

Mrs. Louis Tollefson, Mistress of Ceremonies, welcomed the Aberdeen residents of American Indian ancestry met together for the first time at a dinner at the Holiday Inn on April 18, 1966. Mrs. Gerarda Ellis, Kansas City, and formerly of Fort Berthold, told about an American Indian Club in her city. He spent 25 years with the Employment Service. During this time he acquired friends wherever he went as he was that kind of a person. He was complimented by being asked to run for President of the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security. He had requested that if I ever thought of establishing a Memorial Fund in his name it should be for the benefit of Indian people - particularly Indian youth interested in Art and Music. Therefore, I have decided that using some of the money in the Fund for the purpose of activating the Aberdeen Indian Tribe is in keeping with this philosophy.

Dear Beb:

I have been intending for some time to write and congratulate you on your new position. I really know of no one who knows better the problems, and who is imaginative enough to try to solve them.

When I read that the President had asked you to come up with a new approach and a real solution, I was reminded that when I became a citizen I wrote your predecessor telling him what I thought might work, and though I cannot find a copy of the letter, I shall pass it on to you for whatever good it may be.

I think there should be legislation putting a date twenty five years hence as an absolute termination of all Federal responsibility for ^Indians. Accompanying this must be massive programs to bring it about, educationally, economically and psychologically. Probably the last is the most important.

At first there would undoubtedly be real resistance, but I think the Indian is a realist, and if he thought such legislation irrecovablehe could face the situation, especially for his children. Advantages of such a plan would be a focus of attention on the self-realization of the young, provision for the care of the old on the reservations (25 years should care for this) and, most important, the retirement of all Bureau personnel not in sympathy by the time termination would come about.

This should cost a lot of money, but a lot is spent now and much of it as you know not effectively. Therefor the Commissioner should be given considerable freedom as well as great responsibility.

Anyway-- there you have it for what good it is. I hope you will be happy in your job. I am enjoying retirement and putting my efforts on conservation of natural resources-- rather than people. But they are for the people.



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

Dear Bob:

First of all, congratulations - if that's the right word - on your appointment. Believe me, I am very interested and sympathetic with the challenges you face and your initial statements regarding how you hope to meet them.

Secondly, let me express my sincere thanks for the presence of Mr. Mason Barr at a meeting to discuss potential housing programs for the Maine Indians held on April 20th. Because of Mr. Barr's expertise in the area of Indian Self-Help housing, he was able to contribute more than any of the officials present, including those from the New York PHA office whose experiences with Indians had been limited to Seneca Low-Rent programs.

Finally, let me offer what I can in the way of recompense for your Mr. Barr's assistance by reporting that on April 26th, I addressed some 35 graduate students of the Harvard Graduate School of Education regarding teaching opportunities and challenges in the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Of course, this talk was too late in the year for effective recruitment as most students have already committed themselves to job-placements. However, I have already promised to return to Harvard for the same purpose early next fall before all students are committed. In spite of the lateness of this presentation in the school year, there was at least one girl who is definitely planning to apply for a Bureau position following the talk and several others who may apply sometime subsequent to their initial job placements.

I had previously sent Mr. Richard Wheeler, the Assistant Director of Placement for the Ed school, the material that I collected from Miss Brinkley while I was in Washington and that sent me by Miss Givens in the Gallup Area Office. I think I was able to be honest about the problems that could be encountered working with



Indians and still be attracting insofar as challenges and rewards are concerned. Whatever the effect of my talk on the students, it was a very enjoyable experience for me and one which I look forward to repeating next fall.

I want you to know that I was not responsible for either the title or the designation of my position in the enclosed listing in the "Harvard Student Calendar" but I thought you would be amused by both.

Thank you very much again for your help to date - I expect I will be in contact with you and your staff more often than you might wish.



Dear Mr. Bennett:

Congratulations to both you and the Bureau for your appointment to head the Bureau. I thought you might be interested in the enclosed article that appeared in one of the two English daily newspapers, the Tehran Journal. The most recent issue of the USIS-produced quarterly in Persian, Marzhaye Now, has a cover picture in color of an American Indian, and a story on Indian Art. I am enclosing a copy of the publication together with a copy of the English text of the story on Indian art that was translated into Persian. The publication has a circulation of 22,000 throughout Iran. Several months ago we had an exhibit of Indian paintings by Indians on exhibit at the Tehran binational center, the Iran-America Society; and the display was of great interest to our Iranian friends.

My main reason for writing to you is of a personal nature. I have recently received a solicitation for funds from the "American Indian Fund of the Association on American Indian Affairs, Inc." I should very much appreciate your office's comments on this organization. Particularly, is it one that is doing an effective service for the Indians? A second major consideration, in view of the President's "Great Society" program, is such an organization as the Fund a necessary or useful one?

Perhaps my being a native of Colorado (where we shall return this summer on home leave) is the primary reason for my interest in Indian affairs. In a Divisional paper for sociology on "Festivals as a Social Institution" for my M.A. degree from the University of Chicago, I incorporated a study I did on the Shalako Festival after a visit to the Zuni reservation in the winter of 1940-41. Since then in my twenty years service with the Government's information and cultural program overseas I have observed a considerable amount of interest of non-Americans in American Indians, and our Agency supplied material is well received. Here in Iran this government



has the nomadic tribes (pages 19 & 20) they would like to settle; and there is a thought that the story of the American Indian might provide lessons, with some practices not to be emulated, that could conceivably have a bearing here.

It is gratifying to know that an Indian is now heading the Bureau. I know I share the hopes of many for your success.






