



THE ROBINSON-AIKEN COW-HOUSE 46 ELIZABETH STREET, CHARLESTON, CHARLESTON COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA

THIS SMALL MID-NINETEENTH CENTURY BUILDING RESEMBLES A GARDEN PAVILION IN DESIGN AND LOCATION. THE ONLY SURVIVING PART OF AN IDENTICAL PAIR, IT FORMS PART OF A TOWN HOUSE GROUP WHICH REMAINS VIRTUALLY COMPLETE.
