

London Friday. th 25 September 1857.

My Dear Son. I received your letter the 29th of August My Dear Boy I was glad to hear from you Tom I was proud to hear that you are a great deal better when you wrote last hoping that I shall hear that you are quite well when I hear from you again Tom I see that you are in a fare way to do now hoping you will still keep in the same way of doing well Tom I must not grumble my self at present and I am truly thankful to say so Tom I tell you that I have not been to N^o 1 since I left them nor them to me nor I never shall go there again I do not think without my mind do alter very much indeed Fanny and John is of age but I shall tell you when I see you.

The reason that I do not go and see them Tom I
see that my Cousin Elizabeth is still to be
found Tom it will be a long time before she
will do for you what I have done for her and
she has been anything but kind to me or you
and your poor Brother ever in not writing to me
a bout you too and herself now my Dear Boy a bout
your half and half black girls I think they will
be to much for you for now you will
see that I have seen Jane Stroud why I see that
you and her have got a little sucking kindness
for each other Tom dont be in to much of a
hurry with your darkeys Tom mind do not
be too much of a deceiver with the Girls.

My Dear Boy if you rember when you left me
I told you not to get a wife before you saw

me again with I hope you will not do so I do not
think about one myself yet. - Emily and me
is doing on pretty well together Give my love
to all Relations and except the same yourself
