School Building News

Plans have been approved for the construction of the school building and the work will soon start. There will be six splendid class rooms and two large basement play rooms which will also serve the Boy and Girl Scouts and other community purposes. An enlarged auditorium with roomy stage and adequate lighting, equipment and dressing rooms will afford facilities for community meetings. There will also be a new kitchen. All the supplementary rooms necessary are provided.

2.48 acres of land will provide ample play grounds. Due to the tremendous amount of grading (some 30,000 cu. yds. of earth are being moved) the expense for the yard is large but the result will be a fine playground.

A part of the earth removed is being used in highway construction, thus making an asset out of what would have been a heavy liability. Drainage has also been a big item.

All of the grading is being done at a small expense to tax payers. — The county lends equipment and the WPA furnishes the labor. Our bond issues total \$65,000. The Federal and County agencies have contributed over \$100,000. The community will get a fine school plant at a fraction of its value.

New Highway Project

Orinda Highway, from the Junction to Camino Sobrante is to be widened to make a three-lane road and the bad curve is to be straightened. It seems that the School Board foresaw this project and left a strip available for the added right-of-way where the new wall has been built. The remainder is to be acquired from the present owners. This work is being done without cost to Orinda taxpayers. It will be another notable achievement. The line of trees which the community installed along this road, by individual contributions and not from Improvement Association funds, will all have to be moved, but we are told plans contemplate "balling" all the roots so the trees can be replanted without injury.

\$ Fiesta \$

The Improvement Association really got into big business with its Fiesta. Gross receipts amounted to \$632.12, of which \$361 was represented by ticket sales; \$196.80 by games and wheels, and \$68.55 by raffle of the doll. Expenses amounted to \$261.27, of which \$116.45 was for refreshments and \$62 for orchestra. The net gain was \$370.85. Our congratulations to Mrs. Hayward and all the members of her committee and thanks for their splendid work.

Suggestion for Sewer System

The State health service is checking up on sanitary conditions, and with that in mind, the American Legion Post of Lafayette has appointed a committee to see what can be done to provide sewerage for the district from Orinda to Walnut Creek, including Moraga in one comprehensive unit. This committee consists of Mr. Stanley Smith, Supervisor Cummings and Colonel Smetten, the latter being a construction engineer connected with the Western Pacific Railroad. They have been in communication with Colonel Lowe, Regional Director of the W. P. A., who has become sufficiently interested to promise engineering service for a complete survey of conditions and to report as to the practicability of the plan. It is possible that with the help of the W. P. A. a plan can be devised which will come within the financial ability of that district. Everyone knows that before long our sanitary conditions must be improved, but this suggestion has 'broken' unexpectedly soon. It would be a grand improvement if it is practical.

Registration Notice

Do not let your Election Registration Lapse

ATTENTION, NEW RESIDENTS—
and also old ones who have not registered.

Ordinarily those who are entitled to vote generally wait until just before an election to register.

Orinda, and when I say Orinda, I mean the entire Orinda School District, is a fast growing community and it is especially important that all within the district register NOW, as it is, FIRST, a fairly accurate index of our population, and SECOND, it is a determining factor as to whether two, three or more voting precincts are necessary for our next main elections.

Those entitled to register must be 21 years of age at the next succeeding election, a citizen of the United States ninety days prior thereto, and a resident of the State one year, of the county ninety days and of the precinct forty days preceding such election. If you had registered but did not vote at the last election, you must register again as failure to vote cancels your registration. Your registration is permanent only in case you do not miss voting at any primary or general election. REGISTER NOW.
