Entrance to the garden is through a decorative wrought-iron gate that opens onto a winding flagstone path filled with a variety of shade-loving plants. Excellent representation of the intent of the original design. Walkways have been widened, and semi-circles added for aesthetic interest. New fence replaces the lattice fence on Construction detail of 1965. Pool and statuary are important elements of design in addition to brick edging which acts as a pathway.

<b>Curr_descr</b>	Symmetrical in design. Initial garden room is elliptical. Second garden room is circular; pool is major focal point. Low pierced brick columns, placed perpendicular to the main axis are located between second and third garden rooms, walls serve as transitional element between form sunny two rooms and informal shady third room. Final third room is paved with brick; plantings of azalea, camellias, and hydrangeas as well as other shade plants. Small pool and several garden benches add a sense of tranquility. Excellent bones provided by brick edging and evergreen shrubs. Statuary and urns provide important focal points. New fence creates architectural walls and backdrops to planting beds.
