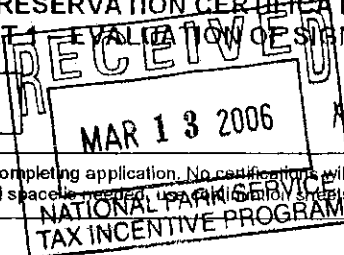

5. Description of physical appearance:

#2 Zigzag Alley is a frame single house, two-and-a-half stories in height, with a two-tier piazza along its south elevation. The rectangular building is set on a low foundation, immediately against the west (front) and north property lines. The gabled roof is clad in standing-seam metal, and has three gabled dormers along the south ridge and a boxed cornice with partial returns at the front and rear ends. The weatherboard siding of the main building is continued at the very plain piazza screen wall. The piazza has Tuscan columns and turned balusters, which were retained when the upper level was enclosed with flushboard siding. The principal entry has a narrow transom and sidelights. Double-hung wood sash windows are a mix of 6/6 and 9/9, which appear to be replacement sash installed when the rear addition was constructed.

The characteristic rear (east) wing was slightly narrower and lower in height than the main building, and the piazza wrapped around the back of the house to the wing. Sometime after 1951 (Sanborn map), a small dependency was removed from the rear of the property, and a two-story addition to the house was constructed. The rear bay of the piazza was incorporated into the addition, which extends to the south as a one-story wing. Because of its scale and location, the addition does not affect the integrity of the historic building. It is easily read as a typical Charleston single house with a later rear extension.

The interior of 2 Zigzag Alley retains its historic plan and some historic fabric, including heart pine flooring, molded wood bases, window and door surrounds, the front parlor mantelpiece, and a heavy turned newel at the stair. Most wall and ceiling surfaces are finished with mid-20th century replacement material which is simply detailed and compatible with the historic interior.

6. Statement of significance:

#2 Zigzag Alley is a good example of a late-nineteenth century frame single house. It retains integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, and contributes to the significance of the Charleston Historic District.

As #2 Lightwood Alley, the property was rated as Category 3: Significant in the 1973 Feiss-Wright inventory of Charleston. Category 3 is described as "Good architectural quality... Vernacular... Of less sophistication and refinement than "Excellent." Modest, appealing, curious, interesting. To be retained and protected."

Zigzag Alley is a narrow dead-end street running north from Atlantic Street. Its 19th century name was Zigzag Alley, but it was later renamed as Lightwood Alley (the earlier name for the east portion of today's Atlantic Street). In the early 1970s the name Zigzag was restored to the alley.
