# Letter from School Trustees

ORINDA NEWS Orinda, Calif.

Gentlemen:

Will you be kind enough to print this letter in the next issue of your paper?

After several months of investigation and discussion, the Board of Trustees of the Orinda Union School District, of which the writer is a member, have passed by a unanimous vote, a resolution of vital interest to everyone in the school district. The resolution in brief is as follows: "To add four new classrooms to the present building, to repair and modernize the old building, to install a central heating plant, to purchase land adjoining the present school property to the north with a highway frontage of three hundred and fifty feet, this land to be graded and used for a playground and athletic field and to call a bond election to finance the same."

The Board of Trustees is anxious that everyone in the Orinda School District should know the conditions and facts that prompted passage of the resolution. With that thought in mind, a member of the Board of Trustees will attend the next regular meeting of the Orinda Improvement Association to explain the proposed changes and answer all questions.

# Get Your Tree Started

The long barren stretch from the Tunnel Highway to Orinda has been a blight upon our reputation for natural beauty. But finally the community has arranged a means of joining hands for the accomplishment of beautifying this roadside with shade trees.

An arrangement has been made by the Improvement Association, whereby a sufficient number of trees may be purchased, planted and watered thru the necessary period for the cost of \$1.20 per tree. Plane trees or European Sycamore have been selected for the planting, since from all the varieties suggested, these were the only ones not objected to for any reason. Also this variety is fast growing and will be uniform with the ones now lining the road along the Country Club

# Sectional Committees

It is a stimulating and thrilling experience to be part of a rapidly growing community as we have all realized during recent months. But as most of us have also realized it is an experience that presents many problems. For example, in the days when Orinda was a smaller community, our Orinda Improvement Association could care for almost any situation touching the welfare of any householder by taking up the problem at a regular meeting and handling it as a committee of the whole.

There were so few members and the attendance at the meetings was so constant that everyone knew as much about every situation as everyone else and thus no time was lost in explaining over again all that had occurred. Many of the earlier achievements of the Improvement Association were accomplished by discussion and action by all the members of the Association at the regular meetings.

Last Spring, however, we all realized that this was no longer possible. Many problems affecting the lives and welfare of residents in one section of our community are of only passing neighborly interest to members of another region. Membership in our Association has grown with amazing rapidity. Our average attendance is now between sixty-five and a hundred and often those who attend one meeting have not been present at the meeting before and thus are not immediately conversant with all the details of the business that has been carried on. The best solution to a situation of this sort in an unincorporated community where we have no elected and paid officials is found in a series of sectional or regional committees. Each committee is empowered to handle the details of the problems affecting the residents of a particular section. After all these details have been thrashed out and at least an approximate solution reached the committee Chairman can then report to the whole Association and thus obtain the backing and sponsorship of the entire community. The time and trouble saved by this method appeals to all of us.

In addition to the sectional committees a committee was created to publish the "Orinda News" which binds us all closer together by telling all of us what is going on in our community. In another section of this month's issue, the names of the Chairmen of the various sectional and regional standing committees will be published. If you have constructive criticism, helpful suggestions, or some special problem that you wish to bring up, write directly either to the News itself or to the individual committee Chairman in whose section or to whose section your communication would apply. He will take the matter up and then when you come to the monthly meeting of the Orinda Improvement Association you will be prepared to act on large issues unconfused by minor detail.

One last word, the "Orinda News" is proud and happy to publish communications and articles of interest contributed by members of our Association, and by residents and property owners in the community. Do "let your light shine."

MINUTES. This enables a commuter to arrive at his office or place of business by 8:30 A.M.

One seems to whiz through the tunnel and over the Bridge, AND with congenial

Home? Well, that's interesting, too. The Commuters' bus (and special) leaves the Terminal at 4th and Market Streets, at 5:15 P. M., stops at 2nd and Harrison Streets, arriving there about 5:23 P.M., giving you a choice dependent upon the location of your office or place of business. "Market Street Railway" cars run frequently after 5:00 P.M.

along 2nd Street to Harrison.

The regular commute rate is \$13.52 per month, but FOR A PERIOD OF NINETY DAYS, in addition to the regular commute book, the company is trying out public response to a thirty ride family book good for six months, costing \$7.80. Many commuters do not work on Saturday so even if two "family" books were purchased during the month the cost of transportation in the final analysis would be about the same. For those men who travel, or who may be out of town for a few days, no "rides" would be sacrificed and if members of the family wished to go to the "city" (either one) the book could be

The designated "Bus Stops" in Oakland (Commuters' Bus) are College and Broadway, and 40th and Broadway. The regular scheduled Bus trips during the day, i.e., ex-clusive of the Commuters' Bus, go through Oakland proper—14th and Broadway and thence to San Francisco, returning the same

There probably isn't a family in Orinda, some member of which does not plan on going to San Francisco fifteen times in the next six months. Don't you think it would be a capital idea if you would NOW purchase one of those family commutation books (remembering the ninety day trial period), to show the company which has furnished us with this splendid service that we are for it in a big way? Purchase one from the Bus driver or from the company office because there is probably no community in the Bay district so favored with a luxurious bus service.

Mr. H. A. Mitchell, President of the Sacramento Northern, is very cooperative, courteous and responsive in all the meetings we have with him. The Bus schedules will be enlarged in proportion to resident response in Orinda. That is only fair.

Hardly any use now to drive your own car in order to commute. Quite an unnecessary expense unless the schedule doesn't "click."

Let's support the Bus because it brings to Orinda a service we have long needed.
