His large, faded red and white sign remained painted on a warehouse-type building between the Hazel Parker Playground and Vanderhorst row for years, long after the business had capitulated.* / W.T. Miller 1900 W. A. Hutchinson *commission merchant* / D.L. Thompson *contractor and builder* / The Charleston Cider and Vinegar Factory *Although not listed in the city directory, an article at the time of the West Indian Exposition informed all that this company "advertised the best ciders and vinegars on the market, the purest to be found." The company was owned by Hutchinson and Skinner and was one of the first to make white vinegar. In ciders it produced produced apple, cherry, blackberry and orange and also a Blackberry Bounce.*
