The funeral will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock from St. Paul's Church, the ceremonies being in charge of the Masonic Orders, of which he was a member. Rev. C. T. Stout will officiate, and the interment will be under the direction of Ben J. Lopez, in the city cemetery.

Ordinance Number 50 Council Series.

An Ordinance to provide for the paving of a part of Grinnell street in the city of Key West; the grading and curbing of same; designating the material with which said paving shall be done and providing for the payment for said work.

Whereas, it has been recommended to the City Council by the Board of Public Works together with an estimate orally presented by the consulting engineer of the said board that the part of Grinnell street be paved.

Now therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Key West in regular session convened.

Section 1.
That the following named street shall be paved with new vitrified brick, to wit:
Grinnell street from the North side of Fleming street to the North side of Caroline street.

Section 2.
All of the grading, curbing and re-setting curbing necessary to the work provided for in the foregoing section shall be done in accordance with the plan of the Board of Public Works, and the said Board is hereby authorized and directed to have the said work done.

Section 3.
The cost of said work shall be provided for in the same manner as is provided for in the "General forms and contract stipulations for proposed Municipal improvements in Key West, Florida," and all of the said work shall be done in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof and the improvements here provided for shall be deemed to be part of the "improvements provided for in said General forms and specifications."

Section 4.
All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section 5.
This ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage, approval and publication.

HARDENING OF ARTERIES NOT DUE TO CEREALS.

Is it true, as many authorities contend, that bread and the cereals in general contain large percentages of mineral matter, particularly lime, which are deposited in the arteries, hardening them and thus acting as a "staff of death," instead of the staff of life, as bread has been called? Dr. Densmore, who has been the chief advocate of this theory in recent years, has died comparatively young. There is no satisfactory proof that the horse and other cereal eating animals are short-lived because they eat cereals largely. Men have lived longer on bread with buttermilk, which contains much lime, than on anything else, as the cases given by Metchnikoff in his "Prologation of Life" and the celebrated English case, "Old Parr," indicate. The lion is not long lived without cereals, nor the cow that lives on grass. The mental factor must be considered. The food of the eagle does not differ materially from that of many birds that live half as long. Heavy mineral water is probably a more efficient source of hardening of the arteries than food—and soft water of preventing it. No food is perfect, but it is probable that one could live longer on cereals and buttermilk than on any other food, considering the difficulty of getting a uniformly fresh supply of fruits, nuts and vegetables.

USE OF DRUGS DIMINISHING.

"No medicine will be given by and by, for people are going to eat the right things." Dr. W. A. Evans of the Chicago Board of Health quotes this statement of a widely traveled, experienced English nurse, speaking of the preparation of food for invalids. Dr. Wiley has been quoted to the same effect. The expense for drugs at the Massachusetts General hospital has been reduced 50 per cent. in ten years. In the same article, Dr. Evans says that "a cup of hot water is a good temporary stimulant in case of fainting or temporary exhaustion. It has its advantages over alcohol for this purpose. There will probably always be use for drugs, but natural means of course, and especially food are to be used more in place of drugs.

MIXING RICE AND BEANS.

"When rice and beans are eaten at the same meal, must the rice be retained in the stomach till the beans are ready to pass out?" a subscriber asks the editor of a health magazine. The answer, "Not necessarily," is necessarily incomplete and unsatisfactory to one who wishes to know whether the monodiet theory so much emphasized in these Hints is as important as it must be if the arguments in its support are well founded. The correct answer to the question can be definitely determined by eating a meal of beans and rice and withdrawing the contents of the stomach two hours afterwards, when it will be found that the beans and the rice are so well mixed that to separate them would be a much greater tax upon the stomach, if that were possible, than to retain the rice three hours instead of one, whatever the effect of that may be. Scientific investigation requires reasons for all phenomena, but the practical application of the monodiet is easily determined by experience.

The GREATEST PLAY I EVER SAW

AS TOLD TO
Hugh S. Fullerton

I have seen a lot of plays that were great, extraordinary, that were startling and sets the crowds crazy. It is usually hard to pick the greatest, but the one I recall was in a long forgotten game in a little minor league, and it was made by players who shone for a time in the big circuit and were slipping back.

The play was the headiest, the most surprising and altogether the most wonderful I ever witnessed, and although it was made more than twelve years ago I never have forgotten one of the circumstances.

The play happened during the latter part of the season of 1898 at Lancaster, Pa., in a game between the teams of Lancaster and Allentown. Old "Piggy" Ward, who had been famous before that, was playing second base for Lancaster, and Spiggle was pitching. The game was a close one. The score was tied, 2 to 2 in the eleventh inning, and the two teams were battling desperately for the victory as they were rivals in the pennant race, and at that time it seemed as if one or the other would win the pennant.

Ollie Smith came to bat for Allentown with a runner on third base and two out, and another runner on first. Spiggle was a slow ball pitcher, and with two balls and two strikes called he floated up a slow teaser, and Smith hit that ball as hard as ever a baseball was hit. He had called the turn on the slow ball, and took a run to meet it and hit it with all his might. It went like a shot straight at Piggy Ward. The ball was hit so hard that Piggy set himself and braced to break it down and throw out the runner; and just as he was setting himself his foot slipped and at the same instant the ball took a bad bound and jumped straight at his shining bald head. Ward had dropped his hands to save himself from falling when he lost his footing, and it looked as if the acci-

dent had beaten his team. But Piggy was game. He saw the victory slipping away, saw that he would not be able to get his hands up in time to touch the ball, and shutting his eyes he ducked that old shining bald head of his and butted that ball as hard as he could.

Piggy sat down rather hard, dazed and stunned, and put his hand up to the spot the ball had hit. The whole trademark was branded on the top of his head, and there was a lump that was swelling like a balloon being filled with gas. But the ball he butted bounded as straight and true as if it had been thrown straight into Spiggle's hands, and Spiggle turned and threw Smith out at first base, old Sam La Roque getting the put out. And in the next inning Lancaster won the game.

In all my ball playing experience it was the greatest heady play I ever saw, and it was heady in a double sense, for old Piggy thought like a flash, and when he saw he could not get the ball with his hands, he went after it with his head. I haven't seen him for years, but I'll bet now if anyone can get him to take his hat off they'll find Reach's trademark stamped on that bald spot which covered more baseball brains than can be found in a lot of teams.

FATHER OF MODERN SURGERY.

It was the great mission of the late Baron Lister to make surgery safe soon after the application of anaesthetics had made it painless, and his reward was a half century, almost, of cumulative public appreciation of the vital importance of his discovery of modern surgical practice, says the New York World. The peerage conferred on him by Queen Victoria, the first, it is believed, that was ever bestowed in England for services to medical science, only partly measured humanity's gratitude to him, and he dies honored as few of his contemporaries have been for more spectacular achievements. Lister's studies of septic poisoning ensuing from surgical operations were begun when he was a young house surgeon in Edinburgh, but it was while professor at the University of Glasgow, between 1864 and 1867, that he found the cause and the means of prevention which were to revolutionize surgery. His carbolic spray is now obsolete and his antiseptic methods have been variously improved upon. But aseptic surgery is today essentially what Lister made it, and to him is mainly due the reduction of hospital mortality which is one of the chief distinguishing factors between the old surgery and the new.
