

THE GADSDEN HOUSE: LANDMARK IN AMERICAN HISTORY

The Medical Leech Museum and Gadsden House Antiques are housed in the historic Gadsden House, one of the finest examples in America of a brick single house of the Federal Period. Part of the ground floor is available for viewing.

The Gadsden House was built in 1800 by the Revolutionary War hero **General Christopher Gadsden** (1724-1805) for his daughter Mary.

Gen. Gadsden is best known for designing in 1775 the Revolutionary flag, called the 'Gadsden' or

'Rattlesnake' flag which bears the motto '**DON'T TREAD ON ME**'. This flag became 'the most popular symbol of the American Revolution' and predates the 'Stars and Stripes'

adopted as the official American flag in 1777. If you look closely you will see the rattlesnake on each of the main gates at the front. Christopher Gadsden's grandson James Gadsden (b. 1788) negotiated the **GADSDEN PURCHASE** in 1853.

The Gadsden House was also the residence of **Dr Benjamin Bonneau Simons** for about 20 years until he died in 1844. Dr. Simons was a Huguenot from Charleston who became known as 'the leading surgeon of the South'. Dr. Simons was one of the first doctors in America to pioneer Jenner's vaccine against smallpox.

Unlike a number of brick buildings in Charleston, the Gadsden House survived the Charleston **Earthquake of 1886**, the most destructive earthquake in the United States until the San Francisco earthquake in 1906! In September 1989 the Gadsden House suffered damage by Hurricane Hugo, another chapter to a remarkable building!




MEDICAL AND RELATED ANTIQUES



The **Medical Leech Museum** uses the fascinating medicinal leech to trace the social history of medicine from the days of the barber-surgeon to modern times. Since the pre-Roman period the surgeon was also the barber and his universal treatment was bloodletting. The unusually high standard of decorative arts displayed in this world unique museum is a pleasant surprise to all visitors. Exhibits range from live leeches to paintings and porcelains as well as to bloodletting instruments. The oldest items in the Leech Museum are Etruscan bronze 'leech brooches' from 9th Century B.C.!!

On display is a unique collection of delightful 17th-19th century caricatures with bloodletting and leeching themes. For lovers of modern art come see Max Ernst's collage 'Here come the Leech Charmers'. The Leech Museum contains many fine ceramics from around the world, including the world's largest public collection of exquisite 19th Century leech jars. Also on display is an unequalled collection of bleeding and barber's bowls dating from the 17th Century. These include Chinese and Japanese export, Dutch and English delftware, faience, maiolica and Staffordshire. The collection encompasses a highly informative selection of ceramic styles and techniques, including lusterware, salt-glaze, tin-glaze, pearlware, stoneware, etc. A veritable history of ceramics!
