Richard F. Reynolds purchased the home for his residence in March of 1851. Reynolds owned the firm of Reynolds and Company which manufactured carriages in Charleston. He sold the property to Thomas Savage Heyward in 1857. Heyward was an auctioneer at 16 Vanderhorst Wharf. In November of 1869, the house was sold at a sheriff's sale to Charles O. Witte, the president of the People's National Bank. Witte later deeded the property to George W. Witte and John B. Reeves as trustees for his five children who sold the property to Carlotta Witte Van Boskerck in 1908.

By the turn of the century, Mrs. W. S. Coates was operating a boarding house in the building. The structure was occupied by Melrose Apartments in the 1930s. Lucille B. Halsey bought the home in 1934 and it remained in the hands of her descendants until 1992. During the 1940s, the building continued to be used as an apartment building with tenants including the president of the Atlantic Lime Corporation, the vice-president of the Standard Fertilizer Company, and a local architect with the firm of Halsey and Cummings.
