

National Indian Women's Group To Have Headquarters Here

A national Indian women's organization has chosen Haskell for its headquarters. The announcement came from Hildreth Venegas, president of North American Indian Women's Association, who was on campus March 20 with Marie Cox, the founding president of NAIWA.

"The office will be opened in April or May with an executive director and secretary," said Mrs. Venegas who signed articles of agreement for the establishment of this group here with Pres. Wallace E. Galluzzi March 20.

Headquarters office will be in Ross Hall where the Dean of Education previously had an office.

Organized in 1970 at Colorado State University in Ft. Collins by Marie Cox, the NAIWA began with 68 Indian women representing 43 tribes from 23 states. Now there are approximately 1200 members and 15 state chapters.

In the past nine years, there have been four presidents: Cox, a Comanche from Midwest City, OK; Agnes Sill, an Isleta from Laguna, NM; Mary Jane Fate, an Athabaskan from Alaska; and at present, Venegas, a Sioux from Sisseton, SD.

Each June the NAIWA holds a national conference for three days with 500-550 attending. This year's conference will be at Yakima, WA June 17-20. Theme of the national

conference this year is "International Year of the Child."

NAIWA was formed for five purposes: to better (1) family life and community (2) health (3) education (4) awareness and preservation of Indian culture (5) promote fellowship of all people.

An important project was done by NAIWA in 1972-73. It was a national survey of the special needs of Indian children, something never done before for any race. The women had 37 recommended changes for Social Services of the BIA as a result of the survey.

Another survey on Indian women and handicapped children has just been completed by the organization which hopes to accomplish much from it.

Both Mrs. Venegas and Mrs. Cox expressed the hope that having the headquarters here Menninger's Foundation of Topeka will assist NAIWA with its projects.

Why was Haskell chosen as the headquarters? Mrs. Venegas said, "Haskell is my alma mater; this is central location and close to many resources."

As Hildreth Two Stars, Mrs. Venegas was graduated in 1940 from the Commercial Department here. In 1977, she chosen as one of two outstanding alumni at Haskell's Commencement. She worked 34 years for the BIA, the Air Force, and the Navy and now is Unit Director in

the Indian Health Service at Sisseton, SD.

Mrs. Cox, who wrote the NAIWA constitution and has been very active in getting the organization started, is a familiar face on Haskell's campus. Her husband, James, now chairman of the Comanche tribe, was on the Haskell Board of Regents for several years.

In 1969, Mrs. Cox came to Haskell to help the yearbook staff produce an Indian style show to pay for a hard cover for the yearbook. She has directed Indian dress revues without pay in Oklahoma City at the Western Heritage Center and at the Cowboy Hall of Fame.

"It shows the different tribal dress of Indians and helps non-Indians understand that all Indian do not look alike or have the same traditions," said Mrs. Cox.

Just after Haskell became a junior college, Mrs. Cox came here in support of the Indian day care center and more athletics for women students.

A more recent project of hers was to be chairperson of the American Indian Task Force on "Special Needs of Indian Children and Families" through the National Congress on Foster Family Care.

"If Haskell women are interested in forming a NAIWA chapter here, I'll come up and help them," said Mrs. Cox.

Museum Receives 200 Artifacts

Dr. Nolie Mumez, M.D.-F.A.C.S. from Denver recently donated 200 Indian artifacts to Haskell's Native American Cultural Division. Some of the artifacts are a Sioux breech cloth, rattle, man's bone breastplate, vases, cowhorn spoon and umbilical lizzard; Blackfoot moccasins; Apache love flute; Acoma pottery; Crow men's hair ornament and women's leggings; peyote fan and rattle; Ute cradleboard of white buckskin with bead work; peacepipe, two Kachina dolls, wooden Indian mask, a handmade Indian saddle of elk bone, elk horn, and white buckskin

and lots more pretty Indian artifacts.

Dr. Mumez has collected all these beautiful artifacts during his lifetime. He wanted to put them in a good place, so he donated them to Haskell. They are now on display in showcases in the museum in Tam-lend Hall.

Robert Bennett In Hospital

Robert Bennett, former Commissioner of Bureau of Indian Affairs, is hospitalized in Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque. He reportedly had a

heart attack March 24 and is in intensive care.

Bennett has been a legal advisor to the Haskell Board of Regents since it was formed in 1970 and is a frequent visitor here.

Pres. Galluzzi, Regents Discuss Budget in D.C.

"We know from preliminary information that we will have a decrease in the budget for the fiscal year 1980. How much, we don't know," said President Wallace Galluzzi.

The cut which will start in the fiscal year 1980, which begins Oct. 1, 1979, is still being discussed at hearings in Washington, D.C., and as yet is not finalized as to how much the cut will affect Haskell.

"The Bureau as a whole will be affected," said Galluzzi. "We hope to get an indication of how much of a cut we'll get by the end of school."

On March 26 Galluzzi and members of the Board of Regents, Art Hill-Anadarko area; Ray lightfoot-Minneapolis area; Sid Carney-Muskogee and President of Board of Regents; Daniel Peaches-Navajo area and Vice-President of the Board of Regents; Frank Self-Phoenix area representing Wes Bonito; Mary Norton-Sacramento and Turner Cochran-Haskell Alumni Association met with Martin Seneca, Commissioner of the BIA and Dr. Earl Barlow, Director of Indian Education.

Galluzzi discussed with Seneca and Barlow the following matters:

1) Haskell would receive all higher education funds from an individual's respective tribe and would distribute the funds in an equal and fair manner.

2) Secure \$60,000 for the Little Indian Center and remodel the old masonry shop and convert it into another Indian Center.

3) Transfer the \$804,000 that was leftover from the dorm project to the construction of the Athletic Fieldhouse.

4) Approving a Bureau Manual which would give strength to the college program. The current manual ignores the college program.

Seneca and Barlow also urged Haskell to develop an agreement with various tribes and train students in the field of forestry, engineering, drafting, etc., and place the students on jobs with their respective tribes.

The Board of Directors also urged the help of Kansas Senator Nancy Kassebaum (R) to help in the passing of these matters. Although the Board could't meet personally with Senator Kassebaum, and administrative aide indicated support in these matters, said Galluzzi.

Summer School To Start June 11

Plans for this summer's school session are being finalized with pre-enrollment next week, according to George Lauppe, Instruction Specialist in the Office of Dean of Education.

Students who don't re-enroll but decide to come to summer school may enroll June 11-13. Classes begin June 12 and end July 20.

A full schedule of courses is being offered with classes in the mornings and afternoons this summer. Six credit hours is the normal summer

school load, but student may take more with special permission.

Scotty Harjo, who is in charge of the student work program, said there will be approximately 100 jobs for students to work four hours a day this summer.

RoMere Martin Dies March 26

Rosa Grinnell (RoMere Darling) Martin, 67, died March 26 in a hospital in Joplin, Mo. Funeral services were held March 28 at the Council House Church near Grove, Okla. She died of cancer.

A Potawatomi, she was born in July, 1911 at Mayetta. She attended Haskell in the 1920's and while here, she was selected as "Miss Original America." This led to her career in the movies, one of the first Indian women to be in films.

After retiring from the movies, she moved to Tiff City, Mo., to become the creator and director of Project Box 14-A which aided needy Indian families in Missouri and Oklahoma. This project brought her as much fame as her movie career did as she continued it each Christmas including last Christmas.

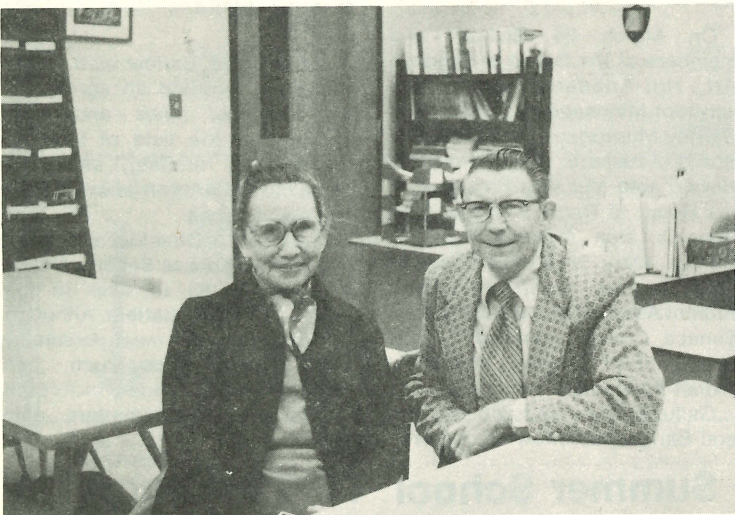

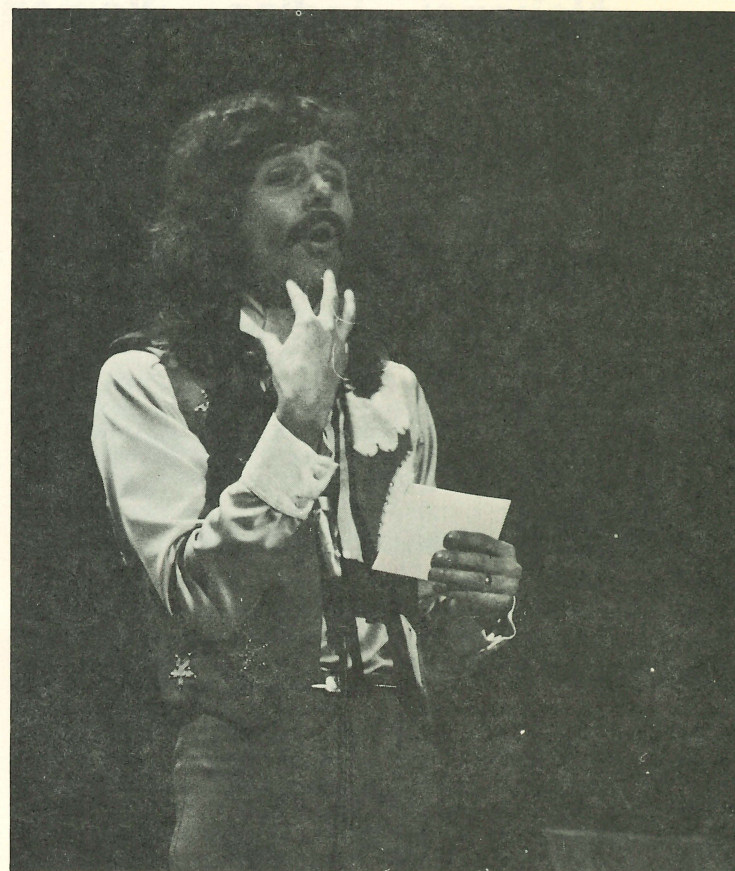
Otho Shoemaker Dies March 18

He was welcomed to a full house in the auditorium where he started his show by tearing a newspaper into pieces and putting it back

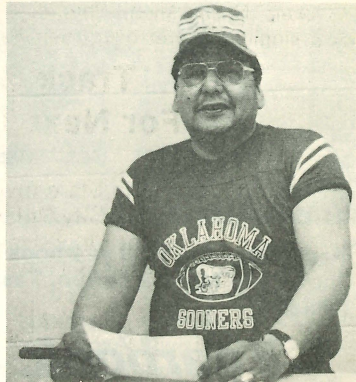
together again, amazing the audience with card tricks, silver rings and changing scarves of one color to another and back with the help of volunteers from the audience.

Blueback Resigns

Ernie Blueback resigned March 23 as a College Residence Specialist of Osceola-Keokuk Hall to take a job with the Kansas University Press.

He graduated from Haskell High School in 1952 in printing and afterwards worked with a private printing firm in Globe, AZ for a year. He then joined the Marines and stayed in for 14 years where he did his tour in all the trouble spots of the world— Indo China, Cuba, Hungary, Thailand, and the Santa Domingo Republic.

He came back to Haskell in 1967 as a College Residence Specialist. While here he worked in Tinker, Pocahontas, Blalock, and OK Halls.

His comments about working in the dorms are, "Currently there are not enough people working in some of the dorms. For example, in OK Hall there are four people working for every 24 hour shift for the 300 students housed there."

He also stated, "OK Hall conditions are highly inadequate. There are no screens, no carpeting, not enough closet space, and no air-conditioning with the exception of the offices. In order to help increase enrollment, the dorm needs to have its living conditions improved."

Bob Gawboy Won Many Swim Honors

"The Minnesota Swimmer" magazine in February, 1973 ran a lengthy story on the accomplishments of Bob Gawboy. It said that Gawboy is "right in the center when speaking of Minnesota's greatest swimmers."

Gawboy starting swimming when 14, capturing the State 100-yard breast stroke in 1:08.3. As a senior in 1950, he broke the 20-yard course National high school record for 120-yard I.M. with a 1:14.8. He also made a national high school record that year, swimming 150-yards in the I.M. with a time of 1:38.0.

The article continued by saying "Probably the first sign of his multiple sclerosis was just after high school graduation when he noted difficulty in coordination while working construction. However, the incoordination cleared when he entered Purdue University in 1950. There he placed second in 1952 in the 150 I.M. in the NCAA meet.

After that, Gawboy underwent surgery and was forced by his illness to quit swimming until 1955. On April 1, 1955, he swam his first race in over two years, the 220-yard (underwater) breast at the Indoor National AAU's at Yale University. There he cracked the American record in the prelims, and in the finals won the gold medal with a world record of 2:38.0.

Then multiple sclerosis gave him more trouble and he had more surgery so he did not swim again until 1966 at age 35. He became one of the first "Master" swimmers and competed in AAU meets in 1967, swimming a 1:23 plus and a 3:08 plus for the 100 and 200 breast in the State Outdoor Championships. Transposing these times to 1972, they would have rated first for the 35-39 age group.

In 1968, again swimming in the senior men's division, and now again having coordination problems, he turned in a 2:39.9 for the 220-yard I.M. and a 20:56.0 for the 1650 free."

"Not bad for a 36-year-old," said the "Minnesota Swimmer."

Gawboy has had to give up swimming competition now and is in a rest home, but he does swim once a week, said the woman who wrote the letter.

He has a daughter, April, who is a freshman here this year majoring in architectural drafting. She too, is a swimmer and has won awards in AAU meets. There are three other children in the family—April's twin, Brad, who is in the U.S. Naval Academy majoring in nuclear submarines; another brother, Barton, at Dartmouth majoring in computer music, and a younger sister, Stephanie, who plans to attend Haskell. 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Campus Security Assists Students

In 1972, Doug Wright started a program known as the U.S. Special Police, though here on campus they are known as Security. Presently he has three male employees working as special police.

The requirements of a special police are to have graduated from the academy and worked in and with public relations. Their jobs are to protect lives and public property.

One position is left open for a female security, to aid and counsel female students that need advising. They also have four female and three male students security police working on campus. They are required to be on good standing, attend class, keep up their grade point average and not to be a public nuisance.

Wright said that the special police, with the help of the student security police, get a lot of work done when more than one campus activity is held. Other than that they patrol the campus, check buildings, check into criminal investigations, and for the benefit of public relations, assist off campus.

They patrol bars, not to arrest, but to assist students who are unable to make it back to the dorms and the same assistance goes for the students who live off-campus. If hostile, the student will be talked to; if persistently violent, that individual will be taken downtown to the Judicial Law Enforcement Center.

One small problem Doug Wright stresses is that students who own cars should register them with the security, so they could be called up and repark their cars if they are needlessly parking within a prohibited area. If the security is unable to contact that person, their vehicle will automatically be towed away to Hillcrest, \$18 for the tow, \$1.50 every eight hours in storage.

They also have a Lost and Found Office, so if you have any lost article or personal possession that has been missing over 24 hours, that's the place to look. The same goes for any type of article found on campus. Report it to the security office that's located in Parker Hall, Phone 841-6560, Extension 417.
