

**SIXTEEN BEDON'S ALLEY**  
**c. 1779-1790**  
**Residence of Sandy Mohlmann**

**2001**

This house was probably built after the great fire of 1778 and before 1790. A cooperage factory was next door and this may have been its office. In the early 1800s, this street was a commercial center. Charles Fraser mentions that the earliest single wholesale merchant in Charleston was Whitefield and Brown in Bedon's Alley.

Originally this brick and stucco building had only 2 stories with a center first floor street entrance. Perhaps this is why the front façade windows are not quite in balance with the three on the first floor and two each on the second and third. The third floor was added before the 1886 earthquake.

After the cotton industry led businesses to upper King Street where large wagons could more easily maneuver, this area declined, and from 1892 until 1977 this was a two apartment rental unit.

In 1977, Count Pehr Sparre purchased the building and converted it into a single family home. He commissioned Philip Simmons, Charleston's premier artisan, to execute the wrought iron inserts for the wooden gates. The precise design of a shield bearing a chevron topped by a crown was provided by the Count.

### DINING ROOM

This room was added after the earthquake of 1886. Notice the thickness of the outside walls (36") by noting the entrance from the reception room.

The wallpaper dates to the 1940s and is still available from Burnswig and Fils (pronounced Fee).

**SUNROOM**

This room was added in 1987.

Armoire, pine, Alsace, French, c. 1895

Pilaster, Charleston, fluted, with original paint

Stand, French, antique, wrought iron, used for stacking copper pots and pans

Cabinet door, old French, with original paint

**GARDEN**

Exit through Walled Garden. The entire garden is planted with white blooming plants and flowers.

The pond and fountain have been restored and have the two lion statues and lion foundation head that were left by Count Sparre's family (symbol of the family coat of arms).

To the right of the pond, notice the old slave grave markers that edge the flowerbeds. The white fluted column is pre-Revolutionary.

Note the False Variegated Holly bushes. *Dipliodenia* - rare and unusual.

Antique iron gate hanging next to the pond is from Natchez, and the iron stars having below are Charleston earthquake bolt covers.
