HUNDREDS OF VISITORS IN CITY FOR WEEK END TO WITNESS BIG MAHI TEMPLE CEREMONIAL

One Hundred Sixty Three Candidates Will Be Initiated Today. Shrine Grand Ball Tonight. Chanters Will Sing At Fleming Street Church Sunday

One of the most brilliant ceremonials yet to be staged by the Mahi Temple in this city is in progress today. Shriners have been pouring into the town for the past two days, the Shriners' special and the local this morning bringing in hundreds of members of the mystic order until the streets are thronged with the resplendent fezzes of those who have already traversed the burning sands of the eastern deserts. Some of these visitors are not thus distinguished and it may be surmised that they are the novices whose destiny it will be to run the gamut of scimitar and dagger, to tread the burning sands, and surrender themselves to the diabolical tortures of the turbaned Arab so that they too may come forth men, tried and true, to wear this symbol of their fitness for membership in the Shrine. There are twenty-three novices from Key West and one hundred and thirty-five visitors from other towns along the east coast, so there will be plenty of "sacrificial meat" to offer up to whatever gods the Shrine may wish to appease.

The parade, which will be one of the most interesting features of the ceremonial will take place at 10 o'clock, forming at the Jefferson hotel, the line of march will be up Duval street to Fleming, down Fleming street to White Street, along White street to Division, and down Division to Bayview where the key of the city will be presented to illustrious Potentate John B. Orr, by Mayor Frank H. Ladd—this is really predicting a great deal for Mayor Ladd, as that gentleman is one of the candidates—and no one can prophesy anything certain about candidates. He is down on the program, however, for this presentation and it is to be hoped that he will be able to take part.

Those who have witnessed former ceremonials are fully aware of the brilliant panorama the parade affords with its procession of officers in their gem-encrusted robes, courtesying and scintillating as the rays of the sun are reflected in the many facets of the jewels. The divan is led by the illustrious Potentate John B. Orr, and is followed by the band of Mahi Temple, guided by the graceful banton of its leader who towers far above the rest of the paraders by virtue of his unusual height and gestures magnificently to his cohorts as they advance. There is said to be no finer band in the South and those who will have the opportunity to hear it this morning will concur in this statement. Following the band is the gayly-uniformed patrol, and upon their heels trade the chanters. Next, come the nobles all fezzed up for the occasion and behind them may be seen the novices, tricked out in such costumes as the humorists of the temple have devised—they are going to be a grand surprise to everybody—those costumes! Rumors are abroad that not even the poor candidate's families will be able to recognize them—but the time is fast approaching when the authenticity of these reports may be verified.

At 11:30 there will be an exhibition drill by the patrol of Mahi Temple at Bayview park. Those who take part in this pretty ceremony are uniformed so that there is a striking effect of unity in the movement of the patrol as they advance and retreat in the drill with a symmetry of action that gives the illusion of its being performed by one member execute the figures of this spectacular exhibition.

Immediately after the drill, novices will board specially-reserved street cars which will convey them to the navy yard where members of the Eastern Star will serve a luncheon for them at the seamen's barracks. This will be the "zero hour" of every novice—that awful pause when he reviews his past life, cinches up his belt, and privately determines that come what may, he will be the last one to squeal—for immediately afterward at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of this, the glorious Fourth, the first section of the ceremonial will occur. Here is where the Shriners draw the curtain and nothing but music and an occasional frightened yelp emanates at intervals, until the second section of the ceremonial is completed and the

MAHI TEMPLE IS CONSIDERED ONE OF LEADING SHRINE LODGES EXISTING IN THIS COUNTRY

Had Beginning In 1921. Fred W. Delaney Present Recorder Was Instrumental In Its Origin. Present Membership Is Approximately Eighteen Hundred

Mahi Temple, Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, and its present membership of 1,800 is the outgrowth of the Miami Shrine club, which was organized in 1917 to fill the long-felt need of some organization as a medium through which the members of the mystic order might keep in fraternal touch with each other.

Nobles A. C. Hillman and Fred W. DeLaney were the leaders in this movement and were elected by the Miami Shrine club to the respective offices of president and secretary in recognition of their efforts to perfect this organization.

Noble John B. Orr, who is regarded as one of the foremost building contractors in the South today, and who is also a district governor of Rotary, was elected to succeed Noble Hillman as president, in 1918.

Encouraged by the rapid growth of the Shrine club, and its splendid prospects of a large increase in membership, Nobles Orr and DeLaney became imbued with the idea of securing a temple for Miami, and with this undertaking in mind, they attended a session of the Imperial Council which was held in Portland, Ore., in 1919. At this session they requested the council to grant them a dispensation for the organization of a temple with the membership of the Shrine club as a nucleus upon which to build to larger things; but were refused because of a technicality, which required a larger delegation than these two delegates represented in the presentation of such a petition. This formality was properly complied with at the succeeding session which occurred in Des Moines, Ia., the next year, and they accordingly received authority to organize Mahi Temple with permission to apply at the next session of the council for a charter.

Receive Charter.
The installation ceremonies that ushered Mahi Temple into existence were very impressive and involved a membership of about 425 nobles. The splendid efforts of Nobles Orr and DeLaney were not forgotten and they were elected to the two highest offices within the gift of the membership, that of Illustrious Potentate and Illustrious Recorder, respectively. Noble Frank Stoneman, editor of the Miami Herald was chosen Chief Rabbah; Noble E. B. Darnell of West Palm Beach was elected Assistant Rabbah, and Noble Charles H. Ketchum of Key West was the temple's first High Priest and Prophet; Noble William Urmyer, owner of the Urmyer hotel of Miami, being chosen as its Oriental Guide. Noble John Seybold was made Mahi's first treasurer and he and Noble Fred W. DeLaney share the distinction alike of having continued in their respective offices until today.

Imperial Council.
Members of the Imperial Council were Illustrious Potentate John B. Orr, E. B. Darnell, Chief Rabbah; Henry R. Bridgeham, present High Priest, and Fred W. DeLaney, Recorder.

For the ensuing four years the Divan of Mahi Temple have cooperated with the nobles in membership work so efficiently that its roster now numbers almost five times as many members as it did when the temple was organized in 1921, its marvelous growth typifying the substantial increase in Florida's population that has occurred within the past five years, and indicating more forcibly than perhaps any other statistics that the desirable class of citizen is wending his way Florida-ward.

DeLaney Honored.
At the last session of the Imperial Council which was held in Los Angeles, Calif., Fred W. DeLaney was elected vice president of the Recorder's Association of North America, this is a signal distinction, by virtue of the fact that Noble DeLaney represented one of the infant temples in the order of age, yet it goes without saying that he fully merited this honor on account of his special abilities for such an office, which were so efficiently demonstrated in connection with his organization of Mahi Temple.

OVERCOME BY GAS.

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SHRINE HISTORY. ONE OF LOYALTY TO HIGH IDEALS

At San Francisco in June, 1922, the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the order.

Brilliant pageants marched up Market street. More than a hundred bands of music escorted the marching units from their Temples of the Shrine. Fifty Bedouin bands, their wailing pipes playing the weird music of the desert and the players wearing fierce beards over stained and painted cheeks and sporting the white robes of the Arab, gave atmosphere to the parade. Seventy-five sets of chanters, with from four men to 50 in each organization, sang as they marched. More than a hundred patrols of wonderfully trained footmen, garbed in brilliant hues, executed intricate maneuvers while maintaining a steady forward movement. A million people lined the sidewalks to watch them pass, and of that vast throng 300,000 were members of the Mystic Shrine, visitors to San Francisco attracted by the season there of the Imperial Council, the governing body of the Order.

The night parade by the Mystic Shrine, June, 1922, probably surpassed in gorgeousness any pageant ever staged anywhere in the world. It was a riot of color, of brilliance and charm. It is estimated that that parade was the culmination of the expenditure by Shriners of more than \$10,000,000.

Boys Again
In those patrols marched men who read great business institutions. Some of them are rated high in the professions. Among the payers in those bands were many millionaires and scores of others who are on the primrose path to such a rating.

Along the sidewalks thousands of boys wearing men's clothes and grades of the Order as they passed, and who unconsciously pranced a little as some strutting drum major gave an extra flit to his baton or goose-stepped ahead of his musicians.

Around the hotels and along the streets were hundreds of "bunches" of Nobles playing clean pranks and acting the parts of boys out on a lark. Larks that they always paid for, as when they surrounded the girl who was hurrying to catch her car, took her lunch from her, raffled each individual article, stuffed the money into her lunch box, hired a bunch of taxicabs to escort her to her place of employment and then went in and explained to her boss why she was late.

And it was the recognition of the necessity for serious men to "be boys again" for a time that brought the Mystic Shrine into existence.

Comedian Takes It Up
In 1870 the noted American actor, William J. Florence, than whom no better comedian has ever trod the boards, made a tour of Europe. He was in Egypt and Arabia at the time of year that the true Moslem makes his pilgrimage to Holy Mecca to gain purification and the obliteration of his sins. Mr. Florence investigated the requirements imposed upon a pilgrim, such as throwing seven stones at the place the devil is supposed to inhabit, walking three times around the sacred mountain back of Mecca, the kissing of the sacred Kaaba (the pure white stone that is said to have fallen from heavens and which has turned jet black through absorbing the sins of the repentant) and he concluded that the religion, extravagant terms of expression and mannerisms of the Arabs could be burlesqued to furnish a relaxing place for Masons of high degree after attaining Masonic eminence. Being a Knight Templar and a Scottish Rite Mason, Mr. Florence understood the tremendous solemnity with which the soul of any man is charged when he has attained either of those exalted honors—and so he thought it might help the ordinary man to get back to normal if he was given a chance to laugh and have a good time among his fellows.

Mr. Florence had been for many years one of a band of choice spirits who lunched together every day in a well known New York restaurant. Among them was Dr. Walter Fleming, a well known practitioner in his day and a man of prominence in Masonic circles. On returning to America Mr. Florence submitted the

idea to the round table in the restaurant, and it was decided to prepare a ritual and try it out. The ritual was written by Dr. Fleming, and to give it standing the good doctor gave out that Mr. Florence had found the order in existence in Arabia, had been initiated and had secured permission to confer it in America to Knights Templar and Scottish Rite Masons. And thereupon the founders made use of the words "Ancient" and "Arabic," when a matter of fact the Mystic Shrine is neither. It is purely a wholesome American Order.

First Temple in 1872
The founders of the Order appropriated to themselves the dress of the Arab, many of his mannerisms, and adopted the "Es Seimu A'leikum" (peace be with thee), as the greeting of the nobility. They also grabbed the red fez as their head dress, the scimitar and the crescent, the sphinx and the star and all the rest of the paraphernalia that the Moslem holds sacred.

In those days it was more difficult to acquire the higher degrees than it is today, and as some of the members of the round table in New York had to become qualified for the Mystic Shrine, the actual opening of the first Temple was delayed until 1872 when it was installed as Mecca Temple of New York City—a institution that has been continuous existence to this day and is just now erecting a Mosque in New York City that will cost one and one-half millions of dollars.

The next Temple of the Order that came into existence was Damascus Temple, at Rochester, N. Y., and after that came Mt. Sinai at Montpelier, Vermont, both of them being in a flourishing condition at this time.

During the next few years the growth of the Order was slow, but in the 90's it began to come into its own.

January 1 there were approximately 600,000 Nobles in the Order, members of 154 Temples. It is organized in the United States, Canada, the Canal Zone, Mexico and the Hawaiian Islands with American Shriner in Shanghai, China, getting ready to apply for a charter. It would be strange to some day see a Shrine Temple organized in the Arabic land whose customs it ridicules—but the work would have to be done behind guarded doors to protect the participants from the wrath of the fanatic followers of the prophet, Mohammed.

Shrine Has Appeal
Organized just for fun and relaxation, the Order that Florence founded has drawn to itself men of high station, men of culture and learning—the best men in every walk of life in every community. There must be something of worth about it to attract such men. There must be something that appeals to the heart and the intellect as well. There is. The Shrine is democratic. Its initiation ceremony is designed to teach equality of persons, and no man is so high in the social scale that he may escape the road of repentance across the hot sands that connect the pyramids with Mecca.

The Shrine is patriotic. It is the most charitable band of men living in this world, because its members have learned that "things are not always as they seem to be." For many years the Shrine Temples of the land have cared for the unfortunate at holiday seasons without ostentation. And in its official construction the Shrine closely follows the laws of the Arab, where the Sheikh of the tribe has power of life and death over his subjects. In the Shrine there is very little written law—the word of the Imperial Potentate is law to the North American continent, and the word of the Illustrious Potentate of a local Temple commands implicit obedience from the members of this Oasis. It is the law of custom and it is obeyed. The "Pote" can spend every nickel in the treasury if he wants to, but the boys do sometimes put up a tremendous kick if he runs them into debt.

Until 1920 the Mystic Shrine never had a serious purpose to live up to. It existed just for fun. But in that year it was decided that the Mystic Shrine should take on a more serious, if not more tangible, reason for its existence, and it endorsed the building of Hospitals for Crippled Children, the members agreeing to dig up two dollars apiece each year, for so long as they live, in support of the institutions.

The Shriner believes in those hospitals; you know they do! Anybody who doubts the existence of that belief can engage a room at any convenient hospital and then go out on the street and attack the project in the presence of a Shriner.

But please do not get the notion

that the Shrine is going to abandon its fun because of the Hospitals. That is the notion farthest from their thought. The Shrine is willing to and will gladly support the Hospitals and give the crippled children of the land a fair chance in the world because it feels that it should not spend all its money for foolishness.

"Not quite logical, because you get the money by an assessment," you say.

Quit, boy quit—We get just as much money from the Shrine to support the Temple in having its fun, and he spends that much more because he would spend it anyway for cigars, or pop, or something.

There ye are, brother. Billy Florence is dead, but the Shrine will live on as long as men want to laugh and to meet good fellows—as long as the little gods, Laughter and Love, light up the old Shrine Smilehouse. And if Billy has run off to Mohammed out there where Allah presides over the Supreme Mosque we're betting that Billy is telling him funny stories and kidding the old boy into making a few more revelations. Aleikum es Selam.

MAJESTIC'S RECORD LIST.

New York, July 3.—The steamship Majestic sailed for Europe today with 2,590 passengers, the largest list carried by any passenger ship since June, 1914. The Leviathan is expected to set a new record tomorrow with 2,700 passengers.

CLARENCE LITTLE ELECTED TO HEAD UNIVERSITY MICH.

Ann Arbor, Mich., July 3.—D. Clarence Little, who is expected to assume the presidency of the University of Michigan about October 1 next, following his selection today, will be the youngest man ever to have been high executive officer of the state university. He will be 38 years of age October 6 next. Dr. James B. Angell was 42 years old when he became president of the school; Erastus O. Hovan, second president, was the same age.

RUM RUNNER CAUGHT.

ADVANCE TIPS ON THE SHRINERS FEZ

Much has been written about the fez worn by the Noble Shriner and it has, ever since its origin, been the source from which many stories have been written. One that is significant on this occasion follows:

When the Fez is tilted toward the left ear of the wearer it indicates that the titor appreciates the good things of life and is open to an investigation. Bring in the flesh pots!

If the Fez leans toward the right ear the wearer is signaling to all the fair sex that he is alone in the crowd has no previous entanglements and that any of the Fatimas are invited to approach.

If the Fez is creased lengthwise each time the Noble stoops over, it is too small for his head and is a sure sign that he does not often wear one of the things. He can be placed in the "too busy" class, except at ceremonial times.

If the Fez is creased lengthwise, and given a form that somewhat resembles an "overseas cap" it is an indication that, while the wearer may be a veteran of the world war and a hard boiled guy, he is only a few months out of the Novice class in the Shrine and should be treated with gentleness—but often.

The Noble wearing a Fez tilted well forward over the forehead need not be considered an especially smart fellow, nor a champion poker player, he is probably wondering what happened the night before.

But when the Fez is worn on the back of the head, exposing a wide expanse of brow—look out. That chap is the real goods. He has been through it all before—and many times. He has a world of friends, a pocket full of cigars, he loves to jolly the ladies, he pets the kiddies, he can go upstairs blindfolded and find the room where his friends are waiting to welcome him, he can dance the fandango with either foot tied up in a sling and to him the Shrine is the playground where he has the time of his life and goes home to tell "mother" all about it. He cracks a joke and laughs as loud as the rest of the crowd. The girls in the dining rooms all want to serve his meals. The bell boys hop for him. He is either fat or tall as Allah made him, and his heart is doing 100 per cent duty. He's a regular fellow!

France Will Send Mission to U. S.

(By The Associated Press)

Paris, July 3.—The French government has decided to send a mission to the U. S., with the object of reaching an agreement with the American debt funding commission relative to the payment of France's debt.

The plan was approved by the council of ministers today and it is taken for granted that the cabinet at a full session tomorrow will give its formal assent. It is even considered likely that the cabinet will proceed to discussion concerning the makeup of the mission and time of its departure.

Foreign Minister Brand has asserted the mission will start as soon as possible, but Finance Minister Caillaux's pre-occupation with grave financial problems has caused September to be mentioned as the most likely time.

The government's decision to send a mission has revived expressions of hope that the United States will be generous enough in its terms so that France can really begin to pay after a reasonable moratorium.

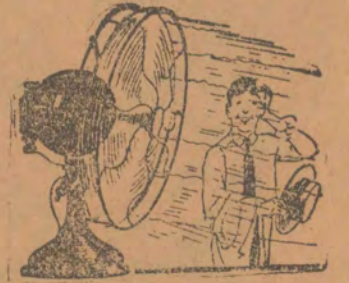
Readjustment of speculative accounts for over the holiday contributed to the unevenness character to the day.

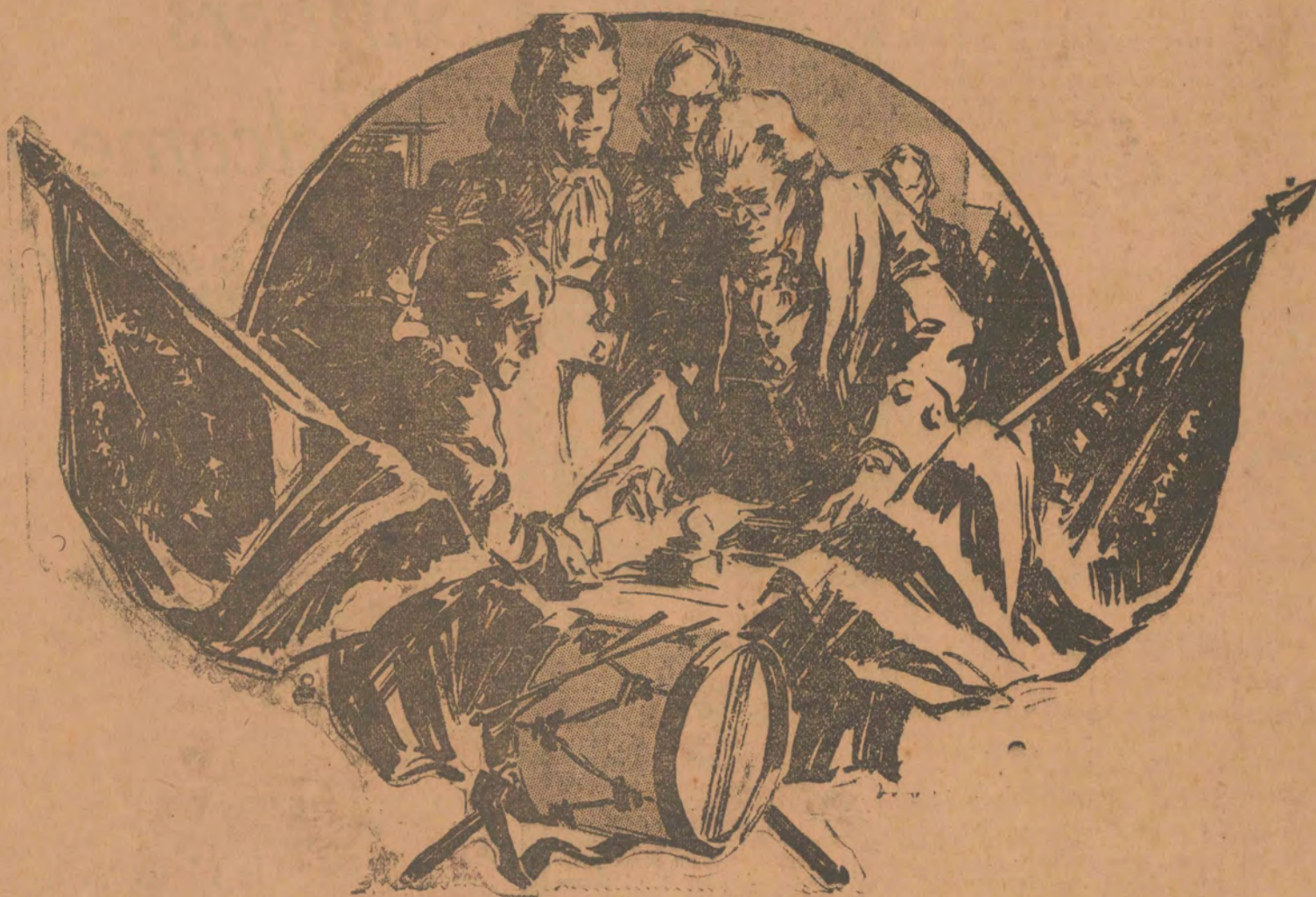

Key West is considered by the Federal Government to be the "Gibraltar of America." For that reason it has one of the most important naval stations in the country and is the headquarters of the Seventh Naval District. The station is splendidly equipped with a large coaling station, machine shops, marine railway, and ample docking facilities. One of the most powerful radio stations in the United States is also located in the navy enclosure. It has a radius of 1,500 miles and is a boon to mariners passing through these waters in that it broadcasts the weather conditions for the ensuing twenty-four hours daily. South of the navy yard is located the new submarine base which was completed in 1921 at a cost of more than two and a half million dollars. In addition to the permanent personnel stationed at the navy yard, various ships of the United States navy call here for supplies. It is also the rendezvous of the torpedo and bombing squadron No. 1, which comes here annually for its spring maneuvers, lasting about four months.

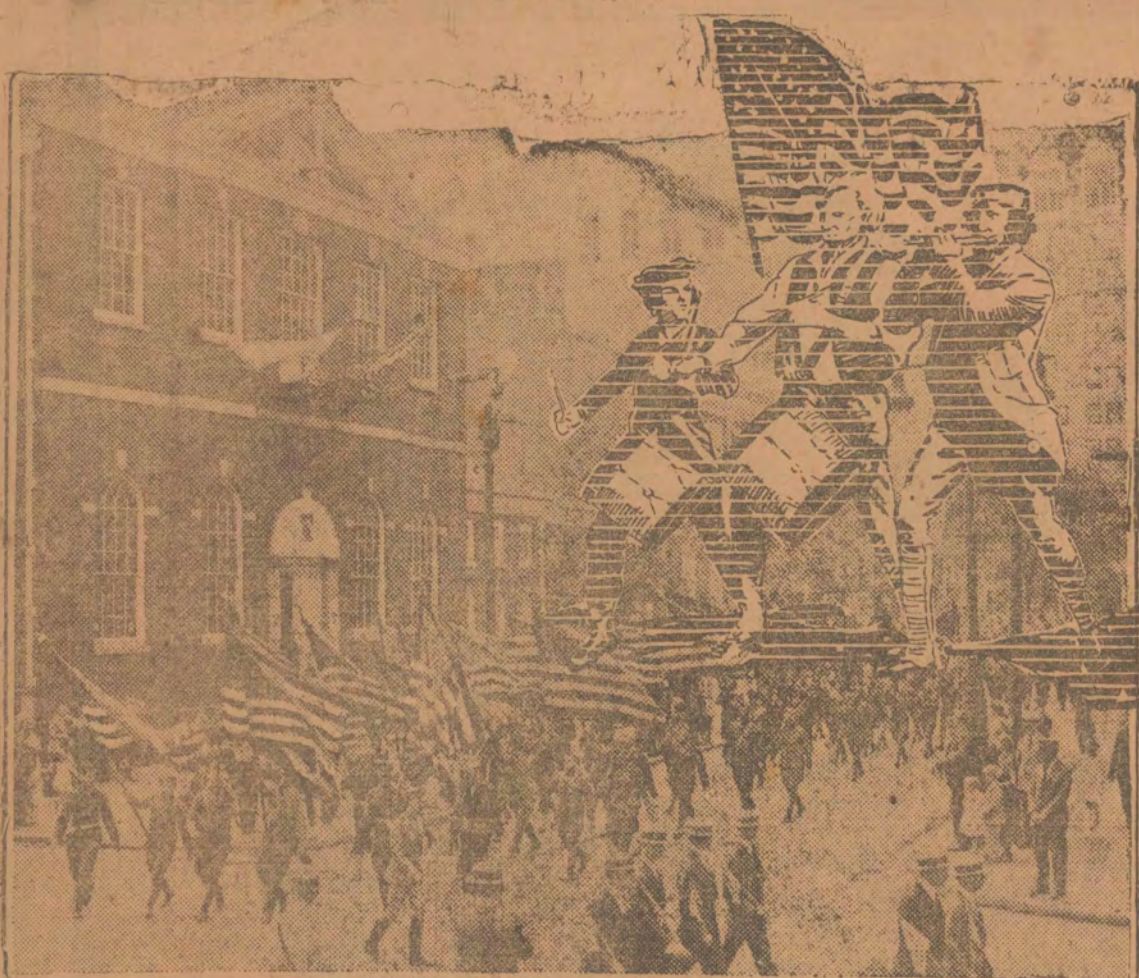

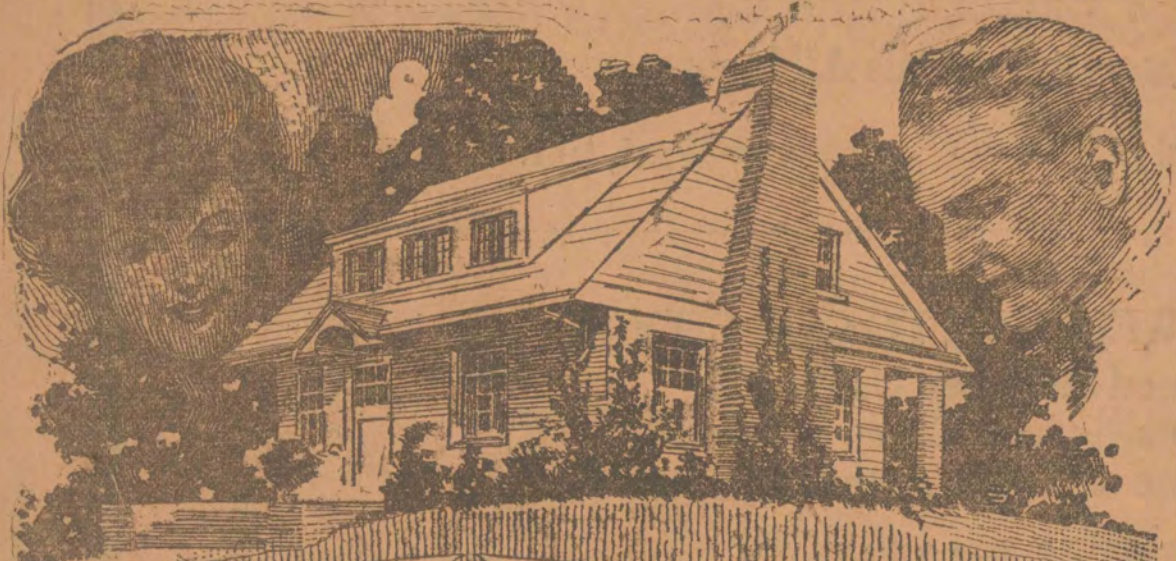

A fireworks display will come as a fitting culmination to the day's program of activities and will probably be staged somewhere within the immediate vicinity of the Athletic Club.

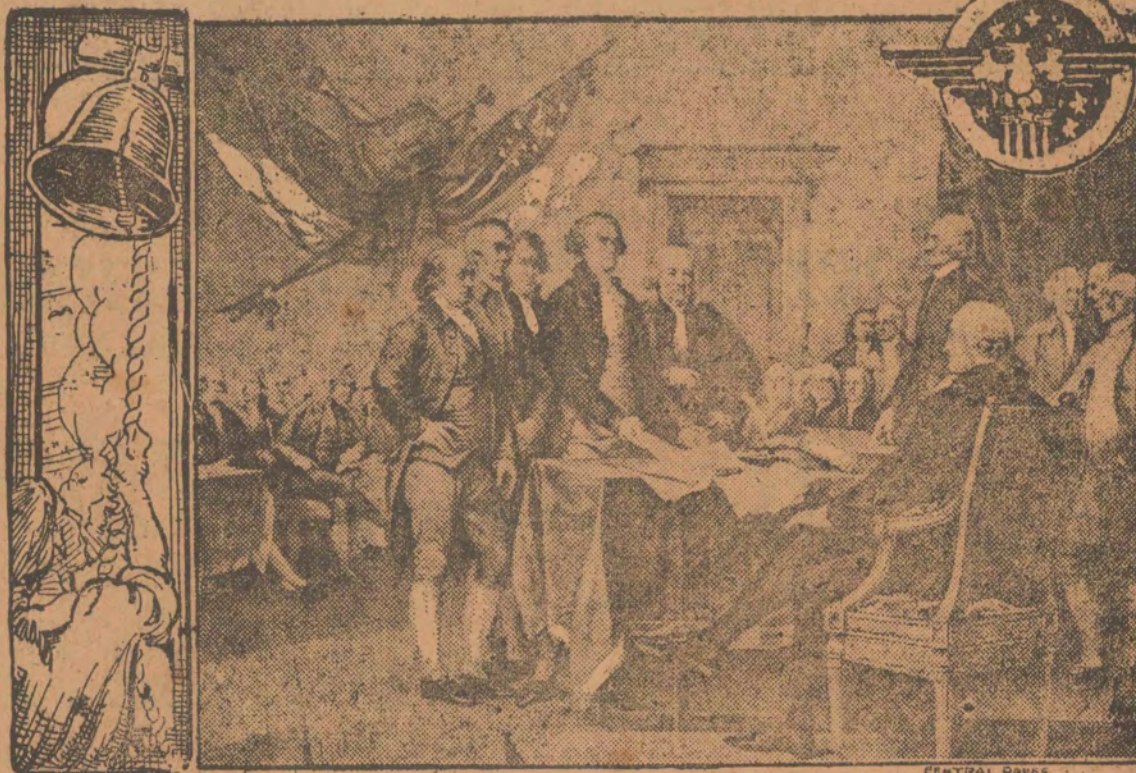
