

- 1831 The first settlers were, H^m Dick, Elkanah Dick, Burr
 David Johnson, Isaac Scipio, Randall Abner,
 Thomas Cornmuck
- 1832, Arrived in the schooner, the President, Alex Dick,
 the two sons of Elder Thomas Dick, Daniel and
 Thomas, who was later killed by the ~~Memories~~
 H^m Johnson, John Scheter, John Adams and
 Nathan Paul, who had served 3 years in N.Y. for
 murder
- 1834 - Arrived in the Navigator, Elder Thomas Dick
 He conducted services in the home of H^m Dick
 This house was used until the school house
 was built after which services were conducted
 there. Established their court, and conducted it the same
 as the old Peace makers court in Brocton, N.Y. well qualified
 Peace makers, H^m Dick, Randall Abner, George Thompson, John Johnson, J.
 John Scheter, Reip. Marshes, Samuel Scipio
- 1835 - Moody Mann, began the erection of a ~~the~~
^{a millwright} grist and saw mill, these were completed
 in 1836. They ground all the grain for the
 surrounding country including F. D. J. and
 Oskosh until 1840
- 1836, Govt began building the road from S. B. to Ft. Winnetago
 used except in dry weather and at winter
- 1837 This became a territory
- 1837 - John Palmer
- 1838 - Mail service was started, once a week and return
 by an act of congress Contractor, Sam. Newland \$200
- 1839, They were granted their citizenship and a tract
 of land of 23040 and each were given 6 1/2 acres of land
- 1840 - Defunct Post office, Thomas Cornmuck - Decaturburg

1840 - Held their first county election at the home of
Hannah Dick, and the mission house at Stockbridge.
Pop 270 at which time John Johnson^{sr}, Daniel Dick and David Fowler
were elected Co Commr.

G. W. Feathermough surveyed the township
and each Indian was allotted their share of land
Jeremiah Manchester had surveyed the land some
years before and the township had been called
Manchester and was not changed to Brothers town
until about 1848

1842, The trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church
Pondal Abner, John C Hammer, David Higgins
J^{nr} Fowler and Hegriah Fowler bought of
Thomas Commuck a parcel of land and erected
the church which is still standing

1852 We believe this to be the last mention of the
old Baptist church. It is the minutes of their
meeting. Met at the house of W^m Dick Esq on the
13th day of Feb 1852

- 1 - that Resolved John Johnson Sen. to officiate as
church clerk
- 2 - that James Niles officiate as Deacon of church
- 3 - that Daniel Dick first chosen as Moderator
in behalf of the clost Baptist church organized
on the day and year aforesaid and witnessed
by our signatures of the same

1840 - A Post office was established and called
Pegsots. Thomas Commuck was the first
postmaster. It remained Pegsot until
1857 and then was changed to Brothertown
Chilton received a weekly mail from
Brothertown until 1851. The post office
was discontinued in 1903 and it is fitting
that the last postmaster should be a
Brothertown Indian, Edgar M. Dick

1852 Moody Mann was elected the first county
judge

1857 Chilton Court house. Calumet co was
being settled very fast and the whites
were crowding in and they were being
gradually forced out.

- 1831 - The first settlers, W^m Dick, Elkanah Dick David Johnson, Isaac Scipio, Randall Abner and Thomas Commuck. Boated and backed their goods
- 1832 - The schooner, The President, brought Alex Dick Thomas and Daniel Dick, sons of Elder Thomas Dick W^m Johnson, John Leiber, John Adams and Nathan Paul, to Green Bay. Thomas Dick was later killed by the Menominees.
- 1833 - More arrived and in 1834 when Dick came there were nearly 80 people here and
- 1834 - He conducted services in the home of the first settler, W^m Dick which was located about 40 rods north of the cheese factory, services were held here until the first school house was built after which they were held there. They also established a court on the same plan as the old Peacemaker court, they were well qualified to do so as they had with them all of the old Peace makers who had served in 21-7 namely, W^m Dick, Randall Abner, George Sampson, John Johnson Sr and Jr, John Leiber, Elip. Marther and Samuel Scipio.
- 1835 - Employed Moody Mann, a millwright, to erect two mills, one a grist and the other a sawmill. They ground all the grain for miles around even as far as S. D. L. and Oak. until 1840
