We have much land at our

that you shall not have land
sufficient for you, and your
children after you. We would have
you to fix your minds here and
here alone and when ye come
to live up here, we desire that
you would not hearken to the
invitations of other nations,
who may invite you to go further
back.

Brethren, we say let your minds
be at ease, be not troubled but
come and settle down in peace
and live in peace forever
