CUBA TO DECLARE MARTIAL LAW IN ORIENTE PROVINCE

Cuban Congress Will Allow 'This For 45 Days But in no Other Province in the Republic

MONTEAGUDO FOLLOWS GUERRILLA TACTICS

Sixteen Negro Political Prisoners in Jail at Guanajay Overcome Guards and Escape--Six of Them Killed by Rural Guard and Citizens Pursuing

Havana, June 5.—The principal development in the negro situation yesterday was the drafting by the senate committee on laws of a measure suspending the constitutional guarantees in Oriente province for forty-five days and authorizing the president to extend the period if necessary. No other authority is given the president, it being the opinion of the committee that the situation elsewhere in the republic does not justify action.

Considerable excitement was created in Guanajay and Guayabal yesterday afternoon when sixteen negro prisoners escaped from the jail in the former town. Citizens and rural guards were sent to calm the apparently ungrounded fears of the people of Guayabal. No disturbance was reported elsewhere in the island outside of Oriente.

There were no developments yesterday to confirm rumors of a threatened uprising in Havana. The city was quiet. The police are taking adequate precautions to prevent surprise. Thirteen arrests were made, but outside of one case there was no proof of anything approaching a conspiracy.

The Campaign. Advice from Santiago indicates that the federal forces are pursuing the guerrilla tactics outlined by General Monteagudo. Little information was received on the results. An unconfirmed report said that a band of negroes had burned the little town of Jarabuco. No foreign property was destroyed nor were there casualties. Another report said that negroes had hanged three white men at Yerba de Guinea. A mysterious ship is said to have been sighted hovering around the coast of Santiago.

Thirteen Havana Arrests. Thirteen more arrests of negroes were made in the city yesterday. Six of the prisoners are the remainder of the gang which the police are informed has been plotting in the Figueroa street stable of the street department, which, it was asserted,

On To Mexico City

Chihuahua, Mexico, June 5.—General Pascual Orozco, whose attempt to advance on Mexico City from Chihuahua apparently has signally failed, issued an announcement today formally sanctioning an attack on the capital by General Zapata, the rebel chief in the state of Morelos. Zapata is warned by Orozco, however, that in capturing the capital he must not molest foreigners.

BATTLESHIP ARKANSAS STRUCK HIDDEN SHOAL

Tore Ragged Hole In Side And Was Very Near Another Titanic Disaster

Rockland, Me., June 5.—The battleship Arkansas, cruising off the proving ground here yesterday afternoon, struck a hidden reef, tearing a jagged hole in her side.

The watertight compartments, into which the hold of the battleship is subdivided, were immediately closed and, although the vessel had begun taking water rapidly, only one compartment was flooded.

The damage is not serious, although had the compartments not been closed immediately the Arkansas would probably have gone down with all on board, repeating the Titanic disaster.

UNCLE SAMUEL BUYS ROMANTIC ISLANDS

Discoverer of the Pacific Was Falsely Tried and Hung Here

Washington, June 5.—The United States has just come into full ownership of four islands off the Pacific entrance to the canal that have more romance surrounding them than could be found almost anywhere else in the whole world. One of the islands will be fortified with great guns. The others are to be used as coaling stations and barracks. These islands are Naos, Flament, Perico and Culobra. It is probable that one of the greatest forts of the world will be built on Flament Island. The heaviest type of sea coast mortars are to be laid in the pits and 14-inch guns are to be installed to command the ocean approach and the canal up to the first lock. Similar defenses are also to be built on the Atlantic side of the isthmus.

The romantic history of this region, according to the "Catholic Encyclopedia," goes back to the days of Balboa when he discovered the Pacific ocean and made himself governor of Coyba, and was deceived and tricked by Arias, whose daughter Balboa had married. Finally, after the departure of Bishop Quevedo, the true friend of Balboa, the great explorer was falsely tried and beheaded for high treason at Darien.

TEDDY ROOSEVELT WINS THE LAST STATE WHICH WILL HAVE PRIMARY

South Dakota Gives the Colonel All Ten of Her Delegates to National Convention According To Returns From Primary Received Thus Far

GOVERNMENT BUILDING STARTED IN MAGIC CITY

Will Be Built of Cherokee Marble And Will Cost Complete \$160,000

Work began on the new government building this morning. A force of men turned the first dirt at six o'clock, and from now on the corner at Avenue C and Eleventh Street will be the scene of much activity. Contractor Tarbell has been spending the last few days in getting all preliminary plans in shape, and everything is now prepared for the rapid construction of the new post office building.

The blue prints call for a three-story building, of a semi-Greek mold of architecture. Great columns surround the building which will be of Cherokee marble. The main structure will be of white limestone.

The estimated cost of the structure is \$160,000 and when completed will be an ornament to the Magic City of South Florida.—Miami Metropolis.

Sioux Falls, S. D., June 5.—Returns received up to this morning from yesterday's presidential preferential primary election indicate that Theodore Roosevelt has won all ten of the delegates to the Chicago convention on June 18.

The Democratic fight is apparently close but early returns show that Champ Clark is leading over Woodrow Wilson. Harmon seems to have run a poor third. One newspaper estimates that Roosevelt's plurality over Taft and La Follette is at least 12,000. Taft has apparently made a poor race, following at the tail end of the voting. La Follette made a strenuous campaign but is badly defeated even for second place in the result.

Last State Primary. South Dakota is the last of the states to hold primaries. Practically all the Republican delegates have now been chosen. President Taft apparently has no chance for nomination although he maintains that he has 30 more delegates than necessary to nominate. Over 100 of his delegates are disputed by the Roosevelt forces, however. The President declares that he will not abandon the fight until the convention has announced its preference.

CROWD OF MIAMIANS COMING HERE SUNDAY

To See the Atlantic Fleet and Ball game between Miami and Key West

(From Miami Metropolis.) A record-breaker smash in rates has been announced by the F. E. C. Railroad for a Miami-Key West excursion Sunday, of \$3.00 for the round trip.

The one-way fare is ordinarily \$6.00, and any mathematician can figure that the Sunday trip will be a reasonable one from point of expenses. The big drawing card of the trip will be the fleet of war ships now harbored at the Island City. The traveler may see the Washington, the Georgia, the Nebraska, the New Jersey, the Rhode Island, the Minnesota, the Mississippi, the Ohio and the Missouri, to say nothing of the big supply ships, colliers and torpedo boats.

But this attraction will be as nothing to some enthusiastic Miami fans compared to the baseball game which will be played between the local team and the Key West nine. These two teams have met many times before on the diamond, and there are some old scores on both sides which each is anxious to wipe out.

The special train will leave Miami at 6 o'clock Sunday morning, arriving in Key West about noon. On the return the train will leave Key West at 7:30 and arrive in Miami shortly after midnight.

UNITED STATES HAS SOLD CUBA RIFLES

5,000 "Krag's" and 1,000,000 Rounds of Ammunition for "Cuba Libre"

Washington, June 5.—The state department today authorized the application of the Cuban government for five thousand rifles and a million rounds of ammunition, which is to be used in arming the volunteers and guards organized by plantation owners to protect their property against the insurgents.

The weapons are second hand, but have been supplied with new barrels. Krag-Jorgenson rifles will be sold to Cuba at about \$5 each.

A man who can truly call himself a good citizen may well feel proud of it. Good citizenship means much and is assuredly worth striving for. But merely because a man has managed to keep out of jail thus far is no convincing evidence that he is a good citizen.

Ask an Atlanta man something about Atlanta and he will tell you that the Creator made Atlanta first, and all other burghs on the map are just remnants which were left. It is said that every man who ever spent fifteen minutes in that city caught the "Atlanta Spirit" and forever after was an Atlanta Booster. That's the kind of spirit needed in Key West. We have a population of 25,000 and we should have a boosting population of 25,000.

And speaking of perversity we are reminded that most of us are prone to notice the perversity much more than the blessedness of things. The

probability is that if that sluice was not where it is the paving would likewise be missing. All of which would seem to indicate that there is an element of good in all things—except those in which there isn't.

We are of the opinion that the Florida East Coast Railway would take in a box car full of money, more or less, if they ran a Sunday excursion from Key West to Miami at a three dollar round trip rate. We Conchs would like to get a little better acquainted with the Miami crackers, but we feel some delicacy about giving up twelve E Pluribus Unums in order to further that acquaintance.

When Key West added Col. Thos. J. L. Brown to its list of citizens it accomplished more than was at the time suspected. Although Col. 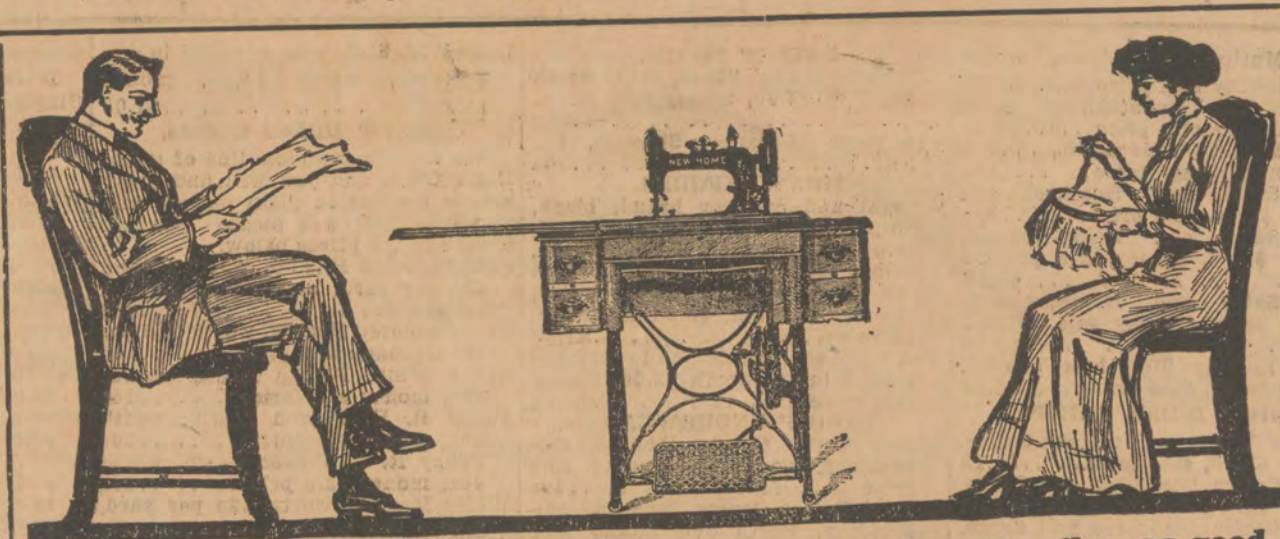

LONDON STRIKERS ISSUE ULTIMATUM

All Men dismissed must be Reinstated or There Will Be No Work

London, June 5.—The leaders of the strike of dockmen and transport workers issued an ultimatum to the cabinet today.

They demand that a joint board of arbitration be created representing all the interests involved in the strike, insisting that the employers be held responsible to the men who shall be represented officially by the Transport Workers Federation.

The employers have refused to recognize the union or treat with the strikers through it. The strikers declare that no men shall resume work until all who have been dismissed are reinstated.

TAFT WANTS CONTEST FOUGHT IN THE OCEAN

Press Boys will be present When Contests Are Considered Tomorrow

Chicago, June 5.—A letter from President Taft to Chairman New, of the sub-committee on arrangements for the republican national convention, suggesting that the meeting of the committee at which contests will be heard, be public, was received at national committee headquarters today.

Taft suggests that New consult with the committeemen on the matter of open sessions, and if possible to have open sessions.

New said tonight that the suggestions of the president would have great weight with the committee. As Roosevelt has made a similar request the indication is that the doors will be thrown open at least to newspaper men, when the contests are considered Friday.

Taft headquarters were opened here today in the same building in which are the headquarters of the Roosevelt southern delegates. The situation was discussed by two members of the national committee reaching here today.

Henry S. Clubb, of Florida, declared that it was a reflection on the integrity of Florida republicans to hint that they would not stand by their instructions for Taft.

PRESIDENT TAFT WINS SIX OHIO DELEGATES

Gets Six More Delegates from Home State That At First Expected

Columbus, Ohio, June 4.—President Taft demonstrated that he still controlled the Ohio Republican machine when he won the six delegates at large to Chicago named at the convention here.

The presidential preferential primaries instructed 32 of the 42 regular delegates for Roosevelt. Taft's victory today, while small, gives him six more delegates to the national convention.
