Karen -

I was trying to email some pix to you, but they are too large and get bounced back. So, I've posted them to DropBox and will send a link to you in a minute.

I met with Bill Zidlick this morning. His family lived at 17 Elmwood Ave. for a few years right before the Citadel demolished it for a parking lot. He had a few pictures that showed parts of Hampton Park Terrace, and he was nice enough to let me scan them.

I think you'll be able to figure out which ones are which, so here are the basic descriptions.

1. One of the photos shows a close-up of Bill's wife's head. The front gable of 17 Elmwood Ave. is behind her. The photo is nice because it shows the detail of the front porch. Pretty simple features, but I like the small window in the front gable. It has a Colonial ogee-window sort of style to it with a little tracery in the frame.
2. Another picture shows Bill's wife on the brick walkway of 17 Elmwood Ave. Again, nothing great, but it does detail the front porch details. It had simple brick posts on which square, framed columns were constructed and had a simple rail.
3. Another one shows Bill and his brother on the street. The house at 17 Elmwood Ave. is barely seen to the left, but it is a nice streetview of Elmwood anyway, and it shows the metal roof of Elmwood.
4. Another one shows Bill and his wife. The photo was taken in front of 17 Elmwood Ave. (which is not in the picture), but it shows some porch details of the neighboring bungalow at 15 Elmwood and the rear of the corner house at 560 Huger St. (with a rear staircase in place because the Condons were using it as a rental).
5. Another one shows a family member in front of 17 Elmwood Ave. looking across the street. Nothing really notable there, but you can see 16 Elmwood's side porch on the left and the rear of 554 Huger St. to the right.
6. The last one is just a photo of Mary Murray Blvd. in Hampton Park. No buildings are visible, but it is a nice shot.

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All of these were taken in 1965.
