Roosevelt Leading in Ohio 3 to 2
Wilson Leads Harmon Same Pace

Harmon and Wilson Men are Both
Claiming Victory in Ohio but
Wilson is Leading

LAFOLLETTE SURPRISED THE POLITICIANS

Taft Carried Cincinnati, Toledo and Dayton but Roosevelt Offsets This by Carrying Cleveland, Columbus and Other Cities in North Ohio

(Special Cable To The Journal.) Cincinnati, Ohio, May 21, (Midnight) On the face of early returns from the first presidential preference primary held in Ohio today, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt led the republican ticket 3 to 2 over President Taft. Taft appears to have carried Cincinnati by a large margin, and also Toledo and Dayton. His lead in these cities however is much more than offset by Roosevelt's vote in Cleveland, Columbus and other cities. Roosevelt's lead in the Northern part of the state it seems will give him an advantage which Taft's vote in the Southern part of the state will be unable to overcome. While Taft and Roosevelt men are making conflicting claims tonight, the returns already indicate which way the wind is blowing and show that every time two votes were polled for Mr. Taft, three were polled for Mr. Roosevelt.

The death blow to Governor Harmon's presidential aspirations seems to have been dealt today as Woodrow Wilson is leading him in the state 3 to 2. Wilson and Roosevelt and Taft and Harmon appear to be making the same kind of race. The Harmon campaign managers, despite the returns already in, declare that Governor Harmon has carried the state, although there seems to be no foundation on which to base this claim. Mayor Baker of Cleveland declares that Woodrow Wilson has carried the State 2 to 1. Although the names of Champ Clark and William J. Bryan did not appear on the ballot, and they will not be represented by delegates, they each received a scattering vote which when the final returns are received may affect the outcome of the Wilson-Harmon race.

The returns given out at this hour are on a basis of about two hundred and fifty precincts out of a total of 5,192 in the State. With the large

The schools of the state have made splendid progress under Mr. Holloway, and we believe he should be re-elected over Mr. Sheets. We expect to vote on May 28th for Mr. Holloway, and we hope the majority of the voters of the state will do likewise, and thus forever consign Mr. Sheets to the shades of oblivion and put the stamps of disapproval upon mud-slinging, especially as far as the school interests of our fair state are concerned.

MORE MONEY HEADED
TOWARD THIS CITY

Naval Appropriation Bill
Carries Over \$50,000
For Key West

An appropriation of fifty thousand dollars for improvements in the local Naval Station has been recommended by the Committee on Naval Affairs of the House, according to a letter received in the city yesterday. When the Pensacola Navy Yard was suspended there was an appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars for improvements unused, and this amount has been added to the Key West appropriation this year. The bill as it now stands gives Key West \$25,000 for a new power plant, \$5,000 for grading and paving within the Station, \$5,500 for grading and paving on Whitehead, Greene and Front Streets, and \$15,000 for the erection of officers quarters and improving of the grounds.

WAR AGAINST FLIES
HAS BEEN GIVEN UP

People of City Appear
Willing To Have Lives
of Babies Endangered

In yesterday morning's Journal the announcement we made that a war would be declared on flies, and we thought we made it perfectly plain that the announcement was a perfectly serious one. We had a definite plan laid out to rid the city of the disease breeding and germ laden little filth carriers, and we asked anyone who might be enough interested in the city's welfare and in the health of their own families and that of their neighbors, to come to the office this afternoon. We invited the ladies of the Civic Association especially, since we thought they would naturally be more interested than the people who give the city's health only casual attention. The advertising manager of the Journal had laid out the plans for the campaign for a more healthy city and the Journal had agreed to place in his hands the necessary funds for carrying the campaign to a successful end. Other cities are ridding themselves of flies, and the plan laid out was much the same as followed by others. In other cities the people are taking an interest in the movement for a "flyless city."

There was not a man or woman of all Key West's population who was enough interested in the movement to pay any attention to the invitation extended them yesterday. There is not a man or woman in all of Key West's population who has the interest in his or her family's health, to say nothing of the health of his or her neighbors, that they ought to have. And to those of you who think we have exceeded our right in making the statement just made, we refer you to the awfully INTERESTED way in which the people of the city responded to the Journal's suggestions made in yesterday morning's paper.

We had every reason to expect that they would be interested in the health of the community. But since they are not, we realize the uselessness of trying to carry on the campaign against the disease spreading little fly, when we have not the slightest intimation of any co-operation from any one—not even from the Ladies Civic Association, that organization in other cities is always on the alert to make the community in which they operate as healthful as possible. So, as we have stated before in our same article, the war has been given up.

We are convinced that the people of Key West are perfectly willing for them to have all the way they want. So, will the city swat the fly? Well, I guess not!

OTHER TYPES OF DESSERTS.

The baked fruit pudding is another sort of dessert which, when warm, may be served with whipped cream. Date Pudding.—Take a cup of dates cut in small pieces, a cup of nut meats (hickory or walnuts), two eggs beaten, a half cup of sugar well mixed with a quarter of a cup of flour. Bake in a sheet twenty to thirty minutes. Cut in small squares and serve with whipped cream. This pudding may be

FLORIDA RAILROAD
MAN VISITED CITY

L. M. Fonts President of
the Charlotte Harbor
and Northern Here

Mr. L. M. Fonts, president of the Charlotte Harbor and Northern Railway was in the city a few hours last night having arrived on the Ollivette from Havana. Mr. and Mrs. Fonts arrived in Key West Monday and Mrs. Fonts remained in the city while her husband made a short trip to Cuba. Mr. Fonts talked interestingly last night to a representative of The Journal about the railroad of which he is the head and of the work it is doing in developing South Florida.

This railroad was built principally to facilitate the handling of phosphate excavated from the mines in the Bone Valley, the greatest phosphate mining district in the world. The road is a little over one hundred miles long, with a fine deep water port for its Southern terminus—Boca Grande, and Mulberry, the center of the mining district, for its Northern terminus. The road has through connections which take sleeping cars of the line through direct to Tampa and Jacksonville. While the handling of phosphate is the principal business of this railroad, it handles all classes of business and the handling of fruit, citrus fruits particularly, is fast swelling its volume of business.

At Boca Grande, the largest and most complete plant in the world for handling phosphate is in operation. This plant handles 600 tons an hour, or 6,000 tons a day. This means that a ship arrives in the morning and is fully loaded and ready to depart in the evening.

Mr. Fonts is a most affable gentleman and is enthusiastic over the prospects for the further development of South Florida.

kept for some time in a caraway covered to keep moist, warmed before serving. It is too good to last for more than two meals.

The soufflé is another type of dessert which may be varied in many ways. Chocolate and fruit juices may be used for flavoring. When chocolate is used in a soufflé the sauce to serve is cream, but a hard sauce of half cup of softened butter, a teaspoon of vanilla and a cup of powdered sugar makes a satisfactory sauce.

For a plain soufflé the proportions are a cup of milk, fruit juice could be used, a quarter of a cup of sugar, two eggs and a third of a cup of flour. Cook the flour and milk until thick, cool and add the beaten yolks and the sugar; then fold in the beaten whites and bake in a buttered pan set into hot water. If chocolate is used, less of flour is needed for the thickening. The number of gelatin desserts is legion and may be molded, garnished and served in numberless ways.

Frozen dishes are another type which never lose their charm, as there are none that take the place of the cool frozen desserts, especially in warm weather. Custards are another kind that is universally liked, and they may be varied by different seasonings and flavors. The caramel is perhaps the greatest favorite. The foundation for all custards is a quart of milk, four eggs, a cup of sugar and flavoring. When half of the sugar is caramelized for flavor add a little more than half a cup for sweetening.

HAD A GREAT TIME

Popular Order Celebrated
Last Night At Their

The local Nest of Owls gathered together in force last night and enjoyed the celebration which they had been planning for some time past. True to their nocturnal habits, the owls grew merrier as the hour grew later and fun and merriment reigned supreme. The Wel-ters orchestra furnished music for the occasion and dancing was indulged in by those who enjoyed tripping the light fantastic. The local nest of owls was organized here on May 14th 1911 and now has a membership of four hundred members. This is assuredly a splendid record and one of which the organization may well feel proud.

Put equal parts of round steak and fresh lean pork, cut in serving pieces, into a frying pan and brown; dredge with flour and cover with boiling water and simmer for an hour; add an onion, a carrot, and turn all into a baking dish, cover with quartered potatoes, add water and bake until the potatoes are brown. The amount of meat and vegetables used depends on the size of the family.

Another dish which is new to America is:

Sausage With Pudding.—Take sufficient pork sausage for the family to be served, place in a baking pan and cook in the oven until the fat has been well tried out; drain off all but one or three tablespoonsfuls of the fat and pour over the sausage.

Yorkshire Pudding.—Take two cups of milk and add gradually to two well beaten eggs. Mix with a cup of flour and a teaspoonful of salt. Pour over the sausages and bake. If the sausages are cooked in a serving dish it may be carried to the table and served from it. This is a good dish to piece out with, when unexpected company arrives.

Potato Doughnuts.—Cream three tablespoonsfuls of butter, add three-fourths of a cup of sugar and the yolks of three eggs beaten, then stir in a cup of freshly mashed potato and a fourth of a cup of milk. Add two and a half cups of flour, three tablespoonsfuls of baking powder, half a teaspoonful of salt and ground mace and a fourth of a teaspoonful of nutmeg. Roll out and fry in deep fat.

Wherever the Romans lived in the days of the empire they carried luxury and art. They occupied for centuries a large part of the northern coast of Africa. It is not surprising therefore to learn by a dispatch from Tripoli that a body of Italian troops digging trenches near the Oasis of Siarra, on the spot formerly occupied by Roman imperial gardens, has unearthed an ancient Greek Venus of remarkable beauty. The head and arms are missing, but the torso is in excellent preservation and reminds beholders of the famous Capitoline Venus. The statue has been sent to Rome, where it will be placed in the National museum. In nearly every spot where soldiers have tapped the ground to throw up defensive works they have uncovered traces of the ancient Roman occupation of Tripoli, including tombs, mosaics and ruins of splendid villas.

London's milliners have devised some new "collapsible" hats, of which one of the most stylish is the turban hat in soft white felt trimmed with a large feather. It can be twisted round and made perfectly flat, the feather folding over neatly on the top. Collapsible headgear with a body of straw adorned with an osprey feather and large bow is also on sale and can be folded up into a very small space. Another good thing about these hats, from the men's point of view, is that they range in price from \$1.37 to \$21.

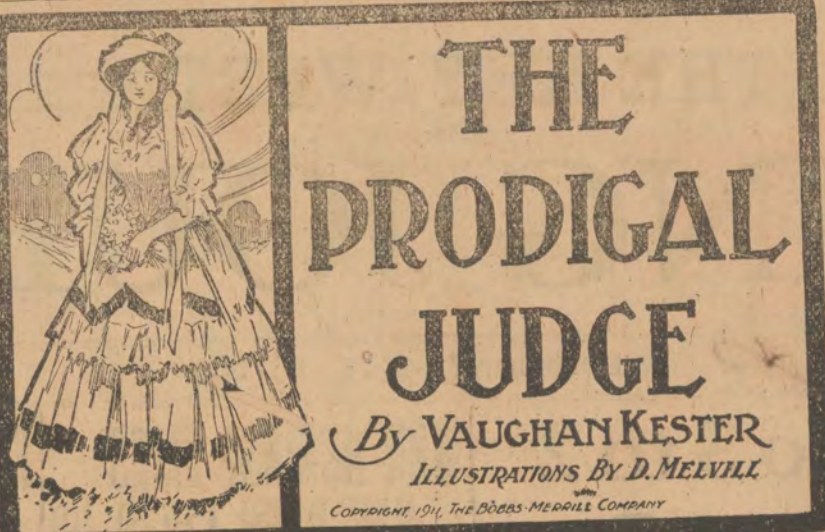

The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted by said corporation shall be to buy, sell and convey, purchase, acquire, hold, charter, lease, mortgage, hypothecate, repair, remodel, rebuild and otherwise own, manage and dispose of wharves and wharf property, warehouses, docks, tanks, floating facilities of every kind, steamships, sailing vessels and other floating property and other real and personal property including chattels and choses in action; to dispatch, load, unload, disburse and act as agent for all kinds of vessels but not to use the said means of transportation for the purpose of doing the business of a common carrier, and to receive freight and tolls therefrom; to issue storage and warehouse receipts; to do a general sponge business in all of its branches, to conduct and carry on a general brokerage, shipping and commission business in and about any and all of the matters herein, including a custom-house brokerage business; to handle, care for, receive and dispose of consignments of vessels and any other personal property, to conduct a wholesale and retail coal, water, lumber, naval stores and general merchandise business; to buy, sell, own, mortgage, lease and pledge lands within the State of Florida or elsewhere; to advance and loan money upon securities of land, personal property, commercial paper, steamships, sailing vessels, cargoes, materials from vessels and upon other floating property; to act as broker, factor or agent in the purchase, sale, management and disposition of real estate in the State of Florida and elsewhere; to take and hold real and personal estates in trust, to borrow money and secure the same and to secure moneys otherwise owing by mortgage, deed, bonds or other obligations therefor; to improve real estate by building, constructing thereon or removing therefrom stores, residences, warehouses, docks, wharves, mills, factories or structures of any kind whatsoever; to have such improvements constructed by contract, to make and erect them otherwise and to purchase or manufacture all material therefor and market the surplus; to issue bonds or other obligations of the corporation in payment of property purchased or acquired by it, or for any other lawful object in or about its business; to act as attorney in fact, agent, broker or factor for any person, firm or corporation in any part of the world and generally to do any or all acts and things which may be beneficial or profitable to the corporation or which may be necessary and expedient to accomplish the objects and purposes of the corporation and to do any and all things usual or incident to corporations organized under the laws of the state of Florida.
