CAPTAIN COLLIER UP-TO-DATE BOAT

Will Bring Only Bulk Oil
To Key West From
Now On

Possibly a great many people in Key West have heard of the Captain Collier, the Gulf Refining Company's boat which brings oil from Port Tampa to Key West. Captain Davis, her able and genial commander, showed the water over the boat yesterday. She is of steel throughout and as trim a craft as ever crossed a bar. She was built at Cramps Shipyard, near Philadelphia last year, and cost \$42,000.

A visitor to this boat—it is not a steamer—it is driven by gasoline engines—is impressed by her appearance of great strength and her absolute immunity from fire other than that which might be produced by an explosion. She is splendidly appointed, with a galley as clean as a pin and fitted up as elegantly as the galley of an Atlantic liner.

The Captain Collier is propelled by two Standard 75 H. P. gas engines which give her a speed of about eight knots an hour which is not so bad for a tank boat. She is well lighted by electricity.

Her carrying capacity is large. She has eight tanks, each holding 6000 gallons of oil, and in addition she can carry cylinder oil in barrels in her hold.

Captain Davis, who has been with the Gulf Refining Company for five years said that the demand for oil is constantly growing. The company is substituting power boats for the schooners which carried from 200 to 300 drums of oil. The oil is brought by boat from the refinery at Port Arthur, Texas to Port Tampa where there are several power boats in the service of the company. Besides cylinder oil, three grades are carried in those boats—gasoline, kerosene and naphtha. Hardly any naphtha is brought to Key West there being only a few small boats which use it. U. S. Q. gasoline and kerosene, also, Cuba after shipment, street by the Gulf Refining Company are about complete. One will hold 15000 gallons of gasoline and one 15000 gallons of kerosene. Hereafter instead of bringing drums of oil to this port the Captain Collier will both beside the tanks and her powerful pumps will fill them in six hours. She loads at Port Tampa in four hours.

According to Captain Davis the Gulf Refining Co. owns the largest tank steamer in the world—the Omaha which carries oil to European ports from Port Arthur. The Gulf Refining Company is the chief competitor of the Standard Oil Company which also brings here a great quantity of gasoline, kerosene and petroleum products.

YOUNG FIREMAN USED REVOLVER ON SELF

Harvey Stirrup Shot Himself
Twice Last Night At
No. 1 Fire Station

About 8:45 o'clock last night Harvey Stirrup, assistant driver of the hook and ladder truck at No. 1 fire station fired three shots at himself with a heavy 38 calibre Colts revolver, two of which took effect, one in the right shoulder and one in the upper portion of the right arm. Stirrup had nothing to say after the shooting and the reason for his rash act is not known. Immediately after the shooting Dr. J. N. Fogarty was summoned and also Sheriff Jaycocks. His wounds were dressed and he was sent to his home on White St.

One of the firemen at the station started to Journal representative that Stirrup was not acting out of the ordinary in any way before the shooting and said to him: "Dick, if you have the keys to the locker I will open it." He was given the keys and a few minutes later the report of the pistol was heard and Stirrup was found in a corner of the room bleeding from his wounds. The revolver was kept in the locker mentioned.

Stirrup will not suffer serious injury from his wounds.

THE OLDEST MAN LEAVES THE SERVICE

He is 84 Years of Age and
Deserves Rest after 62
Years Work

Chicago, Feb. 24.—John G. Kerr, said to be the oldest postal employee in the United States, has resigned after sixty-two years of continuous service. He is 84 years old.

Kerr began in the service in Painesville, O., in 1850, and three years later came to Chicago. It is said he never has missed a single day since entering the service, and that he has never received a reprimand. The resignation will take effect March 1.

BOSTON MAN SAYS FLAGLER MADE EPOCH

By Disposing Of His Wealth
For Utilitarian
Purposes

F. A. Bisbee of Boston, Mass., came over from Tampa Friday on the Olivette. He registered at the Jefferson and yesterday morning left for Miami, where he will lecture on "The Relation of Modern Church to Modern Life." Mr. Bisbee is a newspaper man and lecturer. He is editor of The Universalist-Leader, and for years has been a member of the Boston Press Club.

I am going to lecture in Miami on Sunday, said Mr. Bisbee. "I have just concluded a lecture tour through Alabama and Georgia and came down here to see the Sea Gorge railroad. Some time ago I caught a glimpse of it when I was on a steamer going from Havana to New York. We were too far out at sea to view it satisfactorily, so this time I made up my mind to ride over it. Apart from the wonderful engineering and constructive skill brought to bear on this great work it spells another lesson. I mean its building has given a new direction to money. Mr. Flagler's idea of putting money—all his own—into over 500 miles of railroad and into a chain of palatial hotels is most significant. Such disposition of great wealth makes a distinct departure from the old-time method of distributing money. Mr. Flagler's way is epochal. Formerly fortunes were given to either religious or benevolent institutions. Mr. Flagler's colossal wealth has been put into utilitarian lines, which contribute to the health, happiness and comfort of the masses."

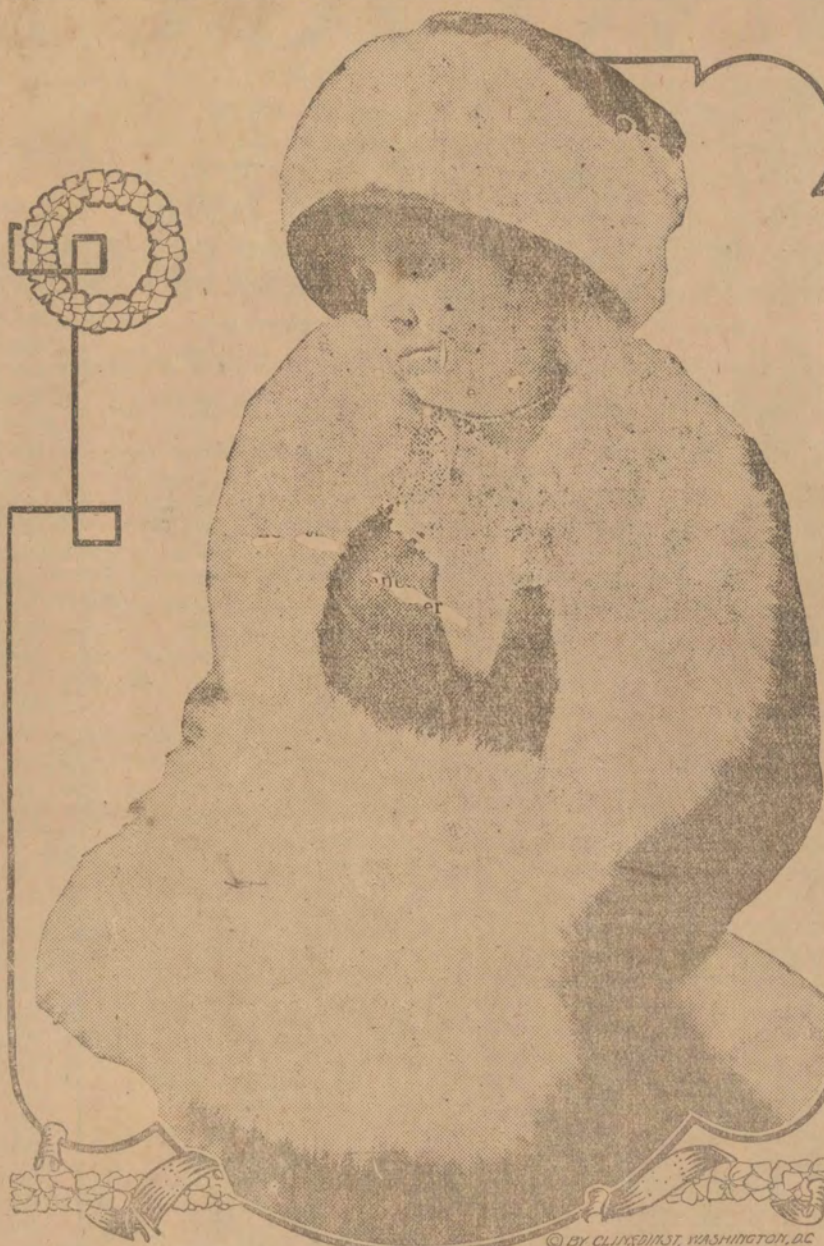

WILL ROOSEVELT BE A CANDIDATE?

There are many Republicans, and many Democrats for that matter, who are of the opinion that Theodore Roosevelt will be a candidate before the Republican National Convention as the party's nominee for President. While The Journal believes that Roosevelt has the undoubted "pull" to appear as a candidate, we do not believe that his party would consider the nomination of a man in the face of previous pledges that he would never again become a candidate. 1912 will witness the defeat of the Republican party, and should Roosevelt head the ticket of his party defeat would be only more certain. Those who follow the trend of political events, however, can see that no man has a chance for the nomination with Taft in the race. The President has enough votes "cinched" to insure his nomination on the first ballot. Taft will head the Republican ticket without doubt, and probably Harmon will be the Democratic nominee, in which event the country will elect a Democratic president.
