

OF TO-MORROW.

President Mitchell to Deliver Address on Great Cavalry Commander—Veterans of the Confederacy and Local Military Companies to Take Part in Ceremonies — The Monument and Its Inscriptions.

The granite shaft which the Daughters of the Confederacy are erecting to the memory of Gen Wade Hampton on the east side of Marion square will be unveiled to-morrow afternoon, the exercises beginning at 4.30 o'clock. The monument, a simple shaft standing on a base, is not a pretentious one, but the tribute is none the less sincere on the part of the ladies who have worked hard to raise the funds to erect the shaft. The unveiling exercises will be presided over by the Hon James Simons. Dr S. C. Mitchell, president of the University of South Carolina, will deliver the address. The Rt Rev Bishop Wm A. Guerry will offer the invocation. The Charleston Chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy and the several camps of the United Confederate Veterans will be present. The military companies of the city, under the command of Col Julius E. Cogswell, will serve as a guard of honor.

Col Julius E. Cogswell, 3d South Carolina Infantry, has issued orders to all of the local military organizations to parade on March 28, incident to the ceremonies of the unveiling of the Hampton monument.

The troops will form on Marion square at 4.15 o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

The following are the inscriptions which appear on the four sides of the shaft to the memory of Gen Hampton:

Front face:

Wade Hampton.

1818.....1902.

Right hand or second face:

Colonel Hampton Legion, S. C. V., 1861.
Brigadier General Confederate States Army, 1862.

Major General, 1863.

Lieutenant-General, 1865, Commanding Cavalry of The Army of Northern Virginia.

Reverse or third side:

A stone of memorial

set up by

The Daughters of the Confederacy,
Charleston, South Carolina,
1911.

Fourth or left hand face:

Governor of South Carolina,

1876

1878

United States Senator,

1879

1891
