

Interview with Creighton Frampton
January 19, 1993
McLeod Plantation

- 1- Indian mound exists on James Island at "Three Trees". Indian pottery in house came from Wappoo River and Country Club area
- 2- Dr. Wilder visited the plantation c.1930, he was in Union Army, 55th regiment, his operating room was upstairs
- 3- 1922 last time planted cotton *(W.E.M. - in Post Courier interview stated Aug 96 it was 1918)*
- 4- old trough in yard could be an indigo vat
- 5- Commercial dairy operation- began in 1920's to support them after cotton stopped - 8 other dairies on James Island
- 6- Originally dairy building for hams, meats, milk, and curds
- 7- About 75 slaves worked on plantation
- 8- Double house at end of slave row moved from south side to north side by Mr. Willie's father
- 9- Portico c.1925, columns new when added. Columns on back porch came from old orphanage at corner of Spring St. and Ashley Ave. Portico added so house would face river
- 10- Mr. McLeod went to Civil War and put a slave in charge of house and other slaves, Steven Forrest. Wife and children fled to Greenwood, SC during war
- 11- Adjutant's Office sign in upstairs hall by Confederates
- 12- Cemetery- slaves, white school teacher, casualties when house was a hospital
- 13- At one time was a double house across Folley Rd. on Maybank Highway that belonged to plantation
- 14- 2 projectiles in house from Civil War - 2 more in Chas. Museum and 1 at West Point - only five known in existence - given to McLeod by Henry Rivers with U.S. Engineers, dredged from harbor, had been fired at Union Ships
- 15- Dining room today was once a gentleman's bedroom
- 16- Kitchen house not in use after Civil War
- 17- Tom Lawton has family information
- 18- Near trough outside is a foundation for a vat used to dip cattle

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- 7- About 75 slaves worked on plantation (1860 census lists 51)
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19- Southeast bedroom wardrobe only original piece of furniture. Other furniture moved for safekeeping during the war to a house on Ashley River near Magnolia Gardens that was burned. Current furniture bought over the next 100 years

20- Lightwood House, previous house, had tabby foundation to right of present house- it was small, 2 bedrooms upstairs, 4 rooms downstairs. Pulled down when McLeod house was built

21- A well exists near kitchen house, currently filled in

22- House had marble mantles that were broken by soldiers during the war

23- After cotton planted Irish potatoes, tomatoes, beans, and cabbage

24- Kitchen house and slave cabins may pre-date existing house, possibly belong to Lightwood House

25- Narcissus bulbs ~~originally~~ planted by Susan Lawton McLeod c.1856 - ~~were~~ in formal garden ~~but~~ trampled by cattle and army troops during war -
