

Varni to Launch Junior Orinda Fire Department

Orinda is to have something new, a junior volunteer fire department, according to an announcement this week of Fire Chief Joe Varni. Always alert to the need for greater fire prevention, Varni believes that the boys of the community can be as helpful in this respect as they have in safety work through the nationally famous junior traffic patrols. "Young people are quick to learn," he says, "and we plan not alone on teaching them the rudiments of fire control but we hope to make them fire conscious so that they share in prevention work, today and in the future."

The junior fire department will be open to all boys of the Orinda Fire District under fifteen years of age. Those wishing to join up should either write or see Chief Varni or they may call at the Fire House and register. Members in good standing will be provided with badges and it is planned to have fire drills at regular intervals, particularly during the fire season. As a reward for their efforts, Varni plans to coach the department in the latest fire fighting technique and each junior fireman will be given a ride on one of the fire engines, always a thrill to young or old.

COTTON CONFLAGRATION CAUSES CONSTERNATION

Two hundred men fought fire for six hours on Saturday, July 22, before a grass fire was under control in the Cotton Ranch area. Wind and hot dry weather were chiefly responsible for the burning of 105 acres. It is to the credit of the Orinda Fire Department, that the damage was confined to the destruction of grass, brush and some trees, but no residences.

Owen Townsley was overcome by smoke and heat, but recovered shortly afterward, and Stanley Dorrington suffered superficial burns about the hands.

According to Fire Chief Joe Varni, the fire started when a resident with a permit started to burn some trash. Sparks were blown into the dry grass and the conflagration resulted. Chief Varni urges all Orinda residents to co-operate with the Fire Department by obtaining permits to burn, and to exert the utmost care in the prevention of fires.

Roughly, the boundaries of the Orinda Fire District are the Tunnel on the west, the top of Charles Hill on the east, Sanborn Road on the Moraga Highway to the south, and the Bear Creek road to the north. This district supports the department at a cost of 19 cents in the tax rate.

The department at present consists of Chief Varni, Assistant Chief Al Ritchie, and fourteen men. We give you their names because you ought to know them: Owen Townsley, Robert Patterson, Dan Lucas, Geo. Rasmussen, Tom Benicasa, Wm. Everets, Clyde Nelson, Bert Dawson, George Robbins, Lee Ru Lon, A. MacDonald, Bill Therkildsen, Art Memmeseimer and Bob Dawson. These men are paid 75 cents an hour

ASSOCIATION MEETING TO DISCUSS FIRE PREVENTION

Fire prevention will be the theme of the August meeting of the Improvement Association, according to President Ralph Sisson. A representative of the Fireguard Corporation will speak of fire prevention in the home and Fire Chief Joe Varni will explain the work of our fire department and local fire regulations.

An informal party has been arranged by Mrs. E. R. Taylor, entertainment committee chairman, for the latter half of the meeting. There will be cards and dancing, with refreshments served by the hospitality committee.

Board Calls For Bids On School Bus Routes

Owing to the fact that last year's budget provisions did not and could not anticipate the rapid increase in demand for pupil transportation, it was legally impossible to contract for bus transportation service. The only available means was to pay the parents on the basis of a specific amount per pupil day transportation. The bus transportation was, in effect, in the hands of the pupils and not guidable by the Board of Trustees.

This circumstance was not merely the costliest method but also precluded reasonable routing.

There are now under careful consideration various means by which this pupil transportation may be inaugurated on a sound basis, allowing for logical extension with the population growth and increased assessed valuation. Initial bids for basic routes have been called for and received to offer a more accurate appraisal of basic costs. Additional bids will soon be advertised, also including bids for suitable school buses, to enable the Board to determine with accuracy comparable costs and transportation services both under contract and school bus ownership. Last year's bus transportation expenditures became progressively higher with the rapid increase of transported pupils, and the total amount expended was therefore less than would now be involved by continuing that extensive transportation service, even though under contract.

Members of the School Board do not intend to avail themselves of this Association publication to respond to the totally erroneous and anonymous attacks made upon it recently in two of the initial issues of a newly instituted Orinda publication.

EDITORIAL

Milton W. Dobrzensky, as guest speaker at the last Improvement Association meeting, presented some figures that should slow down anyone who has imagination enough to picture what they mean. One out of every twenty adults will be killed by an automobile in the next five years. During the last six wars in which the United States was engaged, 245,000 were killed, but 441,000 have been killed in peace time traffic.

The human body can withstand most blows occurring in accidents where cars are going not more than twenty-five miles per hour, according to Dobrzensky. Within the hilly areas of Orinda, where roads are narrow and turning sharply, let us think more about what chances we have if we have to come to a dead stop and less about getting down to the Crossroads in nothing flat. Remember that there is a very good chance of another car coming around that narrow turn, and that he will be more surprised than you to find you in the middle of the road. Give him a break as well as yourself, and drive slowly and ON YOUR SIDE OF THE ROAD.

August Garden Suggestions

This is the time to plant your biennial and perennial seeds. Columbine, delphinium, campanula, anchusa, begonia, foxglove, petunias, lobelia and salpiglossis should be started now. Some bulbs, such as freesias, grape hyacinth, scillas, iris, callas and watonias may be planted now.

Fruit trees need plentiful irrigation and any dead wood should be removed. If you have a peach or nectarine tree infected with curly leaf the danger of the trouble spreading or recurring lies in the falling leaves. Don't allow any of the diseased leaves to lie on the ground. Gather them all and burn them. If the leaves are allowed to remain on the ground the fungus spores are carried into the ground to the tree roots and then go up into the limbs again. Lopping off the limbs will only disfigure the tree. Instead, burn all the diseased leaves and spray in the spring with a fungicide.

Pinch back the chrysanthemums now and transplant the English daisy, coreopsis, cosmos, foxglove, candytuft, phlox, petunias, French and African marigolds, violas and pansies.

DO YOU KNOW?

THAT—Burning is allowed in the Orinda Fire District only between 7 A. M. and 10 A. M. and only after a burning permit has been issued.

THAT—Orinda is in the Third Township of Contra Costa County.

THAT—The Contra Costa County's tax rate was reduced five (5) consecutive years during the depression. An accomplishment that has been publicized throughout the entire nation.

THAT—The assessed valuation of the Orinda School District increased \$370,000.00 during the past year.

THAT—Out of the fifty-eight counties of all classes in the State of California there were only eleven (11) that had a lower 1938 tax rate than Contra Costa's, and out of the counties of the same class only three (3) had a lower tax rate. Those three were Fresno, Orange and San Mateo counties.

THAT—The Orinda School District will have three (3) voting precincts instead of one for the 1940 primary election.

This was the statement of Milton W. Dobrzensky, president of the East Bay Safety Council, who was the guest speaker at the July meeting of the Improvement Association. Speed is the chief factor charged to accidents, according to Dobrzensky, although other contributing causes are: slow or careless pedestrians and unskillful drivers who frequently drive on the wrong side of the road, turn without signalling, drive off the road, and do not know how to park on a hill.

while fire fighting with an hour's minimum on each alarm. Regular monthly drills are required for which they are paid at the same rate. There is always a driver on duty at the fire house; there are five drivers in all, two for each truck and one relief.

There are two fire trucks, one a modern piece of equipment which can pump 350 gallons a minute. This truck also carries an emergency supply of water of 350 gallons for use in those sections where no hydrants are available. The other is a hose wagon which carries 250 feet of 2½-inch hose and 1,000 feet of 1½-inch hose.

The fire hydrants in the district have standard connections so that in an emergency equipment responding from adjoining districts could be used. Hydrants are installed as rapidly as the assessment value of the property they serve permits. The service charge to the district is \$39.60 a year for each hydrant, whether used or not.

In addition to actual fire fighting, the department carries on extensive fire prevention work, annually inspecting each residence in the district for potential fire hazards. Burning permits are required and may only be issued after a thorough inspection. Yearly incinerator permits are also granted, subject to inspection.

Brief facts—it costs a minimum of \$20 to respond to an alarm—two blasts on the fire siren during the day indicates the possibility of a serious fire—two blasts are always blown at night to be certain that all volunteers hear the signal—the recent fires caused by the power lines resulted from shorts caused by dirty insulators during foggy weather; no lines fell. Since then the power company has had a crew of men at work cleaning and repairing all insulators and faulty equipment. In addition to the regular department of fifteen men there is a supplementary force of unpaid volunteers for emergencies. Varni is glad to have you turn out on alarms if you are prepared to assume the role of fireman and not spectator, but you are urged to keep all roads and streets clear for the free movement of equipment.

Just one final word. The department badly needs a pulmotor; the nearest one now is in Walnut Creek. The cost is only \$250 including instruction for six men—a cheap price for a life. When Joe Varni asks us to respond for a raffle or some other money-raising device, let's get in there and pitch.

Editor's Note—Two years ago, George Pitt originated the idea for The Stroller, and up to the last issue all of The Stroller's columns were written by him. With the appointment of the new staff, Pitt hands over his duties to a new Stroller, who will continue to write as he did, anonymously.
