Furlong who started the business was very active in city affairs serving as alderman from Ward 7 for 12 years with terms in the first and second administrations of Mayor John P. Grace and of Mayor T.T. Hyde. He was a charter member of the Knights of Columbus, a member of Hibernian Society, the Charleston Rifle Club and the Elks. He married Julia L.
