Residence of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson H. Brockinton Jr.

This Georgian revival style, brick two-story residence sitting on a high basement was built for Bishop Carouthers of Charleston and for many years the dwelling was occupied by a succession of bishops. It was sold in the early 1970's to a private owner, and the current family, the second owners have lived here since 1984.

HALL

The usual Colonial Revival floor plan has a central hall running from the front to the rear of the structure. This is an especially generous one in its width and opens the entire house to much light and air. A porch running across the back catches the southern sun and the prevailing western breezes.

LIBRARY

This room is furnished with comfortable seat furniture. Notice the wall of bookshelves on one side. It is a wonderful gathering room for the family.
