



New Apartments For Elderly Scheduled To Open Sept. 15

It's rare that apartment dwellers share characteristics with their neighbors, but the residents of the new Ansonborough House apartments will have at least one thing in common: their age.

Each of the 77 new apartments between Society and Wentworth streets behind the senior citizens center at 259 Meeting St. will be reserved for residents at least 62 years old.


An inspector from the Department of Housing and Urban Development visited the new building Tuesday on the first of a series of inspections that will check finishing details on the apartments that were built with a \$3,679,000 grant from HUD to the Charleston Area Senior Citizens Inc.. HUD will also give rental supplements so that lower-income residents can afford to live there.

Four of the 77 apartments will be twobedroom units for handicappped residents who might need a caretaker to live with them, said Joan Barnes, executive director of the senior citizens center. The other 73 units will have one bedroom each, and some are modified for the handicapped. "We have not rented them all yet," said Russell Long, vice president of the Charleston Area Senior Citizens Board of Directors. The apartments are due to open Sept. 15, and rental applications are available at the senior citizens center.

There are some special features that set the new apartments off and make them especially convenient for senior citizens, Mrs. Barnes said. Shorter residents should be able to answer the door without standing on tip-toe and craning their necks, since a thoughtful designer put the peephole lower on the door.

Slippery showers or baths are steadied by the addition of handrails in strategic locations. There are modern kitchens, plenty of storage and fairly large windows to take in the Charleston view. In addition to 24-hour security, a call system connects each apartment to the building manager's office.

"I've been to a lot of senior citizens' housing in Florida, but none of them has taken advantage of the outdoors like we have," Mrs. Barnes said. Landscaped patios with a nearby game room and kitchen, as well as bathroom facilities, will make the ground level a gathering spot for apartment dwellers, she said.
