

109 Smith Street**Julia Ann Rutledge Kiett House***Constructed after 1880*

This small frame single house was built for Julia Ann Rutledge Kiett, wife of Wade H. Kiett, a black school teacher.

121 Smith Street**David Riker House***Constructed 1853-54*

David Riker, a real estate developer, built this two-and-a-half story single house of wood on a high brick basement.

134 Smith Street**John Bickley House***Constructed c. 1855-59*

This large masonry house was built by John Bickley as a rental unit. Bickley lived at 64 Vanderhorst St. The first known occupant of this house was Col. John Cunningham, an attorney.

Although it was converted to apartments in the 1920s with incompatible additions, the house retains much of the original interior detail in the florid style of the late 1850s.

SOCIETY STREET

Society Street is named for the South Carolina Society, which bought property along the street in 1759. Part of the street was originally named Centurion Street in honor of one of the Lord Anson's ships.

32 Society Street**Gabriel B. Browne House***Constructed 1846; rehabilitated 1968; façade restored 1990*

Gabriel B. Browne built this substantial brick single house after purchasing the site in early 1846. The house has unusually large, well-proportioned rooms.

36 Society Street**Henry Street House***Constructed 1840*

Henry T. Street, a well-to-do commission merchant, built this large Greek Revival double house of stuccoed brick upon the raised brick basement of a wooden house built c. 1804 by blacksmith John Gardner, which was destroyed in the Fire of 1796. The double flight of entrance stairs was added in 1968, when the house was rehabilitated.

40 & 42 Society Street**Juliana Dupre Houses***Constructed 1850s; restored and rehabilitated 1961, 1980s*

Juliana Dupre built these two stuccoed brick houses as rental properties. The house at 42 Society St. was built c. 1850, and the one at 40 Society St. was built c. 1854.

43 Society Street**Robert M. Venning House***Constructed c. 1845*

This three-and-a-half story brick residence was part of a complex of buildings that Robert Murrell Venning, a Christ Church planter and factor, constructed on land cleared by the Fire of 1838. Surviving Venning family houses include 43 and 46 Society St. and 58 and 60 Anson St. Family tradition said that Venning constructed 43 Society for one of his sons as a wedding gift. It remained in the Venning family until 1863.

44 Society Street**Isaac Reeves House***Constructed c. 1840; rehabilitated 1962, late 1980s*

Isaac Reeves built this small brick house, set deeply in a large garden.

46 Society Street**Jonah M. Venning House***Constructed c. 1840*

Jonah M. Venning, a lumber merchant, factor, commission merchant and member of a prominent planter family of Christ Church Parish, purchased this corner lot in 1820. Venning, who lived in a house he built at 40 Charlotte St.,
