NEW GAS MAINS

Division Manager Announces Route of Natural Gas Main Extensions in Orinda Territory

We have been requested by the Orinda Improvement Association to give you an outline of our present extension of gas service in the Orinda and neighboring terri-

The route of the extension out of Walnut Creek is as follows: from Walnut Creek along the highway to Lafayette with a distribution system around chief residential streets in Lafayette, thence up the lower Happy Valley Road to the junction of the upper Happy Valley Road back to the Tun-nel Highway along the upper Happy Valley Road, then westerly again along the Tunnel Highway to a point near Charles Hill. From this point we follow a private right of way meeting the Orinda properties at the head of Las Aromas Street, we then proceed through Orinda along Las Cascades following the west side of Lake Cascade to Camino Sobrante thence along Camino Sobrante to the San Pablo Highway, thence southerly along (Continued on page 2, col. 1)

Post Office Plans House Numbering in Orinda

With the unusual activity in building, the post office is faced with the problem of proper numbering of the boxes now served by the rural carrier. Any changes in the route of the carrier to serve new patrons are likely to necessitate a number of changes in the box numbers of those who now have service.

With the realization that this is very unsatisfactory both to the post office and to the patrons, a plan is under consideration to furnish definite house numbers to all residents in the same manner as in the cities. This will make it possible for everyone to have a permanent post office address so that mail may be directed to their proper street and number. This will not only simplify the mail service but will make it much easier to locate addresses.

A committee from the Improvement Association is meeting with Mr. Dunlap of the Berkeley Post Office, in an effort to work out a satisfactory plan of numbering.

Orinda School District 1937-38 Tax Rate

From figures obtained from the County Auditor's Office the 1937-38 tax rate for the Orinda School District varies from \$2.282 to \$3.522 per \$100.00 of assessed valuation according to the location in the school district. However, in the improved or greater part of the District, the rate is \$3.522 per \$100.00, made up as follows:

Last year's tax rate was \$3.435 and in comparison each of the above tax levying bodies have either lowered or remained the same with the exception of the High School, which is increased.

San Pablo Highway to the southern boun-

dary of Moraga Estates with a distribution system in the major streets of this latter subdivision. We also plan a main up Canyon Drive on the west side of San Pablo Highway in Orinda up as far as the Twin Springs Trail thence back down Ardilla Road to the San Pablo Highway.

From these mains in Orinda we will be able to reach adjacent homes and those on connecting roads which are within a reasonable distance of these mains. As building progresses in the future throughout this territory we will extend our mains accordingly. The gas served here will be the same as is served in the balance of Contra Costa County, that is, natural gas of 1150 B.T.U. content per cubic foot.

Highlights of Last Meeting

The last meeting of the Orinda Improvement Association showed a growth of 188 members from that of 45 members three months ago.

Discussion of our local sanitation problems was conducted by Mr. R. R. Dennis. There was a general sentiment in favor of having a County Sanitary Inspector appointed by the Board of Supervisors for the purpose of preventing improper or insufficient plumbing facilities being installed by new home builders and also tor advice in established problems. A bond issue sufficient for installation of sewage disposal for this district is not possible at present since we do not have a large enough assessed valuation. Anyone wishing to know more of the problem may obtain the State Bulletin on Septic Tanks by writing to Sacramento.

A letter was written by the Association to the Board of Supervisors requesting that the unfinished part of Wildcat Canyon Road (about 2 1/6 miles) be surfaced so that we might enjoy this new outlet through the regional park.

Mr. W. D. Scott reports that the Telephone Company is engaged in laying a new cable into Orinda from Berkeley. It represents quite an expensive piece of work but is a necessary improvement in order to provide better service and care for the increasing number of subscribers.

Mr. Warren Harrold brought to the attention of the Association the fact that some time in the future Orinda will reach the point where a need will arise for a larger school and possibly something in the nature of an auditorium or town-hall. He emphasized the fact that the school is already small and that in order to expand more grounds will be needed. The feeling is that now is the time to consider a site for these future needs. The most desirable location for the purpose would be the piece of ground which lies directly across the road from the school and is owned by the East Bay Utility District. Since there is no other suitable property available it is important that we do some "town planning." If this property could be secured from the Utility District under title or a long term lease, it would insure to us the advantages of having a community owned piece of property, for the lack of which many small districts like ourselves are definitely handicapped.

History of the Orinda P.-T.A.

The P.-T.A. of Orinda has had its thirteenth birthday! On Sept. 19, 1924, parents friends and teachers of the Orinda Union School met at the little red schoolhouse for the purpose of organizing a P.-T.A. Mrs. C. P. Woodbury was elected president. There were sixteen charter members: three of these were men, Mr. Brockhurst, Mr. E. W. Jensen, and Mr. T. C. Kendall. Mr. Brockhurst was elected treasurer.

By October, the treasury consisted of \$6.40, which sum had been increased to \$30.65 by December as the result of a benefit whist party at the home of Mrs. T. C. Kendall.

By June of the following year the treasury boasted \$102.81, eighty dollars having been raised by a dance at the school auditorium.

By November of that first year, 1924, new members were added which included Mr. E. I. deLaveaga, Mr. F. W. Enos, and Capt. H. Oakley. Then, having fathered their offspring and watched it past its first toddling steps, they left it to the care of the ladies, for no longer do the names of the men appear on the membership lists.

The first philanthropic work of the organization is tinged with a bit of humor. The sum of \$5.00 was to be donated for "Near East Relief." Acording to the minutes, "the president announced that the following Sunday was "Golden Rule Sunday" on which day each family should serve the exact meals which the children of the Near East must eat each day-and send the money thus saved for Near East relief. It takes \$5.00 to feed one child for one month. Instead of pledging to observe "Golden Rule Sunday" Mrs. Macey moved, and Mrs. Wheeler seconed, and the association voted to donate the \$5.00."!

The first Father's night was celebrated on the evening of Founder's Day, February 1925. "A number of fun-provoking stunts were performed. The fathers trimmed their wive's Easter bonnets. A pillow-case race between the ladies and men followed-and the men won . . . Supper was served at long tables, and Mrs. Woodbury cut the birthday cake. Mrs. Rowland of Walnut Creek told fortunes . . . The total amount derived from these 'extortion' schemes was \$12.50.

But the early spontaneity of the thrill of a new venture began to pall as the years went on. Interest lagged and attendance dwindled.

Now, however, with our growing com-munity we have a thriving P.-T.A. with renewed interest, especially on the part of some of our newer members. Mrs. Geo. A. Harrison has consented to be Vice-President and Mrs. F. Allen our new Secretary and publications chairman.

Our garden-party was a great success, sending us off to a good financial start, so with 36 paid up members and everyone's cooperation we look forward to a successful year in spite of the fact that no one remembered to say, "Happy Birthday"!
