Kevin,

Thanks again for reaching out yesterday and providing me with an answer to my question about the attached photo. I'm going to attach two that we have that are architecturally interesting to Charleston.

The first you've seen. In the photo, top right, is my great grandfather, Thomas David Dukes (1887-1966). He was born in the Orangeburg/St. George area and the family moved to Charleston in the early 1920s. The two little girls are his daughters, Lurline Dukes Metts (1917-2002) and LeVeta Beatrice Dukes Burnsed (1919-2002).

The second photo is of my grandfather, Joseph Preacher Dukes (1933-2005). He is standing in front of the home he grew up in at the corner of Anson and Hasell Streets. There was apparently an A&P store there at the time as you can see from the photo. They lived on the second floor of the building and at that time it had huge piazzas and a detached kitchen house off the back. I have a few additional photos of the porches and kitchen house if you think those would be of interest to the archivists.
