RURAL MAIL BOX IMPROVEMENT WEEK

Postmaster Frank M. Whiting has just been advised that the week beginning May 5, 1941, has been designated by the Post Office Department as "Rural Mail Box Improvement Week." He has requested the cooperation of all residents in this area for improvements in condition and appearance of rural mail boxes.

Unightly rural mail boxes detract from the natural scenic beauty along highways and are not a credit to the owners of attractive homes served through the boxes. Rural mail boxes which are not properly erected or which are not in good, serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to damage from the elements.

It is the desire of the Department to encourage patrons of the rural delivery service to provide entirely suitable mail receptacles and to erect them in such manner that they will be accessible to the carrier and present a neat appearance. It is especially desirable that the boxes be maintained in such condition that they will properly protect mail placed therein, that the names of box owners be inscribed on the side of the boxes visible to the carrier as he approaches them, and that the boxes and their supports be kept painted. Boxes, regardless of type, should, of course, be of such design and in such condition that there will be no likelihood of the carrier injuring his hands when serving them.

Mr. Whiting has been requested to make a tour of inspection at the conclusion of "Rural Mail Box Improvement Week" and he expects to make a report to the Post Office Department of any improvements which have been accomplished in the condition and appearance of the boxes.

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COUNTY NEWS BRIEFS

The State has okayed an \$18,000.00 expenditure for the Tunnel Road between the Tunnel and Walnut Creek. The work to be done includes grading, widening and channelizing the Moraga and Orinda Cross-roads.

The per capita cost of Government in Contra Costa County for 1939-1940 has been fixed at \$25.66 per person. According to figures released by the California Tax-payers Association, the above figure is lower than the per capita cost of the previous year 1938-1939, which was \$26.46 per person.

The Rheem Manufacturing Company has received an order for \$3,051,657.00 for fabricated practice bomb bodies for the United States Government.

The County defense unit organized with Chairman Buchanan and Sheriff Miller as District Co-ordinators together with fifteen others, will form the skeleton set-up which will function in the event of war-time emergencies.

Contra Costa County is to have more shipyards. California Todd, in addition to their present shipyard now under construction at Richmond, expect to build another. At Antioch, a \$1,000,000.00 contract for Navy mine sweeps has been received and this shipyard will soon start humming. Port Chicago expects to open a shipyard in the near future and employ 3000 men.

FOR
BOMBED CHILDREN**

"The net proceeds resulting from the recent Grand Benefit Dance to aid the bombed children of Britain exceeded our expectations," is the report of General Chairman Alan Young. The net proceeds totaled \$475.00

The dance held in the large auditorium of the Acalanes Union High School on March 15th was attended by more than 500 adults and high school students.

Among the highlights of the evening was the appearance of the Piedmont Highlanders Kiltie Band with their director, Glenn "Brick" Johnson, all dressed in their colorful regalia and taking part in the fun and dancing following their appearance on the program. Art Linkletter made an early appearance and remained in attendance until the latter part of the program when he personally conducted the awarding of door prizes with a personal and very candid interview of each winner. Linkletter also acted as auctioneer and extracted many additional dollars for the children's benefit.

Acalanes High School band opened the floor show with the National Anthem, and there followed in rapid succession a galaxy of talent obtained from the school and surrounding communities. Barbara Warfield and Lois Cabus offered an accordion duet which called for an encore, and Peggy Ross presented a monologue in true Acalanes style. Phyllis Hammond, accompanied by Jocelyn Gibson at the piano, sang "Loch Lomond." The Highlanders' program was completed with the entire bagpipe band playing the accompaniment to the highland fling danced by Joan Fernhoff and Jocelyn Gibson.

Dance music was provided by the ten-piece orchestra of Bill Struble, well known at Yosemite, where they have played for the past three seasons at Camp Curry.

"The success of our dance is due entirely to the energy and resourcefulness of the many committee members, the merchants of our several communities, the trustees, faculty and students of Acalanes, and the free services of those who participated in the program," was the statement of Steve Perkins, who served on the general committee and headed the publicity and program committees. "Everywhere we turned we were received with enthusiasm and the expressed desire to lend a hand with this democratic endeavor to help those children who are today suffering this war's most ghastly toll." The extent of aid did not stop with the conclusion of the dance, for there are several individuals and organizations who have volunteered to "adopt" children by pledging \$2.50 per month or \$30 per year to the "Save the Children Fund." Pledges are being received by Alan Young, No. 1 Via Hermosa, Orinda.

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**WARREN HARROLD
HOUSING AUTHORITY DIRECTOR**

Warren Harrold resigned his position on March 4, 1941, as a commissioner of the Housing Authority to accept the position of Secretary-Director for the Authority. The salary for this position was set by the board at \$4200.00 per year.

His first work is to make a county-wide survey of Low-rent housing needs to determine the market for such housing. The organization for this survey has been completed and the work nearly finished.

Federal funds in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 has been earmarked to construct projects throughout the county if the survey shows a market for such housing, and the application is approved by the United States Housing Authority.

If the application is approved, much planning and constructing work is the next step, a step Warren likes and is capable of handling to completion.

Officers of the Troop held a Green-bar Conference this month at which much was accomplished.

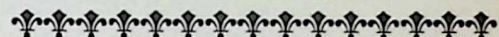

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**ACALANES
BOND ISSUE**

The Board of Trustees of the Acalanes High School have voted to call an election Friday, April 18, for a \$70,000 bond issue to be used in the construction of more classrooms. The present school was designed to accommodate 350 students. The population of the district, however, has increased with such rapidity that 500 students will be desiring enrollment in September.

If the bonds are voted, three units containing three to four classrooms each will be constructed for \$20,000 each. The additional \$10,000 will be used to purchase furniture, shop, household and laboratory equipment. If the bonds do not pass, it will be necessary to build one unit anyway, and the money for this will have to come out of direct taxes. This will mean that the present taxes will not be reduced. It is probable that, with the passage of the bonds, present taxes will undergo a reduction due to the fact that a longer period of time with a lower interest will be possible. Passing of the bond issue has been recommended by Mr. Joseph McFarland, executive secretary of the Tax Payers' Association.

Orinda residents will vote on the issue Friday, April 18, at the Orinda Grammar School, between the hours of 1 and 7.

ORINDA GRAMMAR SCHOOL NEWS

Easter vacation begins at the Orinda School, Saturday, April 5, and closes Monday, April 14, according to Mrs. Doris Parks Mace, principal.

Mrs. Mace also wishes to announce that it is now time for mothers with children who will enter the first grade in September, to notify the school. The minimum age requirement for first grade children is five years and six months at the time of entrance. All entering children must show birth certificates. Mothers may write, telephone, or call in person to make the notification. The Orinda School telephone number is Orinda 4221.

Parents and members of the community are once more being reminded to use the lower driveway only, when driving or parking at the school during the day time. Observance of this rule is necessary to protect the children and to facilitate the bus transportation. A traffic squad made up of school children is being formed at the present time to help in the loading and unloading of the buses.

The sycamores in front of the school which were removed or damaged during the road construction have been replaced. Plants to be used in beautifying the school grounds are being supplied by the Moraga Valley Nursery.

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YOUR GARDEN AND MINE

Spring is here at last, or from the looks of things, you might say, early summer. The winter rains have packed the soil to such an extent that it will be necessary in many cases to soften the surface with water before it can be worked. This is an excellent time to apply Gypsum so that next winter's rain will not be able to pack the soil as heavily as it did this year.

Do not feel that the planting season has been ruined due to the sudden transition from winter to summer. Practically all of the nurseries will have those favorite trees and shrubs established in containers so that you may extend the planting season well into the summer period.

The effects of the heavy rains during the winter are becoming apparent on those shrubs that naturally grow on the lighter soils. Some of these will put out new growth and then wilt and die back, due to the fact that the roots were drowned. If the wilting is not too severe, you may save the plants by cutting the tops back quite heavily. The few roots that have been close to the surface will produce new tops. This will be slow and will not always produce as fine a plant as you had before.

Fragrance in the garden may be prolonged far beyond the flowering season of Daphne by the use of Viburnum Carlesi or Korean Snowball, the fragrant mock orange, Philadelphia Virginal, and following these, the French Hybrid Lilacs. Speaking of fragrance, did you notice the pleasing scent of the Oregon or California Grape in bloom? This is an added value to the beautiful holly-like foliage which they display the year around.

Garden colors will soon be changing from the soft pastels of early spring to the more robust colors of summer. One of the first to herald this change is the Chinese Azalea Mollis, which is deciduous and very hardy. This Azalea tolerates not only cold in the winter, but withstands much more sun during the summer than a great many of the other varieties. This delightful Azalea comes in a wide range of colors, from an occasional lemon yellow through the apricot shades to deep orange.
