
Here is a clip from the 1944 Sanborn maps. Hasell Street is the street running up-and-down to the right of the square building.

Given the note written on that photo, I think this is probably the spot after all. It shows a two-story building with a platform right next to a railroad spur that terminates at the corner of the building. In addition to the Southeastern Warehouse Co. purchase of the NW corner of Concord and Hasell a few years before the photo, newspapers continued to identify that spot as the location of the company.

Also, the guy who posted the image noted that the man in the image was his ancestor, Octavius Wayne.

I checked the properties of the two images on my computer, and it says that they are already over 600 dpi in downloaded version, but I'm going to try to get him to send me a high res scan directly just to make sure they are the best resolution possible.

That warehouse building was, I THINK, at the northwest corner of Hasell and Concord Street. The company bought property at that corner in 1912 right after the Southeastern Warehouse Co. opened in town. And, there is a building that seems to be the same one still shown in the 1944 Sanborn.

BUT, commercial warehouse buildings are all so similar, it's not a 100% sure thing. Any info on the building that used to stand at that corner for comparison?

A guy named David Rutledge posted these two images on a genealogy site that I sometimes use through the public library to track down info on owners of buildings. One of them shows 24-22-20 Church Street in about 1910. The photo shows Ester Allston Wayne and her first cousin Harriett Wilkinson Allston outside the Wayne house. (I'm not sure which girl is which.) The house at 24 Church Street later had its front door closed in, and the entrance was moved to the north façade.

The other shows an unknown gent in front of a building marked as the Southeastern warehouse about 1928. I'm not sure where that building was.

Both of these images seem to be pretty high res scans already, but I've emailed the poster to ask for a 600 dpi scan.
