Voted: To raise and appropriate:

1. Three thousand six hundred and six (\$3,606.00) dollars for building and repairing sidewalks.

Eight hundred fifty-six (\$856.00 dollars of this money to rebuild the sidewalk on easterly side of Main street between Oliver and Elm streets, a distance of 550 ft. Two hundred fifty (\$250.00) dollars to build a sidewalk in front of the property of Harland Almquist on Seaver street, running south approximately 170 feet.

2. Three thousand eight hundred seventy-seven (\$3,877.00) dollars for street lighting.

3. Six hundred (\$600.00) dollars for miscellaneous expenses.

Voted: To authorize the District Treasurer with the approval of Prudential Committee to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the ensuing year, and issue notes of the district therefor.

Voted: That the District, accept the sum of forty-eight hundred (\$4,800.00) dollars from the Town of Easton, being the balance due from the Town of Easton, for the purchase by the Town of the Fire Holdings from the District including the land and buildings known as the "Fire Station Property" on the easterly side of Sullivan avenue, including all fire department equipment that was leased to the Town of Easton by the District under a vote of the District at a special meeting of said District duly called and held May 7, 1936 in pursuance of Chapter 322 of Acts of 1936: and Prudential Committee of said North Easton Village District are hereby authorized to execute and deliver a good and sufficient deed of all the right, title and interest of the District to Fire Station Property, to the Town of Easton, and the Prudential Committee are hereby further authorized to sell and convey all the right, title and interest the District has to all other Fire Department Holdings and Equipment to the Town of Easton.

Voted: Sentiment of this meeting be:—To have the Prudential Committee repair existing defects in sidewalk on Main street, between Seaver street and District line.

ARTICLE III. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the District charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the District will vote to authorize the District Treasurer, with the approval of the Prudential Committee, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the ensuing year, and issue notes of the District therefor.

ARTICLE V. To see what action the district will take in regard to accepting the sum of—Four thousand eight hundred dollars—\$4,800.00 in full payment for the North Easton Fire Station and Equipment known as the Easton Fire Holding.

REPORT OF PRUDENTIAL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the North Easton Village District:

We hereby submit the following report for the year ending February 29, 1944.

At the Annual District Meeting which was held on April 5, 1943, the sum of \$3,600.00 was raised and appropriated for the rebuilding and repair of sidewalks..

Thirteen hundred and thirty-nine feet of walks were rebuilt at a cost of \$1,749.52. For repairs we spent \$749.31.

Walks were rebuilt on Lincoln, Main, Pond, and Seaver streets.

Repairs were made on Seaver, Linden, No. Main, Holmes, Lincoln, Day, Seaver, Jenny Lind, Reynolds, Pond, Elm, Oliver, and Main streets.

Reconstruction was carried out on sidewalks which were in the worst condition.

A petition was voted on for rebuilding the sidewalk on the easterly side of Main street between Oliver and Elm streets. This sidewalk was not finished because on the corner of Main and Oliver streets the boundary of the owners property was in the middle of the sidewalk and three trees could not be removed and on the corner of Main and Elm streets the corner is to be widened by the town and the owner of the property owns 15 inches into the present sidewalk.

A letter was sent to the Brockton Edison Company in regards to the dimout shades and what could be done in regards to removing same. The reply was as follows:

Dear Sir:

We acknowledge receipt of your recent letter seeking information relative to the possible removal of dimout shielding of street lights in the North Easton Village District. We are pleased to give you present information which we have for your guidance in determining what action, if any, you may wish to take.

There is now no Army regulation, or Executive Order, requiring that shielding be retained. The dimout was suspended by Executive Order No. 63 and, while not embodied in the order itself, communities were cautioned that a resumption of the dimout might be ordered at any time and permanent installations, such as the shields placed on outdoor lighting, 'should not be altered so as to prevent a prompt return to present dimout requirements'. A 'prompt return' was interpreted by the Army to mean twenty-four hours. This interpretation was made last November, soon after the suspension became effective.

Recently, several communities within the dimout area in Massachusetts have weighed the situation and have ordered the shields removed. We have now received such orders from two municipalities in the territory which we serve. The final decision in regard to unshielding street lights rests with the municipality, according to a communication sent out by the Massachusetts Committee on Public Safety under the date of December 23, 1943. We will take such action as you may direct upon receipt of your written order.

We appreciate the importance of a return to unrestricted lighting at the earliest possible moment in order that the former measure of safety and convenience in the streets at night may again be realized. It is important, however, that we frankly state what the situation would be in the event that the Army should order a resumption of the dimout program. Obviously, it would be physically impossible for us to again install the shields on short notice should the Army decide this to be necessary. Having in mind the delays previously encountered in securing the materials and the work entailed in attaching the shields and applying the paint, a period of several weeks would doubtless elapse before we could comply. Even assuming that we are able to salvage and store most of the present shields, a portion will be damaged in the removal and, under present circumstances, cannot be replaced because such equipment is not now being manufactured. Our entire territory would probably be involved at the same time and we would encounter an impossible task if the emergency were acute. The alternative, then, might be a blackout of street lighting until all restrictions placed by Army order could be satisfactorily met. We know you appreciate that we could not agree to overcome such difficulties in a short space of time but would cooperate to the best of our ability, as we did when the dimout was originally invoked.

We hope and trust that a return to the dimout need not be faced and wish simply to recognize it as a possibility.
