He was born in St Louis and came here with his family when he was three years old. He went into business at the age of 19 operating a shop known as Uncle Harry's Pawn Shop. In 1920 he became a supplier of building supplies under the name Harris Livingstain Co. dealing in general merchandise, hardware, plumbing supplies, lumber, sash and doors. The house was a refuge for any relative who needed a home. He died in 1935 and a relative, Leo Livingstain continued the business with lumber and other materials used in home construction.*

He bought his meat on the hoof and killed and dressed it himself. In this way he was in position to positively guarantee what he handled. He had prime fresh beef, mutton, veal, lamb and pork as well as salted and smoked meats of fine quality and flavor. He also kept a fine display of poultry and vegetables in season. A specialty of his was pure leaf lard.*
