E. Description of physical appearance:

This is a simple three-story Charleston single house built of brick, covered with stucco. The house contains three bays on the East Bay Street elevation and bays on the Tradd Street elevation. Its second-floor waterfront elevation is covered by a slate roof, characterized by a central triple sash window and handsome wrought-iron balcony, added when the house was restored in 1927. The house has little interior woodwork, probably owing to the building's partial commercial use, and subsequent neglect in the late 19th century.

The front room on the third floor retains an original wood mantelpiece in a simple, late Georgian style. The west room on both the second and third floors contain identical, possibly mid-nineteenth century mantelpieces of black marbelized wood with silhouette medallions. (See attached photographs)

F. Statement of significance:

This three-story dwelling commands a sweeping view of Charleston Harbor. Although this house dates from the early part of the 19th century, it is not the first building to occupy the site. It stands on part of Lot No. 6 of the "Grand Modell", or early plan of Charles Town. The lot was divided in two, and in 1694, the northern half on the corner was granted by the Lords Proprietors to Samuel Williamson. It later belonged to John Allen, and his wife Ann. The great fire of 1740 partially destroyed the building then standing, and Allen sold the lot and what was left of the structure to Alexander Hext, a planter. It must have passed to his relation, Hugh Hext, because by 1769, Hugh's widow advertised it for sale. In 1774, she sold the corner, which then contained a dwelling house and store to Robert Wells, an editor and bookseller.

It was while Wells owned the corner that it was again swept by fire in 1778, and the building was destroyed. By 1800, the corner lot and the adjoining lot on East Bay belonged to Thomas Barksdale, who left them to his daughters, Mary and Sarah. Judging from its architecture, the present structure was built soon thereafter. Upon Sarah's death, the two lots went to Mary, and after her death, they reverted, by the terms of her father's will, to other relatives; namely, James Macbeth and his wife, Cornelius Huguenin and his wife, George B. Edwards, E. J. Edwards, Charles O. Hammond, and Elizabeth Hammond. They sold the corner house to Wienholtz in 1855. The lower story contained a store and the upper floors were used as a dwelling. In 1878, the house was sold to J. H. Patjens. In 1914, it was acquired by the Sea Valley Realty Co., who subsequently sold the house to Mrs. T. W. Punnett. Mrs. Punnett restored the house in 1927. It was the first house in the neighborhood to be restored.

During the restoration, three cannon balls were found embedded in the brickwork of the house. They are believed to have been fired from Union guns at Fort Johnson during the bombardment of 1863-64.
