Dear Sir Your letter dated the 2nd inst was rec^d yesterday. It found us all well. I came into town this morning and see Mr. Mayhew. He said the money coming to you has to be paid to him by Horatio and that he has not yet been able to get it from him. He said that Horatio had been endeavoring to borrow it from some of the neighbors, but had not got it yet.

I told him I thought you was in much need of the money and that he should do in the matter, what he thought best — under the circumstances. He then said that he would send you \$50. — immediately of his own money. I therefor told him that I would write to you to that effect. Liz is at my house, and has been for some time. I judged from my letter that you also had written to her as the letter was not here. I supposed you had directed to Cohoes. We have had very bad weather for the last four, or five weeks. Consequently our fall work is much behind. Crops generally are good this year. Honest Abe will be the next President.

If you do not get some money in a few days let me know and I will see him again. Write again and let me hear about things
