

1. Walled in cemetery of Slaton Dick, Grave of Abigail Roberts born 1755, Grave of W^m Reed, Mexican War Soldier.
2. Widow Hannah Dick was the mother of W^m Dick, 1th settler.
3. Cynthia Dick, a daughter-in-law of Elder Thomas Dick
husband was killed by Menominee Indians.
4. Widow Pateance Fowler came to "Wis" ^{no Wis then} with nine small children
one was kidnapped by the Menominees.
5. Served as assemblyman. (W. H. Dick.)
6. 1st church services of Baptist church held in Wis at the home
of W^m Dick, the first settler, a Peacemaker on the Brotherhood
Court
7. The 1st Grist mill erected in 1835-36
8. Home of S. W. Featherstonhaugh
9. 1st Store built by Moses Buffum
10. First Steamboat on Lake built here, "Not True," was remodeled here
11. Menominee Indians Village, Pop 1817 was 150 people, 1st white
man to visit them was Samuel A. Storrow, Judge advocate
of U. S. Army.
12. Peacemaker in N. Y. from 1808 to 1821, Titled Esquire in
honor of his service
13. One of the first settlers and the first Blacksmith
14. First School House built in 1834
15. Widow of Emanuel Johnson
16. Grave of Woody Mann, first Calumet County Judge 1852-53
17. First Postmaster, Author of Indian Ballads, & Tribe Historian
18. Narragansett Indian from R. I. first settler at Chilton
19. the first Methodist church built about 1836, the present bldg
Completed 1845

- 20 first town house in Brothertown
- 21 Newton Mossuck is the first known person to be buried in cemetery 1834, first marked grave is that of Jos Palmer, killed July 3rd 1836
- 22 wife of David Fowler Jr. who acted as clerk for many years in the Peacemaker court in N. Y.
- 23 first election in county was held in the home of Elkannah Dick and the Mission House at Stockbridge in 1840
- 24 The old Hop House, Hops was one of the main crops
- 25 a Great Grand Son of David Fowler, first teacher to the Oneidas 1761, a prominent church member
- 26 The Free Will Baptist minister, Peacemaker from 1808-1811
- 27 Served as Register of Deeds, Represented the tribe at Washington
- 28 Killed by Stockbridge Indians as he was returning from Green Bay July 3-1836
- 29 County Treasurer for a number of years, was prominent in the affairs of the Tribe.
- 30 Sprague Blacksmith Shop, Milton Sprague Sr. served on a man-of-war at age of 13 years
- 31 Served 20 years as Peacemaker on Brothertown court in N. Y. Was Called Equire mattheus
- 32 Sawmill erected 1836
- 33 Grave of Wm Morrill, Youngest soldier in the Civil War from Brothertown, died or killed at age of 16 years
- 34 Prominent in county and Town affairs, His wife Rebecca abner was a very intelligent Woman.
- 35 Large Menominee Indian burial ground, in 1890 over 90 graves were uncovered while hauling gravel for Road

- 36 Randall abner was a Peacemaker from 1823 to 1831, one of the first settlers and Justice of the Peace
- 37 a strong church worker, Prominent in town affairs, a splendid farmer, the house was built in 1842
- 38 John C. Hammer was the first Sheriff of Calumet County
- 39 W^m Fowler served as assemblyman in the Territorial Legislature in 1836, was killed at Battle of Perryville
