

BODY OF PRIV. SCHINDLER ARRIVES AT NORTH EASTON

Will Lie in State at Legion Headquarters Until the Sunday Funeral—One of the First to Reach France and Was Killed in Battle—Was Employed by F. B. Washburn Co. of Brockton Before Enlisting.

NORTH EASTON, Sept. 2.—The body of Priv. George F. Schindler, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Schindler of Williams street, this town, arrived last evening from Hoboken, N. J., where it has been for the past two weeks. The body was accompanied by a soldier "buddy," and was met at the railroad station by Undertaker J. Frank Conley of Brockton and Mrs. Schindler. The body was immediately taken to legion headquarters, where it will remain in state until the funeral Sunday afternoon at 2:30 from the Church of the Immaculate Conception.

Burial will take place in the Immaculate Conception cemetery on Canton street.

Young Schindler was 21 years of age at the time he entered the army on Sept. 5, 1917. He went first to Camp Devens, where he remained only a few weeks and from there he was sent to Camp Bartlett, Westfield, remained another few weeks and from there was sent to France.

Was In Important Battles.

He was one of the first to go across

and he was at once put into the thickest of the fray. He fought in many of the most important battles, and the one in which he met his death was the battle of Belleau Wood. He was killed in action on July 18, 1918.

Young Schindler attended the grammar school and the Oliver Ames High school. At the time of entering the army he was employed by the F. B. Washburn Co. of Brockton. He was one of the most popular young fellows in town and had a host of friends. He was a member of the Church of the Immaculate Conception.

The funeral will be in full charge of George S. Shepard Post, A. L. A caisson has been secured from Brockton and the body will be borne on the caisson drawn by six horses. Six overseas men will act as bearers.

Chalres Malloy, who left here with Schindler, and who was with him in France, guarded the body all last evening together with Carl Kemp. Members of the legion will take turns at guarding the body until the funeral.

The town officials are extended an invitation by George S. Shepard Post, A. L., to take part in the funeral services Sunday. The A. C. Ames band will also participate in the services. All wishing to take part in the service will please form the line at the legion headquarters on Barrows street.
