2 quarts, and now putting some
up with oranges they are fine
and I am putting up some
tomatoes with apples and
raisins and spices. they are
better than good. Dad is working

nights this week. You should
have been here last week
all the car went passed our
house the other side of the Park
was closed to traffic. they are
putting in a sewer on the
street back of us. believe me
we had some dirt. couldn't
keep the house clean, dirt
and in 5 minutes it was
white again. Wish you were
here. I am Lonesome we
have had company all
summer and now we have
been alone for 2 weeks
and I can't get out any
where it seems pretty
long some times. Write soon
and tell me all the news.
Was glad to get your letter
write often. Hope the falling
is coming fine. Love. Emma
