Tunnel Opening

Plans for an appropriate celebration in conjunction with the opening of the Broadway Low Level Tunnel are progressing rapidly. At a meeting July 14 of the Committee to perfect plans for such celebration, ideas were tentatively outlined and two committees were appointed, one to arrange the ne-cessary finances and the other to work out a suitable program for the occasion. Among those appointed to these committees were Supervisor H. L. Cummings, Contra Costa County; Harry Silver, Walnut Creek; Geo. Meredith, Lafayette Improvement Association, and Lowell Berry of our own Associa-

A joint meeting of these two committees was held Wednesday, July 21st. At that time the Finance Committee completed tentative arrangements for a budget totalling \$4,000.00, which was estimated as sufficient to cover all needs of a worth while program and luncheon. These funds are to be raised by contributions from the Board of Supervisors of Alameda and Contra Costa Counties and by further donations from the cities of Oakland and Berkeley.

Engineers in charge of work on the tunnel project estimate that the tunnel will be ready for opening early in October. With this information, it was decided that the opening ceremonies would be held on a Sunday, either October 3 or 10, subject to further information from the engineers as to when the tunnel will be completed.

The Program Committee has tentatively arranged for a luncheon to be held at the Hotel Claremont and for appropriate speeches, music and fireworks to be held at both the Oakland and Contra Costa entrances of the

Further plans are to be perfected at a second meeting of the two committees to be held at the Lake Merritt Hotel, Wednesday, August 4th. -Lowell Berry.

Brief History of Orinda

The following article tells us the history of the naming of Orinda, the source and meaning of the name, and a bit of the romance surrounding the occasion.

Many of us find our previous information has been unfounded, and our surmises and conjectures faulty.

unfounded, and our surmises and conjectures faulty. To give us this correct knowledge, Miss Carmel Martinez has made an exact and exhaustive research to discover all possible information on the subject, condensed in its present form to meet the limited space of our little paper, the ORINDA NEWS.

For the benefit of those who might like to read further on this interesting subject, the sources of Miss Martinez's study are given at the foot of the article.

And for the benefit of those who might like to read more of John Marsh, the tragic, untimely death of his adored little schoolteacher wife, Alice's mother, and of the exciting, early days of this county, we recommend the reading of the vivid story of "John Marsh, Pioneer" by Dr. George Lyman.

ORIGIN OF THE NAME "ORINDA"

The name ORINDA literally came across the continent in the saddlebags of Dr. John Marsh.

One September night in 1856, Dr. Marsh moved into the room at the head of the stairs in his new home in Contra Costa County. He arranged his favorite books according to his liking: Paine's Works, Samuel Johnson's LIVES OF THE ENGLISH POETS, the Odes of Anacreon, and a French Bible. For thirty-two years he had carried them with his Harvard diploma, strapped in his saddle-

bags, across a wild continent. They were his oldest and only friends, according to his biographer. A few nights later he was found brutally murdered and robbed, a mile and a half from Martinez.

His four year old daughter, Alice, grew up in unsympathetic surroundings, protected by watchful courts against scoundrels who were after her estate which had trebled in

Sometime in the succeeding years she found in Volume I of her father's LIVES OF THE ENGLISH POETS, a brief life of a lesser poet of the 17th century, Katherine Philips who wrote under the pseudonym of THE MATCHLESS ORINDA

When her husband, Wm. W. Cameron, bought 3000 acres from the Castros, Alice called the land ORINDA. The conclusion is obvious. Incidentally, William Cameron was the son of the Rev. John Cameron whom Dr. Marsh had known years ago in New Salem. John was a first cousin of Ann Rutledge. At the time of the Cameron-Marsh friendship in the East, Abraham Lincoln was boarding with the Camerons while he worked in the village store.

Katherine Philips' biography under the title THE MATCHLESS ORINDA was published in 1931 by the Harvard University Press, as a continuation of the series of

Harvard Studies in English.

Orinda, whose name was Fowler before her marriage to James Philips, was born in London in 1631. In her poems, she persistently talked of friendship. Orinda's friendship, according to her biographer, had a pecular meaning. He calls it "the Platonic mingling of souls." She believed that two friends were designed for each other. Friendship like love, can only be at home in the "gentle heart;" so fine is friendship that ordinary people cannot perceive it:

"A wonder so sublime, it will admit No rude Spectator to contemplate it.' Nowhere in the 313 page biography, or in briefer accounts of her life, is explained the origin of her pseudonym. However, it is known that she gave her friends semi-classical names such as Palaemon, Valeria, Ardelia, Lucasia, Rosania, and herself, Orinda. Orinda, it is known now, is not of Spanish

origin, but of Latin, according to Harper's Latin Dictionary - Orinda, a, fem. gender, borrowed from the Greek opivons meaning Ethiopian bread.

Strange as it may seem, the word Orinda originally came out of a cook book written in the third century. In Volume 2 of his ten volumes on cookery, Apicius Caelues wrote in old Latin and translated into the following modern Latin by Father Owen, of the College of St. Albert, the first reference in print to the name Orinda. Previously it was

known under its Greek name Opivons. ORIDIAM-legendum, Orindam. Quod panis genus est ex quo conficitur, semen, Aethiopiae peculiare sesamo persimile, quod conquentes usufaciunt vel usufaciantur.

Translated to mean:

ORIDIAM-which ought to read Orinda, which is a seed, like the sesame seed, employed by cooks, from which is made a bread peculiar to Ethiopia.

One can only guess where Katherine Philips found her pseudonym. Possibly while poking her head into books on Latin in her search for names for her friends, she found it. However, this discovery must have been made before she started writing poetry. From the beginning, in her poetry, she refers to herself as ORINDA.

At the age of twenty she wrote the poem, "To My Dearest Lucasia," in which she names herself:

But as there are Degrees of Bliss So there's no Friendship meant by this, But such as will transmit to Fame Lucasia's and Orinda's Name.
