Biographical Note

The legends surrounding Geroge White and the Seele Family are well detailed in William Chaffin's History of Easton Massachusetts (1886) and more information can be found in the William Ladd Chaffin Papers available on the Society's website. It is important to note that there is evidence of the nefarious deeds of George White in documents relating to court proceedings and the testimonies of former members of his gang. Therefore, there is more than a bit of truth to the stories presented in this collection.

Ross A. Muscato (1963-) is a well known Easton born writer. Over the years he has worked as a writing consultant for organizations, like: Microsoft, the Boston Globe and the Boston Herald. Mr. Muscato has also worked with Jim Craig, 1980 Winter Olympic Gold Medalist, on several books about team member relations in a business setting. He is currently writing for the Easton Patch, which is the source of all of his materials in this collection. Scope and Content Note

The papers in this collection date from 1875 to 2012 and detail Easton's most famous legends regarding the: Bridgewater Triangle, George White the Horse Thief, various witches and mysterious rocks. The materials present are newspaper and magazine articles, handwritten accounts and photographs. This collection is arranged into nine series by subject and is presented in alphabetical order. Subsequent organization of subseries are arranged chronologically or alphabetically, as will be specified below. Notable materials in this collection include: a magazine article detailing all the stories related to the Bridgewater Triangle, pictures of where one of Easton's hermits used to live and a first hand account of Egg Rock's original whereabouts.

Series 1: Bridgewater Triangle. The materials in this series date from 1998 to 2011. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. The most notable item is the aforementioned magazine article from The Fringe.

Series 2: Devil's Footprint. The materials in this series date from 1957 to 1968. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. There are no particularly notable materials in this series, as it has only a few items.

Series 3: George White The Horse Thief. The materials in this series date from 1975 to 1982. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. The most notable item is an account written for a school report. It includes many aspects of the legend in one place.

Series 4: Ghosts. The materials in this series are estimated to date from 1900 to the 1960s. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. The most notable item is a newspaper article recounting a sighting of the Lady in White from the 1950s.

Series 5: Hermits. The materials in this series are estimated to date from 1875 to the 1990s. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. The most significant materials are pictures taken in the late 1990s. They reveal the location where Pete the Hermit used to live before the land was developed.

Series 6: Rocks. The materials in this series date from 1954 to 1978. This is the only series to have subseries. The subseries are arranged by subject and ordered alphabetically. The most notable item is a first hand account of the original location of Egg Rock.

Series 7: Ross A. Muscato. The materials in this series date from 2011 to 2012. All materials were written by Mr. Ross A. Muscato and published online to the Easton Patch. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. The most significant article mentions a man named Manny Morgan.

Series 8: Witches. The materials in this series date from 1972 to 1998. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. The most notable item is a newspaper article about the Seele family.

Series 9: Miscellaneous. The materials in this series are undated. There are no subseries and all materials are ordered chronologically. This series contains one newspaper article about a mysterious gun.
