

the Wiscasin delegation on the final rollcall announce:

"Wisconsin casts its 22 votes for George W.Norris of Nebraska."

Hoover of course was nominated. But Bob LaFollette and Norris represented a peculiar brand of statesmen that were far above party. They were, in my opinion, the only real honest-to-God statesmen in all my 78 years of living.

You are indeed honored by your parents in bearing the name "Bobert LaFollette".

In writing you I am glad to announce to you that I do not want anything at your hands. I am too old for political or bureaucratic ambitions but in my final years if I can lend my moral support to the betterment of the Indians I know of no better way to make my exit from this material universe of ours.

I do wish you well, Mr. Commissioner, in your undertaking and I know well some of the obstacles you face. But I also know the Indian is inherently as capable on the average as as his white contemporaries. What we need to do is to "motivate" him in some way so he'll "reach out" so to speak and take hold of it.

This, I believe, is the crux of the entire problem and an adequate discussion of it requires much more than can be condensed in a letter for the attain it will require trial and error in maybe a half dozen different directions and/Or from different angles.

Dear Commissioner Bennett:

At the outset please allow me to congratulate you on being confirmed by the Senate as the new Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Your reputation among the Indian people is such that we can only anticipate a constructive and cooperative career. You therefore have our very best wishes.

In receiving many of the reports by the Press concerning your appearance before the Senate Interior Committee, it has become quite clear that some of the Senators are extremely interested in termination. This of course is not surprising, but the tenor of it is somewhat alarming. Last September Deputy Commissioner, John Crow, informed several of our tribal delegates who were then visiting Washington, that a report had been received from the Government Accounting Office strongly recommending that immediate steps be taken to terminate Federal supervision over our Reservation. In light of the Senate's emphasis upon termination, I would like to request that you please send a copy of said G. A. O. report so that the members of my Tribe might at least be alerted to the fate someone has planned for them.



Dear Bob:

Congratulations on your new title and job. You've come a long way since you were IIM Clerk at U&O. I'm really happy and proud of your accomplishments and to know that an Indian finally made it to the top.

I am writing this as a personal letter as I feel I know you well enough to do it. I wrote a letter to you before the Santa Fe meeting but held up mailing it until the Area Director and Asst. AD got back in hopes that we might learn something of the new policy. The Area Director went on vacation and hasn't returned and the Asst. gave some information to the Staff in our regular meeting but nothing much of what can be expected in policy etc.

I have gathered from newspaper articles that the lack of any terminal program was one of the things the Senate Sub-committee was critical of. It followed that some kind of termination can be expected in the new look and policy. I have often wonderedd in my 11 years here why we were holding on to some of these tribes in Oklahoma but we were under orders as I understand it to make no mention of termination. There are some tribes here which can be terminated tomorrow and it would not work any hardship on the members. The only trouble is that the Indian blood has been depleted until you don't know whether you are in a meeting of Swedes instead of Indians. The only difficulty is that I don't think we will ever be able to get a tribe to agree to termination if put to a vote. I find that the less Indian blood people have the more they are determined to remain Indian.

I can give you the facts about these Indians here and which ones can be terminated, and should be. I believe a time table can be made to take care of all 23 tribes under this office with all but five of them terminated in a few years--not over 7 years. Five of the tribes will take longer.

I have not discussed this with anyone at the Area Office and don't know how the Area Director feels about it. I believe he would agree with most of what I state above.

If there is to be any termination program I feel that I can be of help in our Oklahoma Indians and that is for those on the East side also especially those under the Miami Agency which was my home agency before termination of the Ottawas. I will have my 30 years in September and probably could retire then but I feel that I can still be of service and want to continue a few years. Any termination program will not win any awards but if it is to be then we should begin somewhere and Oklahoma appears to be the most likely place as far as I can see.

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If there is to be any terminal programs in the new policy I believe I can be of use in such a program even though the persons in it would be unpopular it has to come sometime. Some of our Western tribes are 50 years off yet, maybe longer but others aren't.

I don't want to get in trouble for talking out of turn but want you to know that I am willing to help if there is any anticipated termination program in view. Maybe the fact that my tribe has been terminated and Eva's mixed blood Utes are terminated and I nearly have it made as far as retirement is concerned, could have some bearing on my feeling in regard to termination. I do feel though that the Sub-committee does have a ligitimate gripe when I know of tribes still under the BIA who are just as ready for termination as the Ottawas were. We were ready but I can frankly say that if the question had been put to the vote of tribal members, I would have vote against termination because I still had trust land and was one of the few members who did have. In fact my Aunt, my Uncle and myself had over half of the Ottawa lands still in trust when terminated. Tribal members of my tribe benefitted greatly and we probably got more benefits under the terminal program than we ever would have by remaining under the BIA. So everything worked out realy nice for the tribe in the long run. It really didn't bother me either. I did just like any other Indian--I sold my land and bought a new car.

When I get started I don't know when to quit. Sue is married and lives in Littleton, Colorado where her husband is employed with the Plant Management Branch as an Engineer. They are doing real good. My other girl Tonia is a Sophomore in High School this year. Right now I hope to keep working until she finishes High School as she has about\$20,000 of her Ute money in trust and will be able to go to the college of her choice without any help from me.

I know you are real busy and I wish you nothing but the best as Commissioner and hope that I can be of some help in making your administration the best,

I hope you will consider this as a personal letter of a friend to a friend and not an official one because I may be way out of line in mentioning what I have and if so I don't want to get an official rebuff or anything like that.xx Unless I hear from you about it, I won't ever mention the subject again because I know it might not be the intention of the BIA to have such a program.

I have too long delayed extending my congratulations on your confirmation as the Commissioner of the Bureau of Indian Affairs. I do so now, most heartily.

I would very much like to meet with you one day to review the status of the housing program on the reservations and some of the problems being encountered at this stage of development.

In the conventional rental program 540 dwellings have been completed and occupied; 750 are under construction and 2,620 are in different stages of development. In the mutual-help program, under BIA supervision, there have been 20 dwellings completed and occupied, 254 under construction and 1,617 in planning on 52 reservations. In addition, there are 1,072 dwellings in application in process, of which 685 are for mutual-help.

Difficulties now being encountered include increasing costs due to isolation and over-design; the need for additional help in the preparatory documentation; the need to redirect some of our approaches that are not responsive to situations on the reservations; and improvement of inter-agency relationships that are in some spots, to say the least, weak.

I would hope that the two of us might meet and together see if we cannot move the program more rapidly and achieve our common goal of building good housing on the reservations.

The Minnesota Indian Affairs Commission wishes to extend its heartiest congratulations to you for your nomination and selection as Commissioner of Indian Affairs. The Minnesota Indian Affairs Commission is comprised of six legislative members from the House and Senate. Ex-officio members from state government including the Governor. This Commission also includes Mr. Roger Jourdain, Chairman of the Red Lake Tribe and Mr. Peter DuFault, President of the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe and Mr. Dean Blue representing the three southern Sioux tribes of Minnesota. Our Commission has recently been created by State Legislature to coordinate Federal and State activities affecting the Indian citizens. Thus far, we have established good rapport and relationships with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Mr. Glenn Landbloom, Area Director, Minneapolis Area Office.

My personal experience in the past twelve years has been in the field of education in an Indian community, in private enterprise relating to the Indian population also serving as Tribal Chairman and Tribal Secretary of the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe for five years. I have spent five years with the U. S. Public Health Service, Division of Indian Health and recently assumed this position. Therefore, with this experience and knowledge of problems affecting the Indian population in Minnesota I am in a position to recommend solutions to our state offices and also work closely with agencies serving the Indian population.
