"JOE THE TURK" IS COMING TO KEY WEST

Celebrated Salvation Army Character Will Arrive Here Next Week.

"Joe, The Turk," a celebrated character will visit Key West Aug. 1 to 14, under the auspices of "The Salvation Army."

Joe has visited several European countries and had a great time in England, also in France, Athens and other cities in Greece. The last place visited was Smyrna and Turkey in Asia.

Joe will speak of the barbarous and blood-shedding Turks, showing how they butcher the helpless Armenians.

This Salvation Army celebrity, a citizen of this country for over 21 years, and has been in the Salvation Army for 28 years. He has traveled every part of the United States wearing a full Turkish costume and plays the cornet, clarinet, saxophone and Turkish drum. On his recent return from Turkey he bought a two-edged sword, such as is spoken of in the Bible, and he places on exhibition. Joe speaks on a different subject at each meeting. He has been in jail for Christ's sake 32 times in the United States and once in Turkey. He represents the trade department of New York city and carries a supply of uniforms, bonnets, etc., he also carries an assortment of notions and wall texts.

His great masterpiece is a Zonophone Saxophone sacred concert which is a unique and purely original entertainment. The instrument is the latest and best made.

Every one should hear the experience of Joe as he is not only a converted Turk but he has traveled all over this country and in other countries in Europe. Joe the Turk will be with the Salvation Army in their services at the Tabernacle and on the streets, Aug. 1 to 4.

PLENTY OF ACTIVITY IN THE VARIOUS CITIES OF FLORIDA

Short Items Showing The Growth And Development of Hustling Florida Towns—Lakeland Will Have New Trust Company And Also a New Bank

St. Augustine.—One of the largest real estate deals of the summer has just been consummated whereby Sheriff C. J. Perry assumes the ownership of the Chiquita hotel property, located on King street opposite the Plaza. Sheriff Perry purchased the property from Percy C. Stickney, through the agency of W. R. George, the consideration being \$250,000. It is a large three-story stone building, located in the heart of the city.

Tampa.—Tampa retail Dealers' association will organize a mutual insurance company, with a capital stock of \$200,000. The organization is said to be on account of the high insurance rates that are charged in Tampa and the merchants interested in the movement for a mutual company are expected to place their insurance with it. The idea is not a new one and has some advantages and some disadvantages.

Lakeland.—Lakeland is forging to the front in all lines, the latest enterprise being the organization of a trust company with a capitalization of \$125,000, with the privilege of increasing to \$250,000 when occasion and business demands.

Pensacola.—Pensacola is holding her own in births, according to a report which has been compiled, and will be submitted to the city council at an early date. This will show a total of 300 births during the past year and exactly the same number

of deaths. The latter, however, does not really represent the death rate, for in the list is included all of the tourists who come here at an advanced age and die, as well as parties dying in other cities whose bodies are shipped here for burial.

Lakeland.—Lakeland is to have a new banking institution, the name of which will be the American State bank. As soon as the local requirements are complied with the bank will be open for business.

Tampa.—Mr. and Mrs. William Bertrand of 817 Bell street this city, are asking on all sides for some clue to the whereabouts of their daughter, Celia Genevieve, whom they have not seen since some ten and one-half years ago when she was a child 6 years old, and when, according to their story they turned the child over to some friends to keep for them for the time being, Bertrand being ill.

St. Petersburg.—The board of equalization of taxes composed of the finance committee of the city has just rendered its report, which shows a steady increase in the property value of the city of St. Petersburg over last year.

The city assessor had raised the assessment over half a million dollars, but the board decided that owing to the increase of all properties in value had not been assessed according to their respective worth consequently, the board raised it to an increase of over a million dollars.

One-fourth of the amount has already been raised.

DEMONSTRATION OF GAS STOVES TODAY

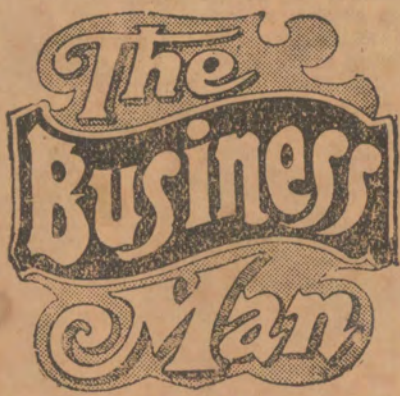

PREPARING FOR THE GREAT BATTLE.

It is a common sight to see a group of young fellows congregated on a corner or in some other public place, patting each other on the back, figuratively speaking, by the statement that "There's no chance for a fellow these days." And that statement is absolutely correct when it applies to "fellows" who feel that way about it.

In our boyhood days all of us were prone to dream, and to pile up imaginary fortunes and honor without end. But later we found that life is a grim reality. There are no places waiting for a young man today, unless he inherits a position. He must dig out a place for himself and prove to the world that he has the ability and the desire to do things. There are several qualities which he must possess to attain success in whichever walk in life he may choose, and none of these is more important than that quality possessed by the postage stamp—stick-to-it-iveness. The world has no use for a quitter, and the man who is constantly changing from one thing to another usually is successful in none.

There are a great many boys in Key West—and girls—who when they reach their majority are not going to be prepared for the great battle of life. Intellectually, they are going to fall below the grade which makes success more easily attainable. In other words, there are boys growing up in the city of Key West today who will face the world without even a partial common school education. They will be handicapped at the very outset, for life is mostly a cold blooded business proposition and the desirable positions are open to those who are best equipped, morally, physically and intellectually. From time to time highly educated men are found who did not begin their education until they were grown, but these are rare instances, and these men will tell you that the time to prepare for the battle of life is in boyhood when the mind is susceptible and retentive.

There is no chance in Key West, nor in any other city, for the young man who lacks initiative and aggressiveness. "There is no chance for a fellow these days," some say, but just look around a little today and see how many "fellows" have made good in Key West. There are lots of young men in Key West today who may be said to have attained success, or as the French put it, to have arrived. And by young men, we mean men up to forty-five years of age. There are many successful young men in this city, but they did not win success by sympathizing with each other because there was no "chance" for them. They began life with the fixed determination of making good and they hewed to the line from the beginning, never for a moment losing sight of the goal. Practically every one of them faced the world without a penny, but they had prepared themselves for this struggle by cultivating their minds, and obtaining that which can neither be bought nor sold, and to which there is no royal road.

The boys of today will be the young men of a few years hence. Some of the boys growing up now are to fill responsible positions in Key West within a few years. How many will be prepared then? How many are preparing now for the future?

Another thing: Look around you and note the number of lawyers, doctors, judges, legislators and men in all professions and in all lines of business, and figure out how many of them began life with anything besides an educational equipment. Not many.

Whether there will be a "chance" for the boys and girls now growing up depends largely on themselves. A common school education is placed within the reach of all, and if a boy or girl does not take advantage of this, then the responsibility rests upon them and upon their parents.

GIVE THE BOYS A SQUARE DEAL.

While on the subject of boys and young men, it may be well to say that the young men and boys of Key West are not getting a square deal because of the fact that they are surrounded on every hand by various gambling games and devices, and subjected to temptations which the law plainly states shall not be, temptations to which the average young man is very susceptible. We speak from a limited experience, and from the standpoint of an average man.

We put it up to the parents of Key West as a fair question: Do you think your boy is getting a square deal when you are obliged to rear him in an atmosphere which fairly reeks with the taint of gambling? If he is not, then why is this evil allowed to exist? Who is responsible for these conditions? Is it not a fact that the law plainly states whose duty it shall be to suppress violations of the law, or did we merely dream that.

Ask the business men of the city what effect this wave of bolito and other forms of gambling is having on their business. If they tell you what they have told us, they will tell you that their sales show a falling off and that they have great difficulty in collecting their bills. Why? Because the money that should be passing through legitimate channels, the money which should be used to pay bills which have been contracted, is going into the pockets of the bolito men and the gamblers. If you want to know why business is slack THAT'S the reason and every thinking man KNOWS it.

Key West, with its incomparable climate, its remarkable healthfulness, and its hospitable people COULD and SHOULD be an earthly paradise, but it is a crying shame and a black disgrace to the city that the gambling evil, doing its deadly work in violation of the law, should

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

THE GROWTH OF THE KINGDOM.

LESSON TEXT—Mark 4:26-32, Matt. 13:33.
GOLDEN TEXT—"Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, as in heaven so on earth."—Matt. 6:10.

Last week we observed the fact that the genesis of this new kingdom Jesus came to establish was to be the life, his life, when was as seed. The reception of the seed in various sorts of soil, however, made a vast difference as to the ultimate outcome. Today we may observe from these words of the Master what are to be the processes of the establishing of the kingdom, for we do not read into this parable a record of the final consummation, but rather that these parables reveal different aspects of the same general process.

While it is true that this first parable is only recorded by St. Mark it is in reality a complement of these parables about the kingdom found in the thirteenth of Matthew and elsewhere. We have already noted that the seed is the word, Luke 8:11, and that the soil is the hearts of men, but here Jesus tells us that in the spiritual as in the material universe man "knoweth not how" the life principle propagates itself. It is a helpful thought to every Christian worker that he is not to be held accountable for that part of the process; his part is to be that of the man who shall cast the seed into the ground. Not upon, but "into" (v. 26). Having thus planted the seed let him "sleep and rise again" e. g., let him trust a wise God to see to it that the seed germinate and bring forth. All of your worrying and mine cannot hasten the process nor change the result once the seed is sown, so let us be careful to sow them right and as far as possible be sure we plant it in properly prepared soil.

Process is Gradual.

Again let us beware of presumptuousness "he knoweth not how." Can you, my reader, define life? Can you explain the transmission, the development, the propagation of life? We accept the results of these things in nature without questioning, why stagger at similar things in the spiritual realm? Why question the reality of the Christian life when we see all about us its results? In verses 22 and 23 of this same chapter we are admonished that if we have ears "let him hear" (a positive injunction) and almost the very next word tells us to "take heed what we hear." Going on down to verse 28 of the lesson we see clearly the reason for these words, for our lives will grow and will reproduce each after its own kind. If we sow wheat we reap wheat. If we allow tares to be sown in our lives we shall reap tares.

The process is a gradual one, but a sure one. "First the blade, then the ear, and then the full corn in the ear." The harvest will not take place until the process be completed. It is not till the fruit is ripe that the husbandman puts forth his sickle. We are not to bother ourselves so much with the process as we are to guard the source. Sow good seed and God will see to it that it shall bring forth. Let us not expect the "full corn" of ripe experience from the "tender blade" of early Christian life. Let us have patience till these young Christians have time to reach the full maturity of their powers. Jesus the harvester of this parable knew when to put in the sickle, viz., when the fruit is "ripe" (v. 29, R. V.).

The Main Truth.

Looking back over history his was indeed "less than all the seeds in the earth," yet he set into motion those principles and powers that have caused his kingdom to become great in the earth (Isa. 9:7). Under the branches of this kingdom have lodged the weary and the stricken ones. The birds of the air symbolize the gathering together of the nations of the earth that they may take refuge under the shelter and shadow of the kingdom of God, see Ezek. 17, Daniel 4, etc. We must beware of fanciful interpretations or applications. The main truth is that almost without exception the beginnings of all great movements in the kingdom of God have been like mustard seed, small but exceeding great in their growth. Witness such moral developments as the slavery question. Compare the present day temperance agitation with what it amounted to one hundred, yes, twenty-five years ago. The same can be said of countless other "movements."

For the third parable that of the leaven which a woman hid in the three measures of meal we need to refer to Paul's inspired words as recorded in 1 Cor. 5:6-7 and Gal. 5:8-9. Here Paul explicitly tells us that leaven is a type of sin. That we who are in Christ are a new lump, unleavened. That the old leaven is that of malice and wickedness, but that we who have put away leaven are the bread of sincerity and truth. What do we therefore infer? Viz., that as growing up alongside the good seed shall also grow the tares with fruitage of death and decay.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

HEARING AND DOING.

LESSON TEXT—Luke 6:33-49.
GOLDEN TEXT—"Be ye doers of the Word, and not hearers only, deluding your own selves."—James 1:22.

Last week we had from the lips of Jesus three illustrations of that false righteousness which he will not countenance in his new kingdom. Today's lesson is the last of the present series which has to do with the fundamental teachings expressed by Jesus in his manifesto and it is emphasized by the Golden Text taken from James' epistle.

Jesus begins with a short parable which, though not recorded by Matthew as being used in this same connection is here used to introduce and to explain what was said about the mote and the beam. Parenthetically Jesus informs us that we are not above our Master. We must teach principally in the same manner he taught, e. g., by our lives. He has been setting forth the manner of life to be followed by his disciples. He is the incarnate truth, and in that fact lay his power and success as a teacher, so as we incarnate his life, live his life before the world, we shall most successfully teach. His sight was unimpaired, hence his ability and power. Jesus, however, guards against any self-assumed righteousness upon the part of his followers by telling us that "everyone" that is every disciple, "when he is perfected shall be as his master" (v. 40). No leader or teacher has ever made any great and lasting contribution or impression upon history except as he has in a measure emulated the life of Jesus or followed the principles he taught the world.

Beam and Mote.

It is as we are being perfected, follow on after perfectness in Christ Jesus, that we are effectually able to see for ourselves and to lead others. Jesus by means of this teaching about the beam and the mote shows us how impossible it is for a man who is himself disobedient to the truth to be able to do anything that will help others who are in a like state of disobedience. He plainly implies that it is not only impossible but actually a sin for one who has a beam, a "splinter" in his eye to attempt to remove the mote—a light speck of dust—from the eye of another. The sin of attempting to teach that which we ourselves do not obey is greater than the sin of him who is not obedient but makes no attempt to teach the truth and called forth the emphatic "thou hypocrite" of Jesus. How many fathers desire their sons to walk in the path of truth and yet they make no effort to remove the beam from their own eyes—hypocrites—is it to be wondered at that they both fall into the ditch?

Jesus emphasizes all of this by use of the figure of fruit-bearing. The preposterousness of our looking for figs upon thorn bushes, or to look for grapes upon a bramble bush is patent to all. We know that corruption is not so much a matter of infection as it has to do with inward purity. If the tree of life is pure it will yield perfect fruit, for life always reproduces its own type, in the same manner the influence a man exerts is the influence of what he is in his own life.

In verse 46 Jesus adds further light upon this matter of hypocrisy. He has already told us we are to build upon his words, which were the truth. Now he shows us that to call him "Lord, Lord" with lips only, and not because of a heart conviction, even though it be known and heard of all men, will not avail. This sort of crying aloud shall be tested by him who knows the thoughts and the intents of the heart and it, too, shall receive the just reward of all hypocrisy. To cry "Lord, Lord" to judge others by different standards from those by which we judge ourselves, is but another evidence of the sin of selfishness.

Obedience the Only Proof.
If we will read Paul's epic upon love (1 Cor. 13) daily it will clarify our vision and correct the motive of our lives so that its fruit will be acceptable to God. Obedience is the only one and only acceptable proof that we are friends of Jesus (John 15:14). To further add light and significance to this whole matter Jesus tells us of the two kinds of foundations upon which men build. That upon the solid rock may be severely tried, as shall all the works of man's hands, but being rightly founded the storm breaks and not the house.

Is your house founded upon the living word or upon the speculations of science? Face this question we must. Lesson outline:

After several hours of cross-examination by Silverstein, Kaul broke down and confessed that he, with George Wren and George Roddy, all employed in the Piedmont hotel, had plotted the robbery and had divided the jewels.

"I have worked hard all my life," Kaul, "and I welcomed the chance to come to New York and see Broadway and have some fun with the chorus girls. I wanted to live like a millionaire, if it was only for a week. I know Mr. Gilsey had a lot of jewelry and the temptation was too much for me. That's all."

Kaul was traced to New York, where he was lost. Silverstein located him at the home of his cousin, Arthur Von Gastel, at 161 Eleventh avenue, Mount Vernon. He was remanded without bail.

Potato Balls.

Take equal parts of cold boiled potatoes and raw ones. Peel and grate the raw and squeeze out through cloth; now grate the boiled potatoes and mix with the raw; add salt, flour enough to form in balls; have ready little squares of bread, browned in butter; take two heaping tablespoons of potatoes and put two or three squares of bread in center; now form in balls with hands; drop in boiling salted water and boil fifteen minutes. NOTED FLORIDA CITY

St. Augustine Was Once an Indian Village.

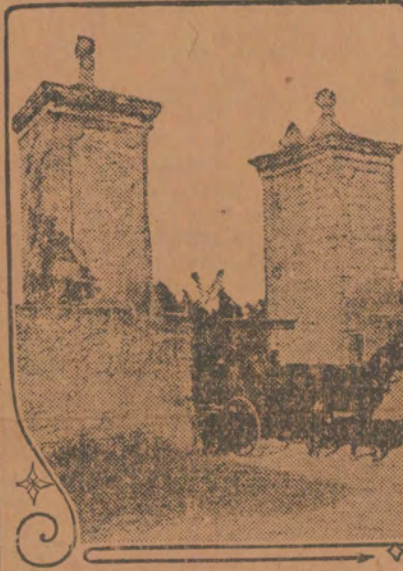
First Colony Established by French Huguenots in 1564 Was Razed by the Spaniards and Its Inhabitants Killed.

St. Augustine, Fla.—Four centuries ago an Indian town known as Seloy stood on the site of what is now St. Augustine. On Easter Sunday, 1512, Ponce de Leon, Spanish explorer, landed there in search of the "Fountain of Youth." After he and his men had floundered through the sandy swamps of the vicinity and tramped among the scrub palmetto, bathed in every stream, pool and mudhole they came across, without success, they embarked and the Indian village remained unmolested by white men for more than fifty years.

A colony of French Huguenots landed at the same point in 1564, but soon moved on to the St. John's river. The news of their arrival reached Phillip II. of Spain, and upon realizing the full import of the message—that a colony of Protestants was settling in his new world domain—he dispatched Pedro Menendez to exterminate them.

This second group of invading Spaniards landed at the same Indian village on August 25, 1565, and because that was St. Augustine's day upon the church calendar they gave the place its present name. St. Augustine is consequently the oldest permanent settlement of Europeans within the territory of the United States. The Huguenot settlement was not permanent for the reason that Menendez and his men destroyed their fort and massacred the inhabitants.

The first fort was built in octagonal form and was constructed of the trunks of pine trees. It was named San Juan de Pinos (St. John of the

Butter and Cheese.

Good butter has no strong odor. It is of an even, golden yellow and has a fine grain; if slick it has not been properly handled. It should never be marbled in appearance. If there is too great proportion of moisture present the butter breaks easily. In this case the purchaser pays for the water. Cheese should be of good color, depending on the variety, and of fine grain. The cheese with large air cells is usually not of the best quality; if the fat separates from the body of the cheese rapidly it usually indicates the addition of foreign fat.

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INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR JULY 28

THE WHEAT AND THE TARES

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 13:24-30; 36-42.
GOLDEN TEXT—"Gather up first the tares, and bind them in bundles to burn them; but gather the wheat into my barn." Matt. 13:23.

The thirteenth chapter of Matthew's gospel is the great kingdom chapter of the Bible. Seven parables in this chapter give us each of seven aspects or applications of the principles of the kingdom. In this lesson we are taught the mixed character of the kingdom and also of the ultimate separation of two classes of which it is composed. "A man," v. 24, goes out to sow good seed in his field. This man we are told in v. 37, is the Son of Man, and elsewhere that the field is the world, the hearts of men. Then followed the propagating stage, that period over which man has no control. During this period while men ate and slept awaiting the time for cultivation and of harvest, the enemy of men's souls came and sowed tares, the common dandelion which so closely resembles wheat in its earliest stages. After this propagating period had passed the man and his servants went out one day to find in their field evidence that another had also sown seed. The test of every life is the fruit produced. During these earlier stages the tares had looked so nearly like the wheat as not to be readily distinguished, but now that the harvest time approaches the difference is all too evident. It is significant from this parable that no blame is laid upon the servants that they should have allowed the two to grow up during this first stage. Surprise, anger and disappointment stirred the hearts of the servants when they discovered the mixed character of the approaching harvest. The master, however, clears them of all blame, for, said he, "Our enemy hath done this." Not an enemy, as the King James version has it. Satan is ubiquitous, but the Son of God is greater than he, see 1 Peter 3:22.

Parables He Taught.

If the servants had sought to uproot the tares they would in all likelihood have done more damage than good, though this does not imply any conflict with Jesus' words as found in Matthew 5:29, 30. The seed had the same environment and in God's good time the separation should take place, so "let both grow together" until both be fully developed. Then he will say to the reapers, gather first the tares and burn them, but gather the wheat into my barn. Notice the tares did not evolve into wheat. Like begets like. Gather into bundles is the command. If we sin together, we must expect to suffer together. The wheat was ripe for full salvation, blessing and a further usefulness, while the tares were ripe only for destruction.

After teaching these parables, of which this is but one, Jesus sent the multitude away and more fully and completely taught his disciples the inner meaning of this parable. The field is the world, and if we ask we shall have the heathen for our inheritance and the uttermost part of the world as a possession (Ps. 2:8). The good seed are the sons of the kingdom, but the tares are the sons (children) of the evil one. Both the sons of the good and the sons of the bad grow from, and develop out of seed, the sons of the kingdom from the good seed.

We must remember the three lessons we have been studying. The first concerned the nature of the seed and the soil; the second deals with the mystery of the growth and development of the kingdom, whereas this lesson has to do with the mixed.

World the Field.

As the Psalmist puts it (1:5), "The ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, e. g., has no standing, nor sinners (abide) in the congregation of the righteous." It is not our place to gather the tares into bundles. God will send forth reapers (v. 30) and his reapers are the angels (v. 39). The fact is we are here warned against useless or profitless activity. Ours is to sow the right seed and then stand back and let God work. We are not even responsible for any process of separation, for God will take care of his own and in his own time will send forth his reapers who will do what we would make sorry work of attempting to do. How often we see men zealously attempting the separation process during the propagating and developing period, only to uproot the wheat with the dandelion. Evil, we are clearly shown, will not gradually disappear from the world, but on the contrary it will grow, develop and bear along beside the wheat until "the harvest." After the harvest it will be all too clear which is good and which is bad. The language of Jesus is graphic—"cast and fling" express indignation and contempt; "furnace of fire" denotes the fierceness of the torment of punishment, and the "gnashing of teeth" and the "wailing" is a terrible picture of anguish and despair. As against this, he tells us that the righteous shall shine forth free from all clouds or shadow.

TO COOK VEGETABLES

HELPFUL SUGGESTIONS FROM DOMESTIC SCIENCE EXPERT.

Green Peas, Beans, Cabbage, Cauliflower and Such Like Should Be Cooked in Uncovered Dishes to Remove Acid Taste.

Vegetable foods include the cereals, legumes and tubers, roots and bulbs, green vegetation and vegetable fruits and flowers. Of the whole list the cereals are the most valuable, including as they do the grains from which the bread of nearly all the world is made, but rice and corn are the cereals not commonly referred to in lists of vegetables.

Legumes all belong to the pulse family and the edible portion is in the shape of a pod, usually and though there are many thousand species only a few kinds are used on the table, beans, peas and lentils being the ones most in use. All legumes are rich in nitrogenous matter, and if properly cooked and consumed in reasonable quantities may to some extent replace a portion of meat in the daily dietary. There is scarcely any fat in the leguminous foods, so oil or some fat is wisely added.

When green beans, peas and tender legumes have been removed from their pods they should be cooked gently in simmering water, but when the pods and all are used they should be boiled rapidly.

When the green peas and beans, etc., have grown a little old, but must be cooked, a tiny pinch of soda will make them tender if added to the water they are boiled in and it helps to retain their bright green color.
