

Georgetown Man Appointed Kanuga Business Manager

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Oct. 11. (AP)—Appointment of Willard P. Verduin as business manager of the Episcopal church's Kanuga conference center was disclosed today.

Verduin is now in land management work with the West Virginia Pulp and Paper company, at Georgetown, S. C.

In his new post, he will do jobs formerly performed by the superintendent, the Rev. John Pinckney, of Greenville, S. C., and the property manager, Rufus Honeycutt, who has been at Kanuga about 40 years.

In announcing the appointment, the Rt. Rev. M. George Henry, bishop of the Western North Carolina Episcopal diocese and president of Kanuga, said Pinckney would now be able to devote his full time to his parish, St. James, in Greenville.

Kanuga, near Asheville, is the church's largest conference center.

Lail, Returned From The Dead, Lands In Jail


COLUMBIA, Oct. 11. (AP)—Herman O'Neal Lail came back from the dead today and they put him in jail for non-support.

Officers said Lail, 23, turned up suddenly at his mother's home here yesterday. Police had thought him dead since September 18, when he disappeared on the Congaree river during the night.

The last seen of Lail, police said, was when he rowed into the darkness in a waterlogged boat. No trace of the craft was found when officers dragged the river and searched the banks for 13 miles downstream.

Acting on a tip, officers went to the home of his mother, Mrs. Pearl Braxton, and discovered the missing youth. They quoted him as saying he had to leave town suddenly. His friends knew he was gone, he said, and should have told his family.

Officers said the non-support charges had been pending since
