## DETAILED STORY OF THE WORLD'S GREATEST MARINE DISASTER IS IN THIS ISSUE

### "WOMEN FIRST" ON TITANIC

#### Gallant Captain Smith Observed Unwritten Law Of The Seas

#### 1350 SOULS PAY TOLL TO MIGHTY OCEAN

#### Women In Night Clothes Picked Up By Cunard Liner Carpathia—urgest Ocean Liner Afloat Goes Down In The Deep and Countless Thousands Mourn —President Taft Orders Fast Cruisers to Rescue "Full Speed Ahead."

New York, April 16 7 p. m.—The country is stunned by the news of the sinking of the White Star liner Titanic and thousands are awaiting news of the awful marine disaster. The rescuing steamer Carpathia has 688 survivors aboard. This increases the list of saved by about 200 from the number first reported. The Virginian and Parisian of the Allan Line whom hope had clung to that they might pick up additional sufferers reported tonight by wireless that they "Had arrived at the scene of the disaster too late to be of service." There are at least 1,350 victims. No word has been received of Col. John Jacob Astor and other millionaires. The President's Military Aide, Major Archibald Butt, is also still reported missing. It is probable that any of the passengers or members of the crew of the Titanic other than those on the Carpathian were alive was abandoned this morning when all steamers which have been cruising in the vicinity of the disaster continued on their voyages.

Specific tidings that the Titanic had sunk came in a brief wireless dispatch to Cape Race, New Foundland, soon after 7 o'clock last night from the Olympic, which reported that the Titanic foundered at 2:20 a. m. Monday in latitude 41:16 North and longitude 50:14 West. The message added that the Carpathia, enroute to Naples at the time, reached the scene of the wreck a daybreak and found only boats and wreckage.

A wireless dispatch came from Campdown, Nova Scotia, saying that passengers were ordered to the lifeboats and that many were scantily clad as they took their place in the boats. This indicates that the Titanic's condition was such that no time could be spared to return to staterooms for clothes. The air was biting cold and the chill that rose from the ice floes caused the passengers to huddle close together to keep warm. Huge quantities of ice floes covered the ocean and in the darkness the crews had to guide the boats with the greatest care to prevent being jammed and overturned. The ice was so heavy that the lifeboats could not force their way through it and as a result the boats finally became separated making the work of rescue extremely difficult.

Daylight came, and with it arrived the Cunard Carpathia, which found only the score of lifeboats filled with

crew and passengers, floating helplessly near where the Titanic had sunk beneath the waves.

Among the missing are Isidor Straus, Benj. Guggenheim, Henry Haris, the theatrical manager, Dr. R. J. Bateman of Jacksonville, Fla., and Major Butts, the President's Aide. Revised estimates of loss of life place it at 1,294 souls. The steamship was worth \$10,000,000 and was insured by Lloyds for \$5,000,000. Her cargo and the jewels on board were worth \$10,000,000.

Capt. Smith of the ill-fated Titanic, which sank on its maiden voyage, although rated as one of the most able commanders, has had his recent career marred with ill luck. He was in command of the Titanic's sister ship Olympic when that vessel collided with the British cruiser Hawk. Exonerated of all blame for that occurrence, he was placed in charge of the Titanic, only to graze disaster when his new charge fouled the steamship New York in the Solent after leaving Southampton on her maiden voyage. He had been in the Line's employ for more than 30 years. While the names of such survivors obtained are largely those of saloon passengers, the unwritten law of the sea was enforced by the gallant captain, "women first." Therefore, it should apply equally to the second cabin and steerage, a regulation which may have cost the lives of many prominent men above decks. Around the steamship line's offices in New York a maddening throng of hysterical men and women are in evidence and have been since the first news arrived.

The speed at which the Titanic was going when she struck the iceberg will perhaps not be known until the first of her survivors reach port. No ship, it is pointed out by shipbuilders here and abroad, no matter how staunchly built nor how many water tight bulkheads protect her, may plunge headlong against a massive wall of ice without grave results. Robert Stocker, Naval Constructor of the Brooklyn Navy Yard said: "In the case of the Titanic, I am inclined to think that her sinking was due to the effects of grounding rather than to the impact of collision. Frequently, a ship strikes what is known as 'pinacle rock' ripping open her keel. The iceberg against which the Titanic smashed her bow may have had some

submerged projection which did damage to the keel. If the forward bulkheads of the vessel had held after the impact which smashed the bow, it certainly seems that the relative buoyancy of the remaining compartments would have been sufficient to keep the ship afloat. I am compelled to believe that a great many of her compartments must have been punctured or sprung."

Lewis Nixon, the eminent naval architect believes the Titanic was either traveling at full speed, or crashed into a berg so tremendous that there was practically no give. If the Titanic struck one of those it is likely that she struck one that had no more give than a rock. Under the circumstances, something had to give way, and as the iceberg did not, the great ship had to crumple up. It is conceivable that an impact of this sort might have buckled her longitudinal plates from end to end, shearing off and starting rivets and opening up the water tight compartments throughout the length of the vessel. Transatlantic steamers travel in well defined routes known as "steamship lanes", the Westbound and the Eastbound. This reduces to a minimum the chances of collision with one another. But icebergs and icebergs have no respect for these routes and float in to the paths or follow across them to be a dire menace in time of fog or very thick weather. There is no way to give warning until too late. Out of a smother of fog a pallid shape may be glimpsed over

the bows to be followed a half minute later by the crush of the bows against the mass of ice.

President Taft has ordered out two revenue cutters to meet the Carpathia to relieve her of some of her passengers. They are Gresham at Boston and Acushnet, Woods Hole, Mass. The Secretary of the Navy at the direction of President Taft has ordered to proceed to sea at once from Hampton Roads, the fast scout cruisers Salem and North Carolina, both of which are equipped with the best wireless in the navy. The President has ordered the commanders to obtain a complete list of the survivors and send the names by wireless. So far, only 317 names have been received.

Capt. Roston of the Carpathia has wired from latitude 41:45 N. and Long. 50:20 W. "Am proceeding to New York unless otherwise ordered, with 500 passengers. There is a twenty mile field of ice with many bergs among it.

The cable steamer Minia reported through wireless to Halifax that she had sighted a great mass of wreckage, but no boats or rafts from the Titanic. The Titanic sank within 4 hours after hitting the icebergs. The designer of the Titanic, Alexander Carlisle of London, believes that the impact tore the Titanic's side out.

#### LATER.

10:30 p. m. No additional news from the Carpathia except that she expects to arrive in New York Thursday with 500 survivors and that some women in night clothes were picked up floating in life boats, indicating that the Titanic must have sunk rapidly as there was no time for passengers to clothe themselves.

#### TORPEDO BOAT NOW ON WAY TO KEY WEST

#### MacKenzie Left Charleston Yes'erday Morning En- route Here.

The naval tug Uncas left Charleston yesterday morning, according to reports received here last night, with the United States Torpedo boat MacKenzie in tow. The latter has been assigned to this station by the navy department for the use of the local battalion of naval militia.

The MacKenzie is 99 feet 3 inches long, 12 feet 9 inches wide with a draft of 4 feet 3 inches. She was built from 1896 to 1899 at Philadelphia by the Chas. Hillman Co. She is of steel construction, has one propeller, has an estimated horse power of 850 and makes a speed of more than 20 knots an hour, which is equal to more than 24 miles.

The assignment of this boat to Key West is a great thing for the naval militia here, and it is highly probable that the assignment of the MacKenzie to Key West will have a very stimulating effect on this proposed new division.

#### FINE TEAMS AT THE MONROE.

Owing to unavoidable circumstances, the teams scheduled to appear at the Monroe Theatre Monday night did not arrive. However, they reached Key West yesterday and appeared last night, and they were well worth waiting for. ## RIGHT WAY TO SALT BUTTER

Use Fine Grained, Clean and Easy Dissolving Article for Purpose—Try to Suit Customers.

Use a fine-grained, clean and easy dissolving salt. Coarse salt is slow to dissolve, and is apt to cut the grain. Use a hair sieve, thereby avoiding lumps and uneven salting. Streaked and mottled butter is caused by improper salting. In testing salt measure off equal quantities to an equal quantity of water, and the salt most quickly dissolved and giving the clearest brine is the salt to use. Salt butter to suit your customers. If the butter is for market, three-quarters of an ounce to the pound is the proper quantity to use. If the butter is to be packed for winter, use one ounce to the pound. Some dairymen salt in the churn. If this method is followed, use one ounce to the pound in working, whether washing the butter or not, be careful to work the moisture well off before salting. This will save salt, save the grain and insure a better body. Use a butter worker; the salt can be better worked in. After salting and working, set the butter in the dairy for a few hours, so the salt can be completely dissolved; then rework and print. The butter should be weighed before salting. One rounding tablespoonful of fine salt equals one ounce. The V-shaped lever butter-worker, made of hard oak wood, is the best one for the farm dairy. It is well

## Chocolate Squares.

One cup of butter, two cups of sugar, three cups of flour, five eggs, beat whites and yolks separately; one small cup of ice water, two teaspoonsful of baking powder sifted in the flour, vanilla flavoring. Cream butter and sugar together until very light; add yolks of eggs then whites, then flour, and finally the ice water. Bake in biscuit pans. When cold cut in squares. Have chocolate frosting ready in a bowl. Dip each square in the frosting and put on a platter to dry. For coconut cakes have white frosting in a bowl and a dish of grated fresh coconut. Dip the squares in the frosting, then roll in the grated coconut.

## Smear Case Cheese.

Two packages, neustebated cheese. Cream with melted butter to make a paste. One ten-cent bottle stuffed olives, chopped very fine, one hard-boiled egg chopped very fine. Salt and cayenne pepper to suit the taste, grated onion to season highly. Mix all together and put in a large cup. Set in cold water, or any fancy mold. Let stand until firm. ## CASES OF BLOAT IN CATTLE

Trocar Will Be Found Invaluable and Farmer Should Not Hesitate to Use the Instrument.

When the farmers turn the cattle in on the clover meadow after the first cutting there is danger of bloat.

Professor Newson of the Colorado station is sending out this advice to cattle growers in his state: A good rule, followed by most men, when a green pasture is to be used for the first time, is to let the cattle fill up on dry hay first and then, after the dew is off turn the animals into the pasture for a short time, better not more than a half hour the first day.

During the first few days it is good policy to watch them closely. A trocar near at hand at this time will be found to be worth more than a hundred stored away in some veterinarian's case. If any animal bloats seriously, do not hesitate to tap, as usually time is only wasted in giving medicine.

Even though the farmer be within reach of a veterinarian, time will ordinarily not permit the latter gentleman to be of any use. The animal will likely die before the veterinarian can reach the place.

A great variety of drugs has been used to stop the bloating, with more or less success, but usually in these acute cases from green feed, the trocar is the only remedy that can be depended upon.

The location for tapping is not nearly so difficult to find as some suppose. Most anywhere between the hip bone and the last rib, on the left side, will do, as it is well to keep in mind that the organ you are trying to tap ordinarily holds from 40 to 60 gallons. About half way between these two points is preferable.

## Sweet Pea Not Royal Chow.

In vain did gardeners and horticulturalists in England try to push the claims of the sweet pea as a coronation flower. Queen Mary has decided that the pink carnation is the blossom she will carry.

The Windsor, which is a deep pink, is the carnation she particularly favors, but the Lawson, a cerise carnation; the Enchantress, which is pale pink, and the Mrs. Jolliffe, which is a non-pink, will also be fashionable during the season. 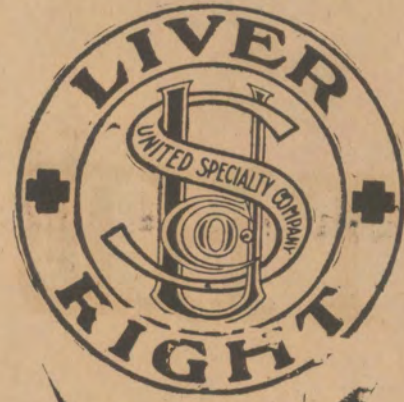

### KEEPING THE HANDS PRETTY

Some Good Beauty Advice to the Woman Who Does Her Own Housework.

Because a woman does her own housework there is no reason why her hands should be coarse and red. Dishes may be washed and all the sweeping and dusting done without in any way destroying the natural texture of the skin, if only a person is willing to take a few simple precautions.

On every sink there should stand a jar of vaseline or other heavy grease. There will also be required a cake of good toilet soap and a pair of old kid gloves. The latter must be perfectly clean inside.

Immediately after washing the dishes and pans the hands should be carefully washed in clean warm water with the toilet soap, using a nail brush at the same time. Incidentally, there will be a tremendous saving to the fingers if the pans are washed by putting a strong soap powder into them as soon as removed from the stove, adding a little hot water and then replacing them on the stove for a few minutes.

When the water comes to a boil a small, stiff brush may be washed around in the tins. They are rinsed in clear water and are scrupulously clean without the fingers having come into contact with the grease.

When the fingers have been washed and wiped, the nails and backs of the hands are to be thoroughly greased and the gloves drawn on. They should be worn all the time that sweeping and dusting is being done. On finishing the housework the gloves are removed and the skin will be found soft and smooth.

If any cream adheres it may be washed off, wiping with a dry towel.

This treatment will keep the skin soft, no matter what work is done.

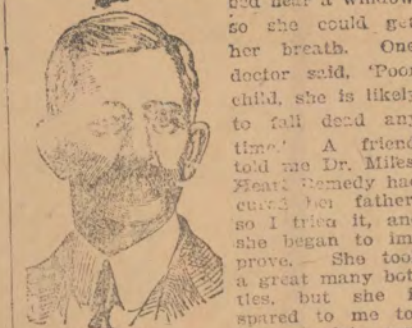
