

New High School Faculty Finally Selected By Board

Eleven new teachers to comprise the faculty of the Acalanes Union High School have been selected by Stanley Warburton, principal, and the board of trustees. Four hundred applications were received by the board for the new positions.

Commercial subjects will be taught by Sara Woodyard. Stanley Walgren has been employed to teach social subjects. Biological sciences and girls' physical education will be taught by Margaret Nicholson. Assigned to teach boys' physical education is Erwin Mattson. Martin Rauhat will fill the position of teacher of music and Spanish. Marie Markel will hold the position of English teacher. Miss Lily Lahti will be instructor of art, English and also will serve as Girls' counselor. The instruction of languages, Latin, French and Spanish will be carried on by Rose K. Ambrose. As teacher of shop, mechanical drawing, and gardening Elmo Heard has been selected. Henry Knight has also been employed as an instructor.

John Hopkins, who has been employed this past week by the board to teach science and mathematics, is from Redlands where he has been teaching in the high school there. He is an amateur radio fan.

The board announces that it will now advertise for bus bids. The bus route in Orinda will start at the junction of the San Pablo Highway and the Bear Creek Road, will go down the highway to Miner Road, up Miner to the Rheems Corner, will retrace its steps to the highway, go through the village and up Camino Sobrante to the club, and back again to the highway. On the other side of the Cross Roads, the bus will go as far as the store at Canyon, then back through Moraga to the Cross Roads, and on to the school.

The construction of building is going according to schedule. The walls are now being erected as reported by Melvin Jacobus, member of the board from Orinda.

TRUSTEES TO BE CHOSEN

An election will be held at Orinda June 7 for two vacancies on the board of trustees of the Orinda Union Grammar School. The candidates who have filed are Mrs. George Bennett of Camino Sobrante and Stuart Campbell of Dias Dorados, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Ernest Mathy last spring.

Association To Hold Election of Officers

Announcement of the new officers as selected by the nominating committee, under the chairmanship of D. C. Jones will be the chief item of business at the meeting of the Improvement Association to be held at 8 p.m. at the Orinda School on June 7. The election of officers will follow the report of the nominating committee.

President Ralph Sisson announces that he expects to have a complete report from the roads committee, which will submit the by-laws of incorporation for the new Home Owners Association for the approval of property owners.

Mrs. Frank Bryant will give a final report of the work done by herself and her committees for the Fiesta, and will submit the financial returns.

Warren Harrold will give a report of the Fire District and will endeavor to show what the district means to the average home owner at Orinda. Joe Varni, Fire Chief, will give a short talk to impress on everyone the necessity for fire prevention this summer.

The meeting will be brought to a close by the installation of new officers, followed by an informal reception to welcome them.

WATCH FOR SUMMER FIRES

Because of the unusually wet winter and the subsequent growth of grass and weeds, this summer the danger of fire will be augmented, according to Joe Varni, Fire Chief. Starting June 1, written permits to burn trash will be required, and those not complying with this rule will be subject to fine. No fires may be started after ten in the morning.

Inspection of homes and gardens for fire hazards will start June 15 by the fire department. Residents are requested to clean out all trash and waste and to clear dry grass away from buildings. Fuel tanks must be at least 50 ft. from buildings if they are not enclosed in a galvanized iron box.

According to the fire department, most of the fires in the past have been due to carelessness, tossing cigarettes out of cars, starting rubbish fires without due precautions, etc. To remind the community of the imperative need for caution this year, there will be signs posted warning against the danger of fire.

The Orinda Volunteer Fire Department has 15 men on duty day and night. To answer the phone at the fire house Mrs. Alfred Ritchie is on duty, with Mrs. Memmesheimer as relief.

April the twenty-sixth saw the Orinda women crown a new champion. Mrs. R. H. Chase won her way to victory with easy victories over her opponents, each match ending on the fifteenth green. Mrs. H. D. Costigan, a champion in 1934, was the runner up.

ROAD PROBLEM DISCUSSED

Plans for the formation of a Home Owners' Association to handle the road situation here was the recommendation of the roads committee report made by Clarence Fleager at the May meeting of the Improvement Association. According to the report, the American Trust Co. which holds the mortgage on the holdings of the Hacienda Homes properties, expressed itself willing to turn over to such an association the rights now invested in Hacienda homes, Inc. to administer and care for the roads and to restrict buildings.

On the motion of Warren Harrold, the Association gave the committee a vote of confidence. It was the further business of the roads committee to draw up the by-laws for such an association and at the next meeting of the association they will be submitted for a vote. Such an association would be organized as a non-profit corporation and by a vote of 51% of the property owners it could be adopted.

The new officers for the coming year will be selected by the nominating committee which was elected from the floor. D. C. Jones heads the committee, which consists of Martyn Warner, Mrs. Richard Cross, Warren Harrold and Walter Christie, Jr.

President Ralph Sisson read his annual report which was accepted by the organization.

William Fleager announced that the First Aid Course to be given by Dr. Feiler of Lafayette would be held at 8:10 p. m. starting May 15 for ten weeks and was open to anyone free of charge. Fleager also announced that he was negotiating for a SLOW sign at the Crossroads. A petition to control the granting of liquor licenses was also circulated by Fleager.

JUNE GARDEN NOTES

Because of the hot sun, June tasks in the garden are headed by the watering of the soil carefully and sufficiently. Peat mulches are a real aid in keeping the soil moist. Give the spring flowering shrubs and azaleas and rhododendrons extra good soakings.

Iris clumps older than 3 years can be divided now. Primroses may be separated, as may chrysanthemums which should be pinched back after planting until about the first of July. Tall growing plants like delphiniums, hollyhocks and dahlias should be staked and tied now. Climbing roses and clematis should be pruned after the flowers are gone. Dahlia tubers can be planted for late bloom. Japanese irises are blooming at the specialists and they can be selected and dug and moved this month. By hurrying, glads can still be planted.

TRUSTEES REVISE AND CLARIFY RULES

In the April "Orinda News" were published rules and regulations as approved by the Board of Trustees, Orinda Union School District, governing the use of the school building, and other matters.

The problems involved are greater than generally understood, therefore, through trial it has been found necessary to revise and clarify some, also to add others.

The Board has approved the following, effective at once:

1. Regular Board Meetings are scheduled for the second Friday of each month at 7:30 p. m., Orinda School.

2. The following persons should be consulted on matters noted:

Finance—Donald Badgley, Orinda 3441.

School Grounds & Physical Education Equipment—Stuart Campbell, Orinda 3796.

Faculty, Transportation, and Civic Use of the School Building—Reuben Chase, Orinda 5561.

Matters to be considered before Board, legal, records, etc.—Owen Dibbern, Or. 5661.

3. It is requested that the public refrain from telephoning the principal of the school or the custodian on any of the above mentioned matters.

4. The Board of Trustees and the school faculty welcome visitors to the school, but request that they confine such visits, where practicable, to after school hours (2:30 p. m.).

5. CIVIC USE OF BUILDING & ROOMS—

(a) Specific space will be assigned for those activities permitted at the school.

(b) The use of the school building during school hours (9:00 a. m. - 2:30 p. m.) for any use except regular elementary school use is definitely to be discouraged, and will in no case be permitted except in rare, specifically approved cases, under conditions where no interference with regular school work occurs. In the latter rare cases, should such interference develop, permission will be revoked.

(c) Activities within the school building on Sundays are definitely to be discouraged, however will be approved in rare specific cases.

(d) Application must precede use by at least 48 hours, and be made on form provided, copies of which can be secured from the Custodian, or from the Trustee in charge of Civic Use. Custodian will not permit use except when in possession of such application form duly approved and signed by the Trustee in charge of Civic Use. If more convenient, application may be telephoned to the trustee in charge of Civic Use, who will fill out the form and deliver it to the Custodian. In such cases, Sponsor must sign the application form, when presented by Custodian, BEFORE USE.

(e) DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of these Rules and Regulations:

Sponsor—Individual making reservation, and who accepts responsibility for reasonable conduct of those attending, and care of property.

Commercial—Cases where an individual or group charge admission fee or dues greater than necessary to cover expenses, and keep such overage for personal profit.

Private—Cases where special or private invitations are issued to individuals selected by the Sponsor or others, usually few individuals.

Semi-Private—Cases where special or private invitations or "bids" are issued or sold to a wide group, selected by the sponsor or others.

Public—Cases publicized and open to the public without special or private invitation.

Publicized—The act of posting notice and public invitation in at least three public places, at least 48 hours before meeting or function, or publishing public invitation in the Orinda News or any public newspaper at least once every three months.

FIESTA RETURNS SHOW PROFIT

Three hundred and seventy-six dollars was the net return from the Fiesta held over the May 10 week-end under the auspices of the Orinda Improvement Association, according to the report of the Fiesta chairman, Mrs. F. D. Bryant.

Merchants in the community donated the many prizes which were given at the Children's Parade, at the dance and at the horse show. Approximately 150 children participated in the parade. Among the prize-winners were Joan Harris and Judy Givens, Sally Tinkham, Katie Gibbons, David Woods, Peter Wilkin, Maile York, Joyce Herzog and all the boys who participated in the Junior Firemen section.

The dance at the Orinda Country Club was presided over by Gladys St. Louis, the Fiesta Queen, and her attendants, Velma Edson, Barbara Herzog, Geraldine Hart and Barbara Mattes.

Much interest was shown in the horse show, the first of its kind in the community. Many beautiful horses were entered, including the sheriff's posse of Contra Costa County. This show was held in the grounds opposite the school which was graded for the occasion by courtesy of Vernon de Ago.

LOST, STRAYED OR STOLEN

Three wooden wagon wheels loaned by Geo. Brockhurst for local color at the Fiesta Dance held at the Orinda Country Club on the night of May 11. To date Brockhurst has been driving his well known wagon equipped by iron wheels, which look not at all right. The Fiesta Committee, to say nothing of Brockhurst, would be very grateful for the return of the three wheels.

(f) Uses—types permitted, or not permitted:

(1) Commercial—not permitted.

(2) Private—not permitted.

(3) Semi-Private—not permitted. EXCEPTION: Minors are permitted use for dances—no charge for use.

(4) Public—is permitted for Educational, Recreational, or Civic Betterment use; IF PUBLICIZED, no charge for use. EXCEPTION: Use is permitted for Civic Betterment purposes only, even though not publicized—no charge for use.

(g) House rules will be posted in the school building, which must be observed.

(h) The Board of Trustees reserves the right to deny the use of the school building to any individual or organization wilfully breaking the House Rules, or otherwise (in the judgment of the trustees) acting contrary to public interest.

(i) Reservations will not be made for longer period than six months in advance, and in case of conflicting dates, will be approved in order of receipt.

(j) Any but the most simple decorations must be removed within reasonable time, under reasonable conditions, preferably at once after use. Those left will be removed by school district employees, and charge made to the responsible sponsor, for time necessary for such removal. Type of decorations must be approved before installation, to prevent health and fire hazard.

(k) Breakage, spoilage or damage other than ordinary wear and tear will be charged for at cost.
