GEORGE LOCK BUILDING

23 State Street

c. 1853

Residence of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas W. Rash, Jr.

This property, a large two story brick structure was built by George B. Locke, a successful grocery merchant. It is thought he constructed it for rental purposes since he had other businesses in Charleston and lived on George Street with his large family. After his death in 1852 the property changed hands a number of times and for many years a tin shop manufacturing roofing, guttering and stoves was located on the first floor with the family on the second floor.

The current owners purchased the property as a double residence and transformed it into a single house. The interior design captures the delight of a period structure with 21st century conveniences. Note fine recreation of period ornamentation throughout the house.
