Georgia May the 22nd A.D / 1864
my dear sister Charlotte I received you very
kind and ever welcom letter which came to my hand
this morning, and i was very happy to hear from you once
more and to hear that you are well and your family so
and your letter never found me better since i have been
a soldier and the boys are all well and tuff we are a
terro to the foe and the pride of our brigade but we
are seeing some ruf time gest now i tell you i
will try and tell you a little about our marching
for some time back perhaps it will be interresting
to you well we left lookout mountain Tennessee
the 2 day of may for the front halting at
night in Ringgold Georgia and on the 5 of may
i was on picket there we left Ringgold the 7
and was in sight of bushy Knob the rebels done
on the 8 i being on the skirmish line and hearing
firing betwene us and the rebels and on the 9
we march for the rebels breastworks at 4 o'clock
10 men wounded and killed with 4 rods of me
by rebels shells not a great deal of fighting on
the 10 we being on the battle ground on the 11
we march all day on the 12 at night goin

through snake gap on the right off our column our men and killing cattle hogs and Chickens
and on the 13 in line of battle my self at night anything we can lay our hands on to eat and
with some others goin back 7 miles after rations now we have orders to take 5 days rations
for our men geting back to my reg the next leaving to morro morning knowing not
morning after trubling all night on the 14 and in the where we go some thinks we go to richmon
afternoon having 51 men killed and wounded in our we are not far from atlanty now drivin
reg that same night about midnight the rebels the rebels before us we turned over every
charge on our breastworks and then fell back bring your knapsacks yesterday caring nothing
and on the 16 we march into erieay after them but our gun and rations having orders to take
my self walking over about 500 dead rebels anything we want on the way that we come
on the field of bletter on the 17 we march all a crost killing cattle dogs plundering
day and half of the night goin through ~~land~~ burning all that we can sister this
~~of all kinds of fields of wheat and corn thulchoon war will not last much longer and as~~
we had a smart skirmish mornin meny for abba she may kiss my goly Star Spar
and killing some on the 18 we march over baner ass i have used his well and have
500 anchors of wheat all most ripe and corn ben soft with his long enouff fearing
takeing dinner by a rebel turn yard then i shold offend his but if that is the way
marching half of the night goin though she use me she may go to hell and if she
Arid a rebel Citty on the 19 marching dose not like my style she can doe the other
all day and half of the night at noon on thing she sent me a letter the other day she
the same day wilders bregade passus did not write only a few lines she said
me then goin though kingston and on the she was in such a hurry she did not
20 marching all day burning rebels saltworks have time give my love to Norland
and take carely prisoners on the 21 reading Johnson
